LCol MacIntyre praised Base team under his command

"There can be no greater compliment to a Base Commander than one of your team finding a way to get the job done. This is how I know that CFB Shilo is Ad Omnia Paratus — Ready for Anything."

Outgoing BComd LCol David MacIntyre summed up his two-year stint on this Base with that observation in his farewell speech during a CoC held at Canoe River Memorial Park.

He made this observation for those in attendance following a handshake with a soldier who works on Base side.

"One of my soldiers came up to me last week to let me know he was disappointed he would not be able to be on parade with the guard [June 18]," he said. "He had a task to perform getting 2PPCLI [Battle Group] equipment ready to deploy on operation, but he wanted to shake my hand before I left."

LCol MacIntyre is posted east, where his family wife Shannon, and children Gavin and Meaghan will call a suburb of Ottawa home. This will be his third tour with the Directorate of Land Requirements.

Passing the reigns to incoming BComd LCol Jeff Lyttle, LCol MacIntyre confessed the transition to leaving his two-year post here was more difficult for him than he planned.

"Six months ago I would still quip that I was waiting for my extension paperwork to go through, but I am happy to say that Army succession has chosen very wisely.

"I have complete trust in LCol Jeff Lyttle as he transitions his family back to the community of Shilo and Brandon.

"He is no stranger here, and I can leave breathing a little easier knowing he already understands the dynamic between our great Base, our need for local solutions, and the support and trust of communities."

He added, "Jeff and [your wife] Janet, I can think of no one better to carry on this torch as we transition today. It is a privilege to command the team here in Shilo, and I know you are up for the task."

LCol Lyttle arrives on this Base having already spent time here as 1RCHA A Bty BC. He arrives here this summer from Ottawa, where he was posted to the Canadian Joint Operations Command (CJOC) headquarters as Chief of Joint Targeting and Effects. He just completed his time in the National Capital Region as Deputy of the newly formed Joint Operational Effects Branch.

CWO Christopher Rigby replaces RSM CWO Maurice Campbell Empathy for soldiers critical to 1RCHA successes, says CO

Laughter erupted from the CoA ceremony when CWO Maurice Campbell held on to the pace stick he's carried for the past three years as 1RCHA's RSM.

Gripping it with 1RCHA CO LCol Ryan Stimpson, he eventually relinquished his hold and the pace stick was passed on to incoming RSM CWO Christopher Rigby.

"CWO Campbell, today is your day. Three years of loyalty and dedication to this Regiment come to a noble end," offered LCol Stimpson during the ceremony held on the gun lines at 1RCHA. "You are an extraordinary soldier, warrior and confidant. Your counsel and advice to me over the year we spent together, provided perspective that made me a better CO."

He added, "Your empathy for the soldier and dedication to the Regiment were critical to our success — critical to our readiness. You came to us with valuable experience cultivated over a rich career to include dismounted para battery time in 2RCHA, combat experience during TF 3-06, instructor time at CFLRS and staff experience cultivated during and post ATWO program."

LCol Stimpson acknowledged CWO Campbell's perspective and military background was valuable to 1RCHA.

"I never understood until now, this notion of crosspollination being important to round out the individual. I understand now it is not about the individual so much, but about the betterment of the unit. It's about an outsider changing perspective — about an outsider pointing out how we could do things

more efficiently, how we could to things smarter." During his three-year stint at 1RCHA's RSM, LCol Stimpson conceded CWO

Campbell not only changed the Regiment's perspective, but he also changed it

for the better. "Your impact will be

lasting," he said. LCol Stimpson highlighted some of CWO Campbell's accomplishments:

• "You mentored and guided the Battery Sergeant Majors. A critical role of the senior soldier of the Regiment. So

much of this is just setting the standard for them and following it yourself."

• "I witnessed the strength and leadership of our BSMs on Ex FROZEN GUNNER and in Wainwright."

• "Your influence and empowerment of the BSMs ensured our soldiers would be looked after all the way through down to the most junior rank. The experience and wisdom you related in your tenure will make an already strong cadre of Senior NCOs and Junior Officers stronger leaders."

• "You looked out for the welfare of our Regimental soldiers. You persevered alongside the soldiers at our Regimental gun position during Ex FROZEN GUNNER, the coldest exercise in Regimental memory."

• "Training injuries are a reality but I assure you

there would have been many more and more severe if not for your diligence and proactiveness."

• "You showed your genuine concern for the welfare and well-being of the soldiers and families of this Regiment."

• "We had a number of soldiers in the hospital early in my tenure. It was stressful time. You encouraged me to visit and accompanied me without reservation regardless of where we needed to go. I could always count on you being responsive to a soldier in need, no matter the hour."

