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



Military powerlifters test themselves at Westman Strength Classic

The might of the military will be showcased during a powerlifting competition being held on this Base for the inaugural time.

The Westman Strength Classic is the brain child of Brandon's Amanda Moffit and Jennie Wilson plus Maj Joe O'Donnell. Sanctioned by the Canadian Powerlifting Union and Manitoba Powerlifting Association, the powerlifting event will feature 43 competitors, including six from CFB Shilo.

Weight categories range from the 53 kilogram female junior division to the 120-plus male open masters division.

The competitors from across Western Manitoba will battle it out for powerlifting bragging rights April 22 from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. at L25

Admission is free, with the Maj O'Donnell inviting the Base to come out and cheer on the military competitors as they go head-to-head with some veterans from the Manitoba powerlifting world.

Powerlifting for the past six years, Maj O'Donnell quipped there's a logical reason why an artillery officer took up the sport of powerlifting, "Stronger people are harder to kill!"

Born in Lahr, Germany, this army brat is currently honing his French skills at the Base's language school prior to his departure later this summer for a posting to Fort Leavenworth, Kansas.

Does the 36-year-old have expectations for himself going into this competition?

"I want to to take the Manitoba military bench record for 120 kilogram division currently at 363 pounds and move it a bit higher," he offered. "I'm not expecting much from the squat and deadlift due to some injuries through training."

Like most powerlifters, Maj O'Donnell has a specific training regime he follows.

"I train probably three days a week specifically at powerlifting, but I also train crossfit at Crossfit Rocked and Jiu Jitsu at BAMMA [in Brandon]," he said.

The Sprucewoods resident has set a few goals for himself, too. He's like to bench press 385 pounds, deadliest 575 pounds and squat 475 pounds.

With bench press his strength in this sport, Maj O'Donnell refers this competition as his "Kobe Bryant retirement tour."

He adds, "I plan on giving up powerlifting after this and focussing on crossfit, Olympic lifting, conditioning and combatives more than this. I really enjoy it, but since I won't be around to do [Ex] HEAVY LOAD-ER and [Ex] MOUNTAIN MAN this year, I need some new fitness goals."

MCpl Beth Marie Thompson, a clerk at 1RCHS, has been involved in powerlifting for nearly six months. Why?

"Šo many reasons," she said. "I used to run a lot, but due to a knee injury I had to find a new goal. I've always been interested and with [Ex] HEAVY LOADER 2016 I was presented with an opportunity to see how far I could go with it.

"Being an older female and on the shorter side, I like showing people I can do more than they'd think. Plus, I think the military and society in general need more strong, positive female role models. It's not about being skinny. It's about being strong. Continuously striving to improve. No excuses."

Going into this competition, the 41-year-old expects to do her "absolute" best and hit a few PRs (Personal Results)

Training for MCpl Thompson varies, but she's in the weight room generally six days a week. There's one active rest day, and one complete rest day when it comes to a training schedule.

"Each day starts off with one of the three big lifts, or a variation such as box squats or block pulls followed by accessory work and some light card," she said, adding her diet is high in protein, and low carbs.

Her goals at this competition are the same as her expectations — she's looking for gains. What are her strengths when it comes to powerlift-

ing? "I'm not sure what my strength is with powerlifting, but I'm doing more than I ever thought I could," she offers. "Thanks, in part, to some great coaching from [Gnr] Tyler Harte, my teammates, and support from the powerlifting community in general."

As a neophyte to the sport, MCpl Thompson's ap-

proach to working out to prepare for competition is simple: "To surround myself with like minded people, gain [and share] as much knowledge as possible while figuring out through trial and error what works best for me. Oh, and have fun while doing it."

A Bty's Gnr Harte has been powerlifting since his introduction to Ex HEAVY LOADER. The 24-year-old Toronto-born competitor is recovering from an injury last November, but has seen progress in anticipation of testing himself at L25 during the Westman Strength Classic.

In the Gunners' gym by 6 a.m., he works out with Maj O'Donnell. With a forte in the deadlift competition, his goal is to keep improving his lift numbers, and return to where he was prior to the injury.

Born and raised in Hamilton, Ont., Bdr Garrett Owen Thomas Taylor has been powerlifting for three years. Finding the sport fun, he has a few goals set for himself.

"I'm expecting to take the record for the deadlift/ squat and overall for the military men in the 83 kilogram weight class," he predicted.

Working out six times a week, currently Bdr Taylor keeps himself busy on the weights.

"Right now I'm squatting and bench pressing twice a week each, deadlifting once and having a beach muscle day for my nightly workout," he said. "In the morning I do a quick-fast cardio session before I go to troop PT at work."

