

Day and night firing will be carried out at the Shilo Ranges until further notice.

The range consists of DND controlled property lying approximately 32 kms SE from Brandon and N of the Assiniboine River in Townships 7, 8 and 9; Range 14 WPM, Townships 8, 9 and 10; Ranges 15 and 16 WPM and Townships 9 and 10: Range 17 WPM in the Province of Manitoba. If required, a detailed description of the Shilo property may be obtained from the Base Construction Engineering Office at Canadian Forces Base

All boundaries, entry ways, roads and tracks into the Range are clearly marked and posted with signs indicating that there is to be NO TRESPASSING. Hunting is no longer permitted on the Shilo Ranges.



## **2PPCLI** prepares for centennial celebrations

As we pause to enjoy the holidays, it is a time for reflection.

This past summer, more than 220 soldiers from 2PPCLI deployed to Afghanistan for the final chapter in a storied campaign. Unit soldiers performed splendidly abroad, training the Afghan National Security Forces and cultivating enduring relationships with our strategic allies.

Ninety-four unit soldiers returned home in October; 100 are due back in the coming days, and the remaining 29 will arrive home between January and March. Our thoughts are with deployed soldiers and their families during this festive season and we anxiously await their safe return.

The 2PPCLI Home Team completed challenging, progressive and authentic live fire training in Shilo during October and November. Soldiers had the chance to complete field firing with grenades, many for the first time, culminating with complex platoon day and night ranges. Miraculously, the weather held.

The CDS visit to 2PPCLI in Shilo was a highlight of the fall campaign, providing a chance to showcase the Army of the West.

Fall '13 was a time for remembrance. 2PPCLI marked the year of the Korean veteran, participating in several events to honour the accomplishments and sacrifices of this historic campaign.

The unit also paid tribute to the 2PPCLI Battle Group at Medak, hosting veterans of the action, including the Battle Group Commander, Col (Retired) Jim Calvin.

Outreach events were also hosted at Kapyong Barracks this fall, including visits by several Royal Canadian Army Cadet Corps, the Brandon Wheat Kings and our Korean War veterans.

2PPCLI actively supported our affiliated towns and communities, maintaining strong bonds with the Canadian public whom we serve.

Looking ahead for 2PPCLI — 2014 plans to be exciting year for the warriors of the Second Battalion. The unit

will re-generate following the Task Force 2-13 deployment to Afghanistan, flushing out the rank and file of all five companies.

Dynamic training is planned for the winter, gradually progressing to a combined arms deployment with 1RCHA and 1CER on Exercise STRIKING RAM from March 10 to 14.

A number of 2PPCLI soldiers will also be privileged with the chance to deploy on Exercise PRAIRIE STORM from May 12 to June 1, soldiering alongside our British allies at CFB Suffield.

Finally, select soldiers from a composite Regimental platoon will participate in an international training competition in Columbia during the summer.

Several Regimental events are planned during next summer, including a building naming ceremony May 9, a Winnipeg Freedom of the City parade June 27, and the coveted NIJMEGEN march in the Netherlands from July 15

In this our centennial year, 2PPCLI will conduct a Memorial Baton Relay from Edmonton to Ottawa to celebrate with a nation during the period Aug. 10 to Sept. 18. Soldiers will carry a baton containing a roll of honour that lists the names of more than 1,800 heroes who have died on active service with the Regiment during the last hundred

PPCLI centennial commemorations will be hosted in Edmonton (Aug. 7 to 10) and Ottawa (Sept. 18 to 21) by 1PPCLI and 3PPCLI, respectively.

Our anniversary plans will culminate with a Frezenberg Commemoration in 2015 from May 7 to 11 to formally mark the death of the Originals in the Ypres salient 100 years to the day of the action.

On behalf of all ranks 2PPCLI, I would like to thank the Command Teams and staff at Base Shilo and 1RCHA for your friendship, co-operation and unwavering support throughout 2013.

