Businesses support soldiers through participation in decade-old Brandon Salutes

Brandon Salutes is helping soldiers at home and overseas.

The organization has been running in Brandon for 10 years since the arrival of 2PPCLI to CFB Shilo from Winnipeg.

Chairman Matt Bolley said a main component of Brandon Salutes initiative is to direct members to businesses which offer benefits or provide discounts.

"What we've tried to do is match soldiers to businesses [which] want to provide discounts to deserving soldiers," he explained.

"We've worked over the years to come up with a comprehensive list, which you can find on our website, www.brandonsalutes.ca. It lists all the businesses in Brandon that give discounts to military members if they identify themselves."

You will also find information on two other initiatives at this website.

The "We Care" package program sends care packages to Shilo-based soldiers who are deployed on tasks and operations in both Canada and around the world.

"Working with Shilo, [we] identified individuals who are overseas and have asked them what they would like as a care package," he said.

Often there are a few items which are specifically requested that remind those soldiers of home.

"We've had one soldier ask for Wheat Kings memorabilia," recalled Bolley. "We've had others ask for certain kinds of snacks or Tim Hortons coffee or Forbidden Flavours coffee from Shilo. Those are always very popular."

Bolley said Brandon Salutes has been fortunate in the past with donations from certain places such as the WHL's Brandon Wheat Kings. However, these packages do come at a cost and they are always grateful for any donations.

"We've tried to get donations and we've used our funding. We're hoping to get donations from the community," he said. "Both cash and goods to send over to these soldiers. Through different military programs we can actually send these packages over free of charge."

Often Brandon Salutes does not know exactly who is receiving the package or where they are being sent, but they have received great feedback from those involved and soldiers receiving the goodies.

Mainly, Brandon Salutes ask for cash donations as they don't usually know what will be going into care packages.

If you would like to make a contribution to the program, you can drop of your cheque made out to Brandon Salutes at the Brandon Chamber of Commerce office. It's located at 11th Street and Rosser Avenue.

Brandon Salutes is also working to recognize hardworking veterans and military members with its Westman Salutes program.

The stories of the nominated soldiers are broadcast on Brandon radio stations *Star FM* and *CKLQ*.

"We're just started this program in the summer time. Our hope is that eventually all the submissions will be self-generated by the Westman community," he said. "Right now, we're working with Shilo to find deserving people. We're encouraging people to go to our website and there is a form there you can fill out to nominate someone. They can be a former serving member or current serving member."

The goal of the campaign is to show what soldiers do for the community both in and out of work.

Brandon Salutes would like to let businesses know that if they want to offer a military discount or benefit, to simply give the organization a call.

Bolley said Brandon Salutes would like local businesses to receive their due recognition.

Once they are signed up, a business will receive a Brandon Salutes sticker and a table card. This allows customers to quickly see that business offers a deal for military members.

When you go out shopping or taking the family out for dinner, look for a card with the Brandon Salutes logo on it, or visit the website to check the list of available places.

My co-pilot is no longer riding shotgun for me during our many road trips.

Purdy, who was by my side for 2,378 days after coming home with me on July 2, 2009 following the death of my first Jack Russell Terrier (JRT) Tassja the day before, was put to sleep in

Carberry Jan. 4 at 12:15 p.m. With the exception of visiting a dentist, this was the

hardest thing I've ever had to do in my life. I received plenty of advice from friends and family who have had to visit a vet so their

beloved family pet could be euthanized because of health ailments. For Purdy, in her 15th year of canine

life, it was old age that had creeped up on her, especially during the festive season when she no longer had an appetite, including enjoying her favourite treats.

The above poem helped me decided it was time I thought of Purdy, and not my own desire to not let my elderly JRT go.

While cancer was not devastating her body, old-age sure was as I watched her stop eating, which led to considerable weight loss.

She could no longer see properly, so was unable to jump up and down from her chair or the bed we shared.

Her wagging tail was no longer saluting me when I arrived home, greet-

ing me at the door after watching from the window as I pulled up in the driveway. No more Purdy doggie kisses.

Sleep was her one comfort in her final days.