LCol Stimpson considered his RSM a trusted confidant, and could count on his loyalty and honesty.

"You reminded me often that you were not here to make friends," he said. "Your opinions and assessments were without bias, without preference. You delivered a frank sounding board for my ideas. And you understood this role well.

"You spoke truth to power and provided that advice on more than one occasion I

know. That unvarnished and frank counsel ensures a comprehensive richness in command decision-making that considers all angles, makes us better, makes us stronger."

CWO Campbell's wife Joanne was also praised for her support.

^{*i*}I will never understand the hardships and sacrifices that are made by the spouses of military members. They are enormous I know. Spouses drastically change their life courses to allow soldiers to do what they need to do.

"You [Joanne] are as important to CWO Campbell's success as he is, and integral to the unit ability to be ready. The Regiment thanks you. I thank you."

While he was saying good-bye to CWO Campbell, LCol Stimpson welcomed CWO Rigby into the 1RCHA fold.

CoC ceremony in park fitting end to BComd's Shilo post

In writing his farewell speech, LCol MacIntyre searched for the right cliche to share with his attentive audience, which included review officer Col Scott McKenzie, 3CDSG Commander out of Garrison Edmonton.

"I searched through the ready list of well-known cliches to use, but somehow 'drag em in, drag em out' does not fit. [With] my experience, I believe the more fitting analogy is 'start where you are, do what you can, leave it better than before.'"

He added, "I first heard this as part of our soldier total health and wellness initiatives known colloquially as 'Readiness, Resiliency and Growth,' but I also think it apt for CFB Shilo as whole."

Looking back on his two years working here on the prairies, LCol MacIntyre believes the Defence team, Regular and Reserve soldiers, public servants, NPF staff, and contractors all deliver "unmatched service" to the lodger units, communities, operations, training and military families.

"This is what it means to be part of the Base, and our success only comes through their daily efforts," he offered. "Jeff, my friend, you won't always have the answers, but I believe that you take of this team, when you realize that through initiative, understanding and teamwork, small changes can eliminate mountains. I ask that you leave it better than you found it."

LCol MacIntyre acknowledged the efforts of the guard on parade for the CoC during his speech.

"I also owe a personal debt of gratitude to the team represented by the guard on parade," he said. "The diverse Base Defence team is over 350 strong, and I don't believe there was even one time where I managed to get out and see them all — either as a group or individually.

"They work in locations all over the Base, humbly providing the services that keep this community and Base strong. They are counted on to complete their tasks, often with little recognition, but this is the nature of the work. "We are always open and capable of adjusting to the needs of our clients — this is what it means to serve on a Base."

LCol MacIntyre thanked his BRSM, CWO James Doppler, for indulging him one last time by allowing him to hold his CoC in a fantastic location just off Royal Avenue versus indoors at the MPTF, as he experienced when he arrived to replace LCol John Cochrane in 2017.

"I am incredibly proud of this Base, and find it especially fitting to hold this ceremony here Canoe River Memorial Park. Displayed in this park are memorials and testimonials of the efforts of CFB Shilo soldiers in conflicts of the past 100 years, never to be forgotten."

He added, "I am especially proud of our efforts to commemorate the LAV III and memorial cairn for those who fought and died in Afghanistan. I have a personal link with that conflict together with the 2PPCLI Battle Group and deployed teams of 1RCHA.

"Their sacrifices are remembered here, surrounded by the very services who make their participation in training and readiness possible ... services like General Strange Hall, MFRC, CANEX systems of support, community centre, official languages school, Real Property operations and, in the background, the Base headquarters building."

Essential to the mission, LCol MacIntyre offered thanks and congratulations for the teams' continued efforts at CFB Shilo.

Looking towards Col McKenzie on his left sitting in the shadow of retired artillery pieces from 1RCHA, LCol MacIntyre offered thanks to the 3CDSG commander for his patience, support and effort from his formation.

"We could not have been successful without your advice and effort to bring the formation together. Though we stand 1,200 kilometres apart, in many ways we have worked on our relationship linking out teams together.

"I believe it started with a Ceviche and a glass of port in the Mediterranean before either of us assumed Command, but I believe we have transitioned into a strong team." LCol MacIntyre's final thanks was to his own family who "took a gamble and moved with me to Shilo, Manitoba," where the Base's location had to be described on a map for them.

"No stranger to the Army of the West, Shannon, Gavin and Meaghan agreed to two years in Manitoba. I cannot thank them enough for this opportunity.

"I believe we were able to flourish with the richness of services provided to military families in Shilo."

Joining the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) in 1994, LCol MacIntyre was commissioned as an Armour officer with Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadians) four years later after completing his Bachelor's degree through the Regular Officer Training (ROT) program.

