731 hands over to new Commander

On 27 Feb CO, Maj Ian Krepps handed over command to the DCO, Capt Jim Barscello, until the incoming assumes the reins this summer. After almost two years at the squadron, Maj Krepps is leaving to deploy to Afghanistan on TF5-09 where he will be employed with ISAF HQ in Kabul as Chief JCCC IS.

Major Krepps, CD joined the Canadian Forces in June 1990 and attended both Royal Roads and the Royal Military College (RMC) of Canada.

Since graduating he has served with 1 CMBG HQ&SIGS, NDHQ Assistant Deputy Minister as a Satellite Systems Engineer, 2 CMBG HQ&SIGS as a Tp Comd, 1 RCR as the Regimental Signal Officer, Directorate of Land Requirements Ottawa as the

desk officer responsible for Command and Control applications, interoperability projects and Blue Position Awareness and lastly as the CO of 731 Signal Squadron. He has deployed with 1 RCR Battle Group to Kosovo as part of Operation KINETIC Roto 1. Upon completion of his tour, Maj Krepps will be posted to DGLEPM in Hull, QC as the LCSS STSC TECH.

In addition, 1 ASG celebrated its 10 year anniversary on February 5, 2009, with a parade and formation patch ceremony at CFB Edmonton. The patch is graphically represented by the prairie ram symbolizing the formation under LFWA and a picture of a fort symbolizing its support to the Army. At the squadron's Change of Appointment ceremony, each military and civilian member was presented with a patch or a pin to distinguish their affiliation with 1 ASG.

731 Signal Squadron was formed in 1958 and has been located in Shilo ever since. The squadron provides non-tactical signal support, telecommunications information technology services to members including 1 ASG, 1 CMBG and 38 Bde. The squadron's service area stretches from Thunder Bay to the Saskatchewan-Alberta border and the unit is comprised of just over fifty military positions, harmonized with its 15 public

What is the weapon of the artillery?

The gun detachment (det) Second in Command (2IC) is the glue that holds the det together," said Master Warrant Officer (MWO) Dan Sembalerus, the Battery Sergeant Major (BSM). "Depending how they perform, he or she can make or break a good gun det."

Soldiers of 38 Canadian Brigade Group (38 CBG) Artillery Tactical Group (ATG) took part in Exercise PROWLING GUNNER VI 21-22 March.

The role of a gun det 2IC is quite similar to an infantry section with some noticeable exceptions. Unlike an infantry section 2IC, a gun det 2IC is primarily on the gun and his or her primary responsibility lies with the ammunition, the count and making sure the ammunition is being handled properly.

"The C32 fuse is what we're working with mostly today," said Master Bombardier Michael Hague, 2IC of number 3 gun. "Putting them on the right projectile, ensuring the fuse gets set properly and gets locked into place."

"We use the Multi Ordinance Fuse Artillery (MOFA) fuse setter," said MBdr Hague. "It's an electronic fuse setter, which is a lot different from the previous ones we've had in the past which were all manual."

Besides the handling of the ammunition, the det 2IC is the one indi-

vidual that probably has the most contact with the rest of the det. He or she will fill in when the det commander is absent.

"It's fun taking over for the number one," said MBdr Hague. "You are the man in the moment; you're in the trails and you're in control."

MBdr Hague is starting his sixth year in the artillery and considers it to be a great job and is looking to going overseas in the near future.

When asked about what it is like to be in the artillery, he said: "The best part about being in the artillery is the knowledge that everyone you're working with knows their job to perfection."

"So that rounds will be on target, on time."

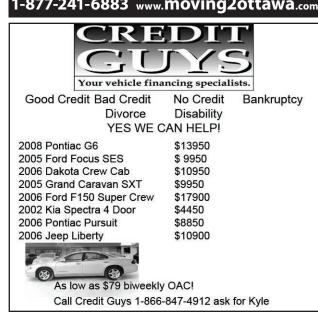

Before You Fill Out Avant de remplir Your Tax Return

Tow that the RRSP season is behind us, Canadians turn their attention to income tax time. The deadline for filing your 2008 tax return is April 30th 2009. Depending on your situation, non-refundable tax credits can help reduce your tax base. Here are a few simple tips you should keep in mind.