She would still follow me around the house, but her walk no longer had pace or her canine bounce. In her last few weeks I had to take her outdoors, for fear

steps and hurt her fragile physique. When she was no longer able to climb up the stairs, I'd carry

her back and let her settle on her favourite blankets, whether on the floor, or on her chair.

Life for an energetic JRT is drastically changed when they become elderly. Her nose did not let her down, but her other senses like hearing, sight and agility had waned. My decision to send her on the "long sleep" came down to Purdy's quality of life.

While she could not communicate with me vocally, her body language spoke volumes when I looked at her on my bed in the morning of her final day of life.

Tearful as I held her at the vet's in Carberry, Dr. Marie North was compassionate to my plight, and Purdy was gone in seconds after the injection.

A final blink, and her head went limp as she rested it on my shoulder. The tiny heart beat I felt seconds earlier had stopped. We then made the 126-kilome-

tre drive to the pet crematorium in Virden — I held her front paws as I did driving to

Carberry as we drove west on Hwy. 1.

I spent almost four hours with Purdy at the crematorium as she lay swaddled in her favourite baby-blue blanket. I shared stories about Purdy's life with Karen

Gardiner of Peaceful Valley Pet Crematorium, which has operated in the Westman for 11 years.

It was Maj Reg Sharpe, former Base Engineer, who recommended the pet crematorium. He had used this pet service when his JRT Milo died while he was posted to CFB Shilo.

Purdy was born on Sept. 26, 2001 on Vancouver Island. She was with my sister Morgan Cattrall for her first eight years, then joined me after Canada Day 2009. Cremated as the sun was set-

ting on the Manitoba prairies, Peaceful Valley Pet Crematorium had my pet's remains back to me 48 hours later.

I know my pain will wane over time as I adjust without Purdy not being in the front passenger seat as I go on another road trip.

My new JRT puppy Dotti will now have to fill the void left by Purdy's death.

As Dr. North's condolence card read: "Pets are not our whole life ... but they make our lives whole."

How true! Love you Purdy — RIP!

Paramedics training on new ambulance

CFB Shilo's paramedics are enjoying that new vehicle smell since a new ambulance arrived in mid-December.

According to Fire Chief Dennis Hurley, the new ambulance was one of six purchased on a national contract, with the others going to Petawawa Garrison, CFB Meaford, CFB Wainwright and two to Garrison Gagetown.

"Generally, ambulances last between 10 and 15 years," he explained.

"The old one is a 1999 and it was showing its age, with more frequent problems."

The old ambulance will not be kept for spare parts, or to be used as a backup. Instead, Hurley said it will be returned, likely going to Crown Assets for disposal.

The fire chief likes what he sees after checking the ambulance out along with his staff when it arrived Dec. 16.

"The most noticeable difference is the height of the truck," offered Hurley. "Except for our tallest personnel, you can stand upright in the back, rather than crouch.

"The amount of storage space has increased. The vehicle also came with a stretcher and a defibrillator, equipment that was not provided on the last ambulance." The ambulance is currently being housed in the fire hall, but needs acceptance testing, and must be licensed.

"And our personnel need training before it goes into service," said Hurley. Shilo firefighter Dennis Gullett sees

plenty of advantages with the new ambulance once it goes into service. "The advantages of this new ambu-

lance is there is a much larger working area for our medics when treating patients, [and] the lighting is second to none with the newest LED out," he explained. "Along with more working room

"Along with more working room come more storage for equipment as our service is expanding its scope of treatment and skills. The equipment we require expands so the additional storage room is much needed."

Gullet acknowledged there is not a lot different from the ambulance currently in service other than the room.

"As with any new equipment they have made some minor changes to make accessing our gear easier," he said. "We are required to rotate vehicles at a certain age to keep up to the trends and ensure our Emergency Services is well equipped and ready to respond."

well equipped and ready to respond." He added, "The crews are looking forward to getting the new ambulance into service and are presently going through the unit to familiarize themselves with the operation."