As 2PPCLI embarks on another calendar year, we stand ready to meet domestic and international defence objectives while deepening existing bonds with the public and our communities.

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



## BComd reflects on the past, looks to future

As 2013 draws to close I would like to pause and reflect upon some of the events, activities and efforts which have marked Base Shilo.

While this has been a year filled with challenges, pressures and stress, I believe there are also achievements which deserve one final bit of recognition before we enter the New Year.

Shilo once again mounted and supported a significant portion of the Army's contribution to the ongoing mission in Afghanistan. Soldiers and leaders from many of the units who make this Base home, left in

the summer on what will be the last operational Task Force to deploy to that country.

The work required preparing them for this deployment and the support necessary to help "get them out the door" is considerable.

I would like to acknowledge the efforts of the some of the Shilo team: the sections in the G4 Branch who worked all hours to prepare equipment and cargo; the staff at 11 H Svcs C, 1 Dent Unit, the G1 Branch and the home unit Orderly Rooms who ensured that each member's personal administration was in order; and the MFRC staff and the family support representatives who worked around the clock assisting on "the home front."

The collective efforts of this Base in support of this mission was (and is) commendable.

The fall saw the conduct of two significant field training exercises by 1RCHA and 2PPCLI. It is important to acknowledge that these do not happen without the co-operation and co-ordination of efforts of multiple units from across this Base.

As 2013 draws to a close in Kabul, I would like to wish everyone back home a happy and safe holiday

I would also like to take this opportunity to update everyone on Op ATTENTION and express my deepest gratitude to all members of Roto 3 for their contribution to the Op as well as congratulate them on the accomplishments that we have shared during the past six months.

CWO Eddie Smith and I have taken great pride in the commitment, hard work, and excellence we have seen demonstrated by our members day in and day

CCTM-A Roto 3 has had an exceptionally productive and remarkable deployment to date. Some examples include our health care professionals and training development experts at the Armed Forces Academy of Medical Science, who have been rebuilding the Afghan National Army medical training system.

A fledgling Afghan Air Force is flying where none existed before at Kabul International Airport North, and our mentors and advisors at Camp Eggers, Phoenix, and ISAF HQ have been working closely with senior Afghan leadership as they take complete control

Other successes have included the basic training of more than 110,000 Afghan soldiers at the Kabul Military Training Centre, and the assembly and fielding of 161 Kandaks (Battalions) consisting of 83,936 individual soldiers at the Consolidated Fielding Centre, since the start of Op ATTENTION.

These are truly staggering numbers and inspirational examples of what has been accomplished so far. Along with these positive indicators, there have also been reminders that these advances come at a cost.

In poignant ceremonies held at Camp Eggers, Phoenix, and Blackhorse we marked the final Remembrance Day observed by CAF troops in Afghanistan.

It was particularly fitting that 3 Cdn Div soldiers partook in these ceremonies, as we have the proud distinction of supplying Canada's first soldiers in Afghanistan in 2002 and now have the honour of providing the last soldiers to leave in 2014.

For many of us, Afghanistan has been a place where we have said good-bye to close friends and the ceremonies offered an opportunity to reflect upon their sacrifices as well as those of our coalition partners.

Lastly, with our work and commitments coming to an end in Afghanistan, I would like to point out that CCTM-A has transitioned into our draw-down phase.

This means that moving forward we will be re-deploying personnel and materiel to Canada while continuously and concurrently fulfilling our operational obligations.

As we draw closer to completing our mission, I am confident that CCTM-A will continue to provide effective training and mentoring to our Afghan National Security Force partners while simultaneously conducting our mission closure activities.





## Soldiers conclude mission to Afghanistan

After spending the past six months in Kabul, Afghanistan in support of Operation ATTENTION, soldiers from the Third Canadian Division are coming home just in time for the holiday season.

Those returning are a part of the Canadian Contribution to the Training Mission in Afghanistan (CCTM-A) and have diligently contributed to building a more secure and safe environment for the people of Afghanistan.