Charitable donations

Those of you who make donations to your favourite charity will get a tax credit when these are claimed on your tax return. Keep in mind that the federal credit is 15% on the first \$200 and 29% on amounts above \$200. In addition, there are corresponding provincial credits based on your province's tax rates.

Charitable donation receipts can be transferred to your spouse. The higher income earner should claim all donations if the province of residence has a provincial surtax and the higher income earner is subject to it. This way you will get the maximum credit against the income in the highest tax bracket. If surtaxes do not apply, either spouse can claim the donations.

Medical Expenses

Medical expenses are transferable between spouses. Medical expenses can include amounts paid outside of Canada and they must be more than 3% of your net income or \$1,962, whichever is less. Therefore, the spouse with the lowest income should claim all expenses.

You can claim the expenses of all immediate family members (child, spouse, parent, grandparent, brother, uncle, niece...) who depended upon you for support during the tax year. The total of these expenses must be more than the lesser of \$1,962 or 3% of the dependent's net income for the year up to a maximum of \$10,000.

You can claim medical expenses paid in any 12-month period ending in 2008 that were not claimed in the previous

Tuition and Education Amounts

You can claim fees paid for post-secondary courses. Each claim must he \$100 or more for each educational institution and the institution should provide you with an official tax receipt or a form T2202A. A portion of the education amounts can

also be transferred from spouses and children. To find out what amount is eligible, complete the calculation on the back of vour T2202A or schedule 11 in your income tax forms.

Spouse or Common-Law Partner Amount

If your spouse or common-law partner earned less than \$9,600 last year, follow the calculation on line 303 of your return to see what amount you can claim.

If you were single, divorced, separated, or widowed you can claim a maximum amount of \$9,600 minus the income for any dependent. This amount is called the "Amount for an eligible dependent" and is found on schedule 5 of your return.

Age and Pension Credits

These amounts are based on your age and whether you are receiving a pension and can also be transferred to your spouse.

All of the above mentioned credits and further explanations are in your General Income Tax and Benefit Guide 2008. Take the time to read the portions of the guide that apply to your claims. It may save you money or prevent you from making a costly mistake.

Maintenant que la saison des REER est terminée, les Canadiens dirigent leur attention vers l'impôt sur le revenu. La date limite pour produire votre déclaration de revenus 2008 est le 30 avril 2009. Selon votre situation, les crédits d'impôt non remboursables peuvent vous permettre de réduire votre assiette fiscale. Voici quelques conseils simples à retenir.

Dons de bienfaisance

Ceux et celles parmi vous qui faites des dons à votre œuvre de charité favorite recevront un crédit d'impôt si vous les indiquez dans votre déclaration de revenus. Rappelez-vous que vous recevez un crédit fédéral de 15 % sur les premiers 200 \$, et de 29 % sur tous les montants supérieurs à \$200. En outre, il existe des crédits provinciaux équivalents suivant les taux d'imposition de votre province.

Les reçus de dons de bienfaisance peuvent être transférés à votre conjoint. La personne touchant le

revenu le plus élevé devrait déduire tous les dons si sa province de résidence impose une surtaxe et si elle est assujettie à cette surtaxe. Vous obtiendrez ainsi le crédit maximal pour le revenu dans la tranche d'imposition la plus élevée. En l'absence de surtaxe, l'un ou l'autre des conjoints peut déduire les dons.

Frais médicaux

Les frais médicaux payés peuvent également être transférés d'un conjoint à l'autre. Les frais médicaux peuvent englober les frais payés à l'extérieur du pays et doivent être supérieurs à 3 % de votre revenu net ou 1 962 \$, selon le moindre des deux montants. Donc, le conjoint ayant le revenu le moins élevé devrait déduire tous les frais médicaux.

Vous pouvez réclamer les dépenses de tous les membres de votre famille immédiate (enfant, conjoint, parent, grand-parent, frère, oncle, nièce...) qui étaient à votre charge pendant l'année d'imposition. Le montant total de ces dépenses doit être supérieur à 1 962 \$ ou à 3 % du revenu net de la personne à charge pendant l'année, soit le moindre des deux montants, jusqu'à concurrence de 10 000 \$

Vous pouvez déduire les frais payés pendant toute période de 12 mois se terminant dans l'année d'imposition 2008 et qui n'ont pas été déduits l'année précédente.