TO REVIEW MAXIMUM ALLOWABLE CHARGES AND FEES FOR PAYDAY LOANS

PURSUANT to *The Consumer Protection Act* (Act) (C.C.S.M.2006 c.2006 c.200) the Manitoba Public Utilities Board (Board) will conduct a public hearing to review charges and fees for payday loans and consider the impacts of possibly reducing the maximum allowable rate from \$17 per \$100 borrowed to \$15 per \$100 borrowed. Additionally, the Board will consider the impacts of reducing the proportion of a borrowers net pay, which is used to determine the maximum loan amount, from 30 percent to 25 percent. These considerations, and other related matters, will be included in the Board's report to the Minister.

SPECIFICALLY SEC. 164 OF THE ACT PROVIDES:

- 164(2) Within three years after the first regulation under clause 163(1)(f.1) (maximum cost of credit) comes into force, the board must commence a review of
 - (a) the meaning of «cost of credit» for the purposes of this Part;
 - (b) the maximum cost of credit or any rate, tariff or formula for determining the maximum cost of credit that may be charged, required or accepted in respect of a payday loan; and
 - (c) the maximum amounts, or the rates, tariffs or formulas for determining the maximum amounts, that may be characterized as accented.
 - charged, required or accepted(i) in respect of any component of the cost of credit for a payday loan,
 - (ii) in respect of the extension or renewal of a payday loan,
 - (iii) in respect of a replacement loan, or
 - (iv) in respect of a default by the borrower under a payday loan.

Further, the Board will submit its report to the Minister which will include

- a description of the board's consultation and the results of the consultation, and
- (ii) the board's recommendations about the matters reviewed under subsection (2); and
- (b) may include any other recommendations about the regulation of payday lenders or payday loans.

Intervener. Interveners provide evidence to the Board and are subject to crossexamination. Those seeking Intervener status should file their application with the Board by February 29, 2016. Intervener Application Forms are available on the Board's website at: http://www.pub.gov.mb.ca/faq.html



Five days notice required. Wheelchair access is available.

Interveners must identify their reasons for intervention and be prepared to cooperate with other interveners to avoid duplication of interventions.

The Board may determine whether an intervener is entitled to costs for participating in the hearing and may fix the amount of those costs. Criteria defining the award of costs are described in the Board's Rules of Practice and Procedures which are also available on the website.

The Board will issue a procedural order dealing with scope, process and intervener status following the February 29, 2016 filing deadline.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AS A PRESENTER

The Public is welcome to provide written submissions to the Board. Written submissions should be received by March 11, 2016.

The public may also present their views orally to the Board during the Hearing. Anyone wishing to present oral submissions to the PUB should contact the Board Secretary by March 11, 2016.

Persons wishing to address the Hearing in French are required to notify the Board's Secretary prior to March 11, 2016.

SCOPE OF REVIEW

Interveners may also wish to make written submissions regarding the scope of the review and to address any specific issues, beyond the mandatory review requirements that they seek to have the Board consider.

FILING OF INFORMATION

The Board will set out a timetable for the orderly filing of information and confirm the hearing dates in its Procedural Order.

All material filed by approved Interveners, as well as public presentations, will be provided on the Board's website.

PROCEDURE

The Board's Rules of Practice and Procedure will apply to the conduct of these hearings. All Interveners must familiarize themselves with the Board's requirements. This document is viewable on the Board's website or is available upon request to the Secretary of the Board at 400 - 330 Portage Avenue, Winnipeg, Manitoba, R3C 0C4 or by calling (204) 945-2638 or 1-866-854-3698 (toll free). The Board's email address is publicutilities@gov.mb.ca.

The Manitoba Ombudsman has recently issued privacy guidelines for administrative tribunals. The Board is mindful of its obligations under those guidelines. Its decisions in respect of the Application being considered will be sensitive to the guidelines. Personal information will not be disclosed unless it is appropriate and necessary to do so. However, the Board advises participants that these proceedings are public and that as a result personal information protections are reduced. The proceedings before the Board are transcribed and int is posted on the Board's trans Names of Presenters and their written or oral presentations are included in the publicly available transcripts.



1RCHA's Gnr David Harte lifts his way to victory

Imagine hoisting 600 pounds in a dead lift? 1RCHA's Gnr David Harte did just that en route to winning the Ex HEAVY LOADER III title during the morning competition held prior to block leave.