What about goals set for this competition?

"My goals for the competition are to take those records, and for the rest of the year is just to build up my lifts to hit high numbers for Ex HÉAVY LOADER at the end of the year," he said, adding his deadliest is his strongest lift.

While he continues to train hard in the gym, Bdr Taylor will strive to hit bench marks he sets for himself when it comes to lifting.

Bdr Danny Davis just started powerlifting six months ago, so is a relative neophyte to the sport. Still the 1RCHA soldier, who was born and raised at this Base, takes everything in when he observes others honing their powerlifting skills.

Looking for a hobby to keep him occupied when he's not soldiering, Bdr Davis thought powerlifting looked interesting. He trains daily at the GSH, and mixes his card with weight training.

Like all athletes who strive to improve on personal best (PB) times or distances, Bdr Davis has his own PRs he wants to reach, or surpass: 400 squat, 500 deadlift and 300 benchpress.

"I love working out and training for competitions," he said, adding he has yet to figure out his strength. Until then, he wants to follow proper training and improve on his technique when it comes to powerlifting.

Clothe the Soldier update Heads up – new helmet issued

Some military members in Shilo recently received some new protection for their heads.

They were issued a new Canadian Forces combat helmet through the Clothe the Soldier Project.

"It's always a morale boost when you see better equipment," said Sgt Paul Haughey with 1RCHA A Bty.

The Royal Canadian Artillery (RCA) Battle School was issued with the new lightweight headgear.

Shilo Base personnel and 26 Field Regiment, RCA in Brandon should also see the new helmets soon, according to CPO2 Dane Ewonchuk, the Base Supply Material Control Officer.

The new helmets have covers available in three patterns — temperate conditions, winter/arctic operations, and UN operations.

Standard issue is a disruptive woodland camouflage pattern which, according to the helmet's user manual, is supposed to provide approximately 40 per cent better camouflage and concealment over monotone green. The woodland pattern was designed exclusively for the Canadian Forces.

The cover must be on at all times to protect the helmet finish. The finish has infrared reflectance and chemical agent resistant properties.

So for soldiers who wish to dig trenches with the helmet or use it for a wash basin as with older models, the will have to look for an alternative.

But the new computer-generated camouflage pattern will not match the new clothing to be issued at the end of 1997 during phase one of Clothe the Soldier.

Instead, the Improved Environmental Clothing System (IECS) will be the same as current issue clothing, according to Capt Karl Saad, deputy project director for Clothe the Soldier.

Originally there was to be a camouflage pattern for the IECS, but that was taken out of the Clothe the Soldier project.

This was due to contractors inability to provide the pattern, according to CPO2 Ewonchuk.

The projected date for a camouflage pattern to match the helmet outside the Clothe the Soldier project is sometime in 2005.

The delivery date for all items through the Clothe the Soldier is July 2000.

The items are to be delivered at different phases throughout the project, but these times are very flexible.

"The dates are not hard and fast," said CPO2 Ewonochuk.

But CPO2 Ewonochuk does point out that as soon as an item is ready, it will be issued.

For example, the multi-tool or "Gerber" was issued in the last few months. This was early because according to the Clothe the Soldier timeline, it was not due until late 1997 or early 1998.



Remember your helmet while cycling

With the warmer weather upon us during spring thaw, bicycles are becoming more popular as a mode of transportation on the Base.

While bicycling can be an enjoyable hobby, no matter your age, there are still guidelines to observe on and off of Base, according to Lt(N) Greg Ansley, platoon commander with Shilo's 1 MP Regiment. Here are a few rules and precautions:

• Helmets must be worn on Base, for any age;

• White light on the front of the bicycle and red light at the rear must be used 30 minutes before dusk, throughout any dark period and 30 minutes following sunrise;

• Brake system and tires must be functional;

 Hand signals are mandatory and all riders should be familiar with the left and right turn and stop hand signals.

• Riders must travel in the same direction as a vehicle and must stay as far

to the right of the road as possible, ensuring safety of the riders and traffic as well;

• Traffic control devices still apply to cyclists, such as stop signs, yield signs, and traffic lights; and

• Mirrors, side reflectors and reflective clothing is recommended. For motorists driving

on the Base:

• Share the road;

• Respect bike lanes by not parking/stopping in them.

Base Standing Order (BSO) 8 and the Manitoba Highway Traffic Act are great resources for additional information for the safe

operation of a vehicle/bicycle.

Also take the time to review laws and learn more about safety by visiting www.gov.mb.ca/healthyliving/hlp/bikesafety/ before heading on the road.