Frais de scolarité et montants relatifs aux études

Vous pouvez déduire les frais versés pour des

postsecondaires, cours pourvu que les frais pour établissement chaque d'enseignement ent d'au moins 100 \$ et que l'établissement vous remette un reçu officiel ou le formulaire T2202A. Vous pouvez réclamer une partie des frais que votre conjoint ou vos enfants ont encourus pour fins d'études. Pour connaître le montant admissible, faites le calcul au verso du formulaire T2202A ou à l'annexe 11 de votre déclaration de revenus.

Montant pour époux ou conjoints de fait

Si votre époux ou conjoint de fait a touché moins de 9 600 \$ 1'an dernier. faites le calcul à la ligne 303 de votre déclaration de revenus afin d'obtenir le montant que vous pouvez déduire. Si vous étiez célibataire, divorcé, séparé ou veuf, vous pouvez réclamer le montant de 9 600 \$ moins le revenu de toute personne à charge. Il s'agit du « Montant pour une personne à charge admissible » qui figure à l'annexe 5 de votre déclaration.

Âge et crédits de pension

Ces montants sont fondés sur votre âge et sur vos revenus de pension, le cas échéant, et ils peuvent aussi être transférés à votre conjoint.

Vous trouverez l'ensemble des crédits susmentionnés ainsi que d'autres explications dans le Guide général d'impôts et de prestations 2008. Lisez les parties du guide qui traitent de vos crédits; vous pourriez économiser de l'argent ou éviter de commettre une erreur qui pourrait vous coûter cher.

Tanning salon reopens under new owners

Shilo's only tanning salon has reopened, this time with new owners, a new name, and a whole new look.

Leita and Raymond Piche, owners of Forbidden Flavours, have embarked upon their latest business venture, a tanning salon called BronZe BodyZ. The salon, located in the Canex Mall just steps away from their coffee shop, opened April 6.

"I thought it would be a wonderful thing out here in Shilo," Leita said of their decision to buy the salon from its previous owner. "My husband and I [said], 'wouldn't it be kind of neat to own something else out here, and then we can run both and give something back to the community in [the form of] another service."

Leita, who has previous experience working for tanning salons in Brandon, said the salon offers new features for tanners. Aside from new oak laminate flooring, freshly painted walls and a paradise theme, customers will benefit from a brand new stand up tanning system, which is on its way from Boston. They've also replaced the bulbs in the existing beds that they bought from the previous owner.

The Piches also recognize that busy customers don't always have time to tan within typical business hours, and their new hours reflect that. Above and beyond the regular business hours, BronZe BodyZ offers a key service until eight p.m. Monday through Saturday, and all day Sunday. Customers wishing to tan during these hours can make an appointment, and then pick up a key from the

staff at Forbidden Flavours.

"A lot of people have children, a lot of people are very busy with shift work," Leita said. "They need to get in for a tan and Monday to Friday just doesn't work, or nine-to-five doesn't work."

BronZe BodyZ offers unlimited monthly tanning, which wasn't offered previously, and the Piches made sure that their prices are affordable.

"We've checked all the salons in Brandon to make sure that [our] prices are lower than [theirs] so that people stay and shop in Shilo," Leita explained.

She said opening the salon hasn't been especially stressful for the couple.

"We're quite organized and everything is set up the way that we wanted it," she said. The only source of stress has been explaining to previous customers that they're only honouring tanning minutes from the old salon until the end of April. However, customers have been understanding, Leita said

"We have easygoing people out here [in Shilo]," she said. "We really have good people."

For Leita, owning the salon isn't just about the love of running a business in Shilo. It's also about the love of tanning.

"The thing I love with tanning is it makes you feel so much better," she said. "In a province that, unfortunately, has bad winters, you want to feel better with warmth and sun and vitamin D."

Rick Kehler, manager of the Canex Mall, said he is excited that the Piches have chosen to operate the tanning salon.