When Gnr Harte successfully lifted the 600 pounds com the floor, the crowd surrounding the c tion area let him know they were impressed by giving him an enthusiastic round of applause. A Bty OC Maj Joe O'Donnell was the closest when

it came to challenging Gnr Harte in the dead lift competition, finishing second with a lift of 535 pounds. Z Bty's Capt Andrew Burke was next with a 500-pound lift.

The annual Ex HEAVY LOADER competition features competitors taking part in three events: bench lift, squad lift, and finishing off with the always popular dead lift.

There were 10 competitors for the third annual, with some of the participants sending their results in via video uplink from British Columbia where they are on avalanche control duty in the mountains.

With 1RCHA headquarters, Gnr Harte scored 404 points to take the Ex ĤEAVY LOADER III belt, while Maj O'Donnell finished runner-up with 342.7 points. Third-place honours went to Gnr Francis Gagnon, with 337.8 points, of A Bty.

Based on his three best lifts, Gnr Harte lifted the most of his fellow competitors. Once tabulated, his total was 1,480 pounds.

Maj O'Donnell was second with 1,330 pounds, while Bdr Simard edged Capt Burke by 10 pounds for third-place with a three-lift total of 1,195 pounds. During the 2014 competition Maj O'Donnell lifted the most combined weight with 1,360 pounds. So, Gnr Harte eclipsed this mark by 120 pounds.

Gnr Harte won the squat and dead lifts, while Maj O'Donnell took the bench lift with 365 pounds, 15 more than Gnr Harte.

Bdr Simon Morin was unable to defend the title he won in 2014 after being posted from 1RCHA. He had the best dead lift total that year with 555 pounds on his bar.

Maj O'Donnell said he continues to be impressed with the attendance to observe the competitors in action, but also the dedication each of the participants demonstrate in preparing to compete. And it's a friendly competition, with the winner having bragging rights for the next 12 months prior to Ex HEAVY LOADER IV.

Moreover, each year organizers add to the overall look and feel to the competition, from enhancing the leader board and updating scores and weight statistics for the audience to keep track of where their favourite competitors are sitting in the rankings.

While it gives 1RCHA solders another avenue to test their fitness, this competition is not about being the strongest soldier, according to Maj O'Donnell.

"The competition is not about the most weight lifted or 'absolute strength' but rather 'relative strength,' meaning the goal is not just to be strong, but to be strong for your size.

"It's easy for a big guy to get some big numbers, but seeing a lightweight dead lift 400 pounds is like seeing Spud Webb win the [NBA] slam dunk competition.'





(RRSPs) provide the foundation for many people's retirement savings and have at least two benefits no investor should overlook: the tax refund when you make a contribution; and the taxdeferred growth for as long as the money defer tax on up remains in the account. Therefore, getting

Veteran Family pilot project launched Help available for soldiers, families

MFRC Special

Transitioning from military to civilian life can be an exciting time for Canadian Armed Forced (CAF) members and their families, and it can also pose some challenges.

Assistance with this transition is now available through the Shilo Military Family Resource Centre (MFRC)

As of Oct. 1, 2015 the Shilo MFRC was one of seven MFRCs to launch the Veteran Family pilot program.

This four-year pilot program will assist medically releasing CAF members and their families with the transition from military to civilian life for two years post-release.

The Veteran Family program provides services in the following areas: enhanced information services, transition and prevention programs, and support services

Enhanced information services assist with the navigation of health and mental health systems.

Whether it is finding a family doctor, or assessing

community services, the MFRC is able to provide families with information about the services that are available to them.

In terms of transition and prevention programs, the MFRC is proud to offer a transitional booklet that helps individuals work through the stages of transition and develop strategies to manage transitions.

Additionally, FOCUS (Families Overcoming Under Stress), a resilience based program designed specifically for military families, will be available for couples and families.

Support services are offered through one-on-one navigation which will assist families in developing a step-by-step plan, provide referrals to appropriate community services, as well as information and support in accessing funding for childcare.

These services are offered through the Shilo MFRC's Veteran Family co-ordinator.