Excited to be home in Edmonton soon, MCpl Emilie Mitchell says she's looking forward to seeing her husband and daughters, ages two and four.

"I just missed both of my girls' birthdays," she explains. "But, with Internet here, we can do some web

Her husband's "famous risotto" is also something she missed a lot — "I can't wait to go back and have

But she noted there is an Afghan restaurant at the camp that competes with her husband's culinary talents: "How they combine the flavours, the spices, how they use everything to cook a meal. It is quite

For MCpl Mitchell, resource management support tions and communications systems worked properly

clerk with the First Service Battalion at the Canadian Forces Base Edmonton, this was her first deployment to Afghanistan. She worked as a contract clerk in Kabul, co-ordinating with local companies the ordering of heavy machinery such as forklifts.

Like many deployed Canadian soldiers working in a new work environment, MCpl Mitchell had to face certain challenges, including the language barrier. In her dealings with local Afghan companies, she had to be very thorough to ensure important information was not "lost in translation."

Another Canadian Army soldier who is looking forward to returning to CFB Shilo for the holiday season is MCpl Matthew Hall. He says his parents in Moncton, New Brunswick cannot wait for him to return.

"I'll be getting home around Christmas time so I'm sure they'll have a lot of holiday festivities planned." He is looking forward to seeing his two brothers

who will be there to greet him as well.

MCpl Hall, a signals operator with 2PPCLI, agrees that being deployed to Afghanistan requires an ad-

He was able to adapt quickly, ensuring the opera-

to support the needs of all CCTM-A members.

In spite of keeping a very busy schedule working six days a week, MCpls Mitchell and Hall found ways to unwind through physical activities.

MCpl Hall picked up ball hockey, while MCpl Mitchell played indoor volleyball with her colleagues. "I'm playing volleyball here. I play with Americans, Turks, and Bulgarians; we don't all speak the same language, but we communicate through the language of sport," she savs.

By Christmas, approximately 275 personnel will remain in Afghanistan. All Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) members will be home by the end of March

They are very proud of what the Canadian troops of the CCTM-A have accomplished in Afghanistan, making a positive difference in the lives of the Afghan people and helping build and strengthen the ANSF.

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# Biologist examines ecosystem

CFB Shilo is a vital military training base in Canada and an important ecosystem, according to the Base biolo-

gist.
"The unique nature of this area has been recognized for almost a century, and with proper care and management, it will sustain military training for many decades to come," said Sherry Punak-Murphy.

Despite what people may think, she said the presence

of CFB Shilo has a positive impact on the surrounding

"Military training at CFB Shilo, as well as with other military land holdings throughout Canada, has resulted in an island oasis for species at risk of becoming endangered or threatened. Military training lands are secured from continuous human impacts such as urbanization, agriculture and transportation, and have disturbances that are more similar to natural

For example, she pointed out that military live fire artillery training sometimes results in fires which help suppress the growth of aspen encroachment onto the

"This is just one of many examples of military training disturbance mimicking natural factors, and that is what makes these training areas so vital to ecosystems," said Punak-Murphy.

Biologist and conservationist John Morgan main-

tains the natural mixed-grass prairie environment at CFB Shilo is like "stepping back" to the time of naturalist/author/artist Earnest Thompson Seton, Manitoba's first provincial naturalist, who lived in that region for several years in the late 19th century.

Studies conducted 52 years ago, described the vegetation community as being "almost primeval in condition."

"It's a very special place at-Shilo," he added during a telephone interview from his home near Argyle, where he operates Prairie Habitats Inc. — a company dedicated to helping people

restore native prairies and encouraging the use of local native seeds. Most of the area surrounding CFB Shilo was settled after 1900, when the native prairie was broken for crop production.

"Today, the number of remnant patches of native prairie in the Shilo area continues to decline as they are broken and ploughed for crop production, most notably for irrigated production of potatoes," said Pu-

nak-Murphy, a graduate of Brandon University, who prefers to call herself a bio-geographer.