Besides his posts in Canada, he has several operational tours including the NATO stabilization force in Zgon, Bosnia in 2000; Joint Task Force Afghanistan in Kandahar, in 2006 and 2008; and a domestic deployment to Op PODIUM for the Winter Olympics held in BC in 2010.

A graduate of the Land Forces Technical staff program and advanced command and staff course while on course in Shrivenham, UK, he received his Master's degree in strategic studies from King's College, London.

LCol Lyttle also joined the CAF in '94, graduating with a Bachelor of Engineering four years later. He was commissioned as a 2Lt in field artillery, initially serving with 2RCHA at Garrison Edmonton. He was also 2IC with 2RCHA.

His operational experience includes humanitarian relief in Turkey in 1999; stabilization operations in Bosnia in 2001; counter-insurgency operations in Afghanistan in 2008; and twice domestically in response to flooding in Manitoba in 2011.

More recently, from July 2016 to April 2017, LCol Lyttle was the Chief of Lethal Targets for Combined Joint Task Force Op INHERENT RESOLVE supporting the military defeat Da'esh in Iraq and Syria.

LCol Lyttle is the father of four daughters, Hailey, Emma, Ava and Mackenzie.



Crosswalk, speed limit signs moved Be aware of signage changes on Aldershot Road

Motorists in the vicinity of the GSH and CANEX might want to be cognizant of road sign changes, according to the Base General Safety Officer (BGSO).

Work has been done or will be completed related to the following speed limit and traffic marker changes: In the high traffic area of CANEX and GSH on Aldershot Road, the following changes have been made to facilitate safe passage of both vehicle and pedestrian traffic.

• The 30 km/h zone on Aldershot Road has been expanded east by approximately 60 metres to ensure vehicle traffic is slowed appropriately prior to entering the pedestrian and vehicle traffic area between CANEX and GSH on Aldershot Road; and

• In the coming weeks, all six pedestrian crosswalk signs on Aldershot Road in the vicinity of CANEX and the GSH will have red flags placed on them so they better stand out to drivers.

Meanwhile, when turning onto Aldershot Road from Boulogne Road, the following change has been made to improve traffic safety and visibility of oncoming traffic: The stop sign and stop line at the junction of Boulogne Road and Aldershot Road when driving north on Boulogne Road have been moved forward towards Aldershot Road to permit better vision when looking west down Aldershot Road — around corner of the hobby club fence — prior to turning onto Aldershot Road from Boulogne Road.

New RSM offers 1RCHA rich operational experience

"I know it can seem daunting coming to a new unit for which you are unfamiliar. Your experience and background is equally impressive to that of CWO Campbell's," he said, noting his new RSM has experience with 2RCHA out of Garrison Petawawa, where he was a member of Para Battery.

"You have rich operational experience, time spent with CSOR and various other deployments. I look forward to your counsel, to your perspective. My advice to you, is be frank. We need the perspective of an outsider, someone to tell us there is an alternative, perhaps smarter way to do things. I challenge you to make us better."

Born and raised in St. Stephen, NB, CWO Rigby joined the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) in February 1988. Following basic training at the now defunct Cornwallis, NS, location, he attended battle school at CFB Shilo. His first posting was to 2RCHA's E Bty Para.

Freefall qualified following training at Garrison Edmonton, in 1991 CWO Rigby was offered a tryout with the Canadian Forces parachute team, Sky Hawks. Successful, he then travelled across North America promoting the CAF while jumping as a Sky Hawk.

With three deployments to Afghanistan on his military resume, CWO Rigby worked at the Gunner career shop in Kanata, Ont. prior to his promotion from MWO to CWO, and subsequent appointment to 1RCHA as its newest RSM.

His operational experience includes a 1993 deployment to Cyprus as a section patrol member for his first tour overseas, and the last rotation of Op SNOWGOOSE.

In 1998, he was deployed to Bosnia as a mortar detachment commander for six months, then to Honduras as part of the OC's security party with the first DART mission. He's also been deployed to Kosovo, with his first Afghanistan mission occurring on Roto 0 in 2003. On another Afghan mission he instructed Afghan National Army soldiers company level attacks.

Away from work, CWO Rigby enjoying fishing, taking his motorcycle out for a spin, and all types of physical training.

CWO Campbell is posted to CFB Kingston, where he will begin is French studies this summer.

With his Change of Command (CoC) ceremony just around the corner, outgoing BComd LCol David MacIntyre hosted his final quarterly awards parade at the MPTF.

A number of citations, promotions and honours were handed out or presented by BComd LCol MacIntyre and BRSM CWO James Doppler.