"Leita and Ray are true Canadian military supporters. They really can't do enough for the Shilo

Shilo student off to prestigious ballet program

Tavia Werner-Fisher's dream is to be a professional ballerina, and now she's one step closer to achieving that goal. Tavia, an 11-year-old grade six student at Shilo's École La Source, has been accepted to the four week summer session at the Royal Winnipeg Ballet (RWB).

She auditioned in November, along with six other hopefuls from the Brandon area, but only Tavia and another dancer were accepted to the program.

Tavia has been studying ballet for seven years, and currently studies at Dance Images in Brandon.

"I have two ballet classes that I go to," Tavia said. She travels from her family's home in Wawanesa to attend classes, one of which is five hours long

and takes up her entire Saturday afternoon. Anne-Marie Werner believes her daughter's current ballet studies will prepare her for the challenges the summer program will present.

"She seems to be pretty serious about it," she said.

"It gives them a taste [of being a professional ballerina] because it's really intense, from what I hear," said Werner. "Right off the bat, it gives [the students] an idea of, 'is this something I would pursue?""

Werner said some kids might have an "idea or a fantasy" of what it would be like to be a professional dancer, but "after the four weeks they might be singing a different tune."

The program is quite structured, Werner said. Students attend classes Monday through Saturday, and when they're not in class, they're either relaxing or participating in recreational activities and special events, such as outings to the Winnipeg Art Gallery and Grand Beach.

"It's quite serious," Werner said.
"It's nothing like a day camp. [Tavia] just got her pointe shoes, because they'll be introducing [dancing on pointe] while they're there."

The four week Tavia Werner-Fisher demonstrates the session also acts as a fifth position in the gym at her school.

Charity watch benefits

Robin Devine loves her job, and the opportunity it affords her to show the Canadian Forces how much Canada cares about them.

Devine is the creator of Time Is Ticking Inc., a company that specializes in designing and making watches for charity causes. One of the company's endeavours this year is the Limited Edition Afghan Mission Watch, which benefits the Toronto Military Family Resource Centre (TMFRC).

Devine designed the Victory in Europe 60th Anniversary commemorative watch. 550 veterans received donated watches, and two of the watches were sent to Queen Elizabeth and Princess Anne.

Although the proceeds from the Afghan Mission watch directly benefit the Toronto MFRC, Devine said that the project has been warmly received by all the MFRCs across Canada, and with their help to raise awareness, nearly \$10,000 has been raised. Devine believes the purchase of the watches is "sound ground-

ing in what the Canadian military means to the world," she said.

"Canadians are grateful for what [the military is] doing in Afghanistan. I know how much support the Canadian Forces has because I receive these phone calls and orders."

Devine says she also receives phone calls from soldiers in Afghanistan via Skype, the popular free internet calling service. The soldiers call to order watches, or to just tell her how much they appreciate what she's doing.

"I have this very unique opportunity to tell [soldiers] how much Canadians care," she says. "It's important to be able to relay that information. They are always so grateful when you tell them how much [the country] cares."

The Afghan Mission Watch is available until December 31, 2009, but its availability could be extended if there is demand. The watch has Seiko movements, a 24-karat gold raised plating on the face, and a Speidel alligator-style leather strap that is available in black, brown, blue, green or red. The cost is \$65, although the actual value of the watch is \$200.

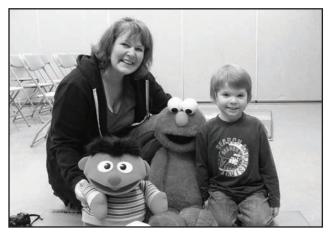

ne Canadian soldier was killed and four others were injured when their armoured vehicle struck an improvised explosive device north of Kandahar City in the Shah Wali Kowt District. The incident occurred at approximately 5:00 p.m., Kandahar time, on April 13,

The fallen soldier is Trooper Karine Blais, from 12e Régiment Blindé du Canada based at Canadian Forces Base Valcartier. Trooper Blais was serving with the 2nd Battalion, Royal 22e Régiment Battle Group.

The injured soldiers were evacuated by helicopter to the Multinational Medical Unit at Kandahar Airfield. Their names will not be released.