"The presence of the military since the early years of the past century, however, effectively conserved the native prairie at CFB Shilo by preventing the large-scale breaking of the land that occurred in much of the rest of southern Manitoba," she said.

'Research and management of listed and potentially threatened wildlife species [including plants] at Shilo is therefore an ongoing program for the environmental office at the Base."

Residential Housing Unit (RHU) residents residing at CFB Shilo are required to both assign a house sitter and notify

the Canadian Forces Housing Agency (CFHA) of any absence of more than two days by the primary occu-

This form is available at the CFHA office located at 78 Kingston Ave. or information can be called in at 204-765-3000 local 4111.

Ensure your house sitter is dependable, as they will need to ensure heat stays on in your home and that the premise continues to be secure.

Walkways at homes must continue to be kept snow and ice-free during the holiday season, even if you are away. This allows easy access of emergency services to your home should the need arise.

For those travelling abroad this holiday season remember about registering with the appropriate authorities.

Military members must register with the Canadian Forces National Counter Intelligence Unit (CFN-CIU) prior to non-duty (vacation) travel to any destination except the United States.

It is best to register as soon as you book travel, but it is never too late. CF-NCIU will provide you safety information for your trip, important for your unique role as a military member.

To find the CFNCIU registration, go to the CFB Shilo homepage on the DWAN. It is listed under links.

those traveling For aboard, whether in the military or not, you should also consider registering with the Government of Canada.

www.travel.gc.ca there is a registration page for those traveling out of Canada.

From the Government of Canada webpage: "Registration of Canadians Abroad is a free service offered by Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development Canada that keeps you connected to Canada in case of an emergency abroad, such as an earth-



quake or civil unrest, or an emergency at home.

This fantastic service is invaluable in the case of any emergency and has surely saved lives and reconnected families after many situations.

## Soldiers decompress before return

A multidisciplinary team left 8 Wing Trenton in June to contribute to the third location decompression (TLD), for more than 800 Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) members — including a large contingent from CFB Shilo — who had completed more than eight months on Operation ATTENTION in Kabul,

The TLD helps CAF members make a smoother transition from the theatre of operations to day-to-day life at home in Canada.

What are the program objectives? Canadian Forces Health Services is a leader in providing its personnel with high-quality mental resil-

Since 2010, the Road to Mental Readiness (R2MR) mental health education program has had a post-deployment component for military personnel and their families. The sessions, lasting four hours in total, are designed to better equip CAF members and their families to manage the psychological challenges of deployment and adjusting to life at home afterwards.

In doing so, the program is able to achieve its primary objective of improving short-term performance and long-term mental health outcomes.

The TLD mental health team included four military clinicians; three social workers and a clinical chaplain, as well as four uniformed operators.

The operators are experienced CAF NCOs who have taken the R2MR training and are able to co-facilitate the sessions.

The team was led by Maj Audrey Hudon, mental health program chief from 5 Field Ambulance out of

Their role, in addition to welcoming CAF members upon arrival at the TLD location, was to provide clinical intervention services as required, and to co-facili-

tate the mental health training sessions.

"The sessions were helpful to the men and women who participated in Op ATTENTION," said Maj Hudon, a senior social worker. "They help to ease the transition from theatre to home for personnel who deployed on an operation, but it also shows family members how to best deal with the situation.'

During the sessions, prior to returning home, participants have an opportunity to answer questions such as:

 What skills might facilitate my reintegration with my loved ones?

 How can I overcome some of the challenges of transition and reintegration?

What resources are available for me and my fam-

During group discussions, participants have an opportunity to learn from previous experiences and

from each other. The program was developed specifically to encourage interaction and rich discussion among clinicians, operators and participants, and make the content more relevant to participants.

Although the R2MR TLD content has only been in place for three years, military members who have participated for a second time have said this training was very helpful for them in both their personal and work lives.

Program facilitators feel the sessions have been successful due to the positive feedback received from 97 per cent of participants who responded in a survey.