A number of Command Team coins were presented to military members and a civilian worker:

• Cpl Savoie-Poirier was instrumental in supporting a fellow soldier through their medical limitations and minimizing the impact felt within Standard Military Pattern section. In addition to sharing knowledge with others in the section, he was relied upon to help his peers after-hours to conduct recoveries, even while not on duty.

• Cpl Dionne created a Standard Military Pattern sections specific walk-through manual for maintaining the new Tactical Armoured Patrol Vehicle (TAPV). This manual documents the best procedures, which other technicians can then use to repair the vehicle even in the absence of an experienced technician.

• Cpl Purcell eagerly volunteered to be the OPI for the spring car care clinic and provided outstanding leadership to the entire team. He ensured the event was adequately staffed and help raise more than \$2,000 for the Base Padre fund.

• Chuck Roeder has consistently gone above the requirements of his position to ensure that CFB Shilo provides a first-rate Range and Training Area (RTA). He has accomplished those efforts by using UAV assets to define trouble areas and enhance Force Protection and Security requirements, which meant a serious degree of commitment on his part to ensure that he operated in line with new policies.

Further, he went above and beyond in ensuring that resources were in place and that key inspections were conducted so that the RTA could remain operational, which was done to such a high standard that accolades regarding his work have been sent by CADTC and the formation Range and Training Area Management Officer (R TAM O).

• In recognition of Cpl Oskar Idzikowski, and Bdr Nicholas Stinziano and Bdr Kyle Reimer's actions May 13, this trio were recognized by the Command Team.

While conducting their duties in the Range Control maintenance shed, a co-worker was sprayed in the face with hot coolant when a hose came loose. These three members reacted immediately by removing the fluid from his face, leading the member to the eye wash station, and flushing the eyes. The quick responses of these three members preserved the casualty's eyes.

• MCpl Desmarais suffered a severe injury during a unit sports day in October 2017. While recovering, she requested to be accommodated allowing her to continue working for the Base Comptroller branch via remote arrangements.

Despite setbacks, her dedication to a full recovery, while seeking avenues to support the Base and her future career are to be commended. MCpl Desmarais' successfully completed the residency portion of her Primary Leadership Qualification (PLQ) immediately on her return to work which continues to speak of her personal dedication and leadership to the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF).

These presentations were followed by presenting Command Team commendations:

• In recognition of Sgt Tracy Caldwell's selfless dedication to the continued success of the CFB Shilo MPSS section during severe manning shortfalls, she received a commendation from LCol MacIntyre.

During this year's APS, Sgt Caldwell voluntarily worked countless hours during evenings, weekends and while on leave to ensure that all members of CFB Shilo, and Base lodger units, were administratively supported.

In addition to normal MPSS functions, Sgt Caldwell was also required to support the creation of a new unit pay office, including MPAI training to the incumbent pay office staff, as well as stand up an Ops URS to support an operational deployment. All tasks were accomplished, with only 43 per cent of her normal staff, and in a manner which brought credit to herself as a leader as well as reflecting the professionalism and flexibility of CFB Shilo.

• In recognition of MWO John Gilbertson's outstanding support, professionalism and dedication to CFB Shilo, he received a commendation from LCol MacIntyre.

MWO Gilbertson has worked tirelessly to ensure the manning and organization of the Base structure has been corrected in the data bases after many years of constant change. His forward thinking and planning abilities has been excellent while managing personnel manning challenges in the G1 Branch.

He is a consummate professional and offers sound advice and mentorship with tact. MWO Gilbertson has brought great credit to himself and CFB Shilo.

• Capt Thomas Oh was acknowledged in front of his peers for his tireless actions taken during a vehicle fire that took place in the RTA on July 6, 2018. His efforts ensured a quick and safe remediation of the area, minimizing the environmental impact of the incident. This summer, Capt Oh has been posted to CFB Borden.

There were three medal presentations: WO Spence received his CD second clasp in recognition of 32 years service; Sgt Caldwell received her CD first clasp in recognition of 22 years service; and Capt Knoll received his CD first clasp in recognition of 22 years service.

LCol MacIntyre and CWO Doppler also recognized 14 CAF members with promotions: Maj Durand, Lt Shaw, MWO Keating, WO Gerow, Sgt Thompson, Sgt Landry, MCpl James, MCpl Dutchak, LS Zaburdajev, Cpl Power, Cpl Leduc, Cpl Bohm, Pte Pellerin and Pte Buenaventura.

PSP long service awards were presented to Laura Olsen (five years), Rosalind Lebel (10 years) and mess manager Patsy Marion (35 years).

What is NECTR? N - Nurture self; E - Enrich your community; C - Connection through body and mind; T - Training with purpose; and R - Regimented, making every single day count.