For those residing on the Base, here are a few useful tips from BSO 8 regarding the use of tracked and off-road vehicles as well as abandoned vehicles.

TRACKED VEHICLES

Tracked vehicles may be operated within CFB Shilo as prescribed by the following:

• Within compounds where the concurrence of the unit/section commander is given; • Shall be operated on tracks where available; and

• Speed limit is 30km/hr, except where other reduced speed limits are posted.

Tracked vehicles are to use designated track routes and vehicles not equipped with rubber track pads may not be operated on any asphalt surface roadway unless the vehicle is engaged in work requested by the RPO Det Shilo OC.

OFF-ROAD VEHICLES

Persons operating off-road vehicles (ORV) on this Base shall comply with all the provisions of the Manitoba Off-Road Vehicles Act including those respecting the registration, insurance, maintenance and operation of vehicles.

Proof of registration, insurance and driver's licence (where required) shall be produced on demand at any time when entering, remaining on or leaving CFB Shilo to a commissionaire, MP or other persons designated as security guards.

The operation of ORVs within the confines of the Base is restricted to the designated authorized ORV routes and area 1A ORV Recreation Area. Area 1A is that area which extends south from Horsham Road, approximately two kilometres to the fireguard, with Hwy 340 as the west boundary and Freundschaftesweg Road as the east boundary. Access to this area is by the authorized ORV route.

Individuals living in RHUs and single quarters may gain access to authorized ORV routes via the access route that is the shortest route, and by only using the streets when necessary.

If it is necessary to use the streets, operators must stay as far right as possible.

ÓRVs are prohibited from the following areas: all running tracks, Shilo golf course, airfield at Flewin Field and the meteorological building.

No person younger than the age of 14 shall operate an ORV within the confines of this Base, except when accompanied by an individual aged 18 and older.

ĂBANDONED VE-

HICLES It is an offence to abandon a vehicle within the confines of CFB Shilo. When a vehicle is considered abandoned, the MP platoon commander shall attempt to inform the registered owner in writing, or by other means, that they have seven days in which to either licence, repair and/or remove the vehicle from the Base.

If the registered owner cannot be identified or contacted, or should the owner fail to comply with this directive within the

allotted period of time, the MP platoon commander will cause the vehicle to be removed from the Base by an authorized towing company.

Once this occurs the company representatives may initiate disposal action in accordance with provincial legislation.

The last registered owner is responsible for all associated costs and liabilities of towing, impoundment and administration.

Where, due to lack of salvageable value, an abandoned vehicle cannot be disposed of, the vehicle shall be towed away by military resources to an area on the Base where it will be held for a period of six months, while efforts are continued to identify the registered owner.

Should the registered owner be located within a period of six months, they may claim the vehicle, but DND shall not be responsible for any damage or loss incurred thereto as a result of the action of being towed and stored.

If the registered owner is not identified within the expiration of six months from the time disposal action was initiated, the vehicle may be, at the discretion of the Base Commander, sold at public auction or otherwise disposed of as scrap

Any proceeds realized through the sale of a vehicle at public auction or as scrap shall be credited to the Base Fund NPF account with an entry reflecting the sale.

This action would serve as a safeguard to obviate any claim subsequently arising from the previous registered owner.

Base Surgeon says EpiPen manufacturer has recall

The manufacturer of EpiPen and EpiPen Jr is conducting a voluntary recall of certain lots that may contain defective parts, resulting in a failure of the device.

According to 11 CF H Svcs C CO Maj Keith Wilson, the affected lots are: EpiPen: Lot 5GU763, expiry date May 2017 and EpiPen Jr: Lot 5GR765, expiry date March 2017.

Pfizer, the manufacturer of EpiPen and EpiPen Jr, in collaboration with Health Canada, is conducting this voluntary recall of certain lots since they may contain defective parts that could result in the auto-injector failing to activate or requiring increased force to activate.

This voluntary recall is being conducted as a result of the receipt of two previously disclosed reports outside of Canada of failure to activate the device due to a potential defect in a supplier component.

The potential defect could make the device difficult to activate in an emergency — failure to activate or increased force needed to

activate — and have significant health consequences for a patient experiencing a lifethreatening allergic reaction (anaphylaxis).

The incidence of the defect is extremely rare and testing and analysis across the potentially impacted lots has not identified any units with a defect. However, the recall is being conducted in Canada out of an abundance of caution.

Any military member who has one of these devices should contact the 11 CF H Svcs C pharmacy to arrange for an exchange of the affected EpiPen, as soon as possible," said Maj Wilson.

"The affected EpiPen should be retained until it can be exchanged. In the event of an anaphylactic or serious allergic

reaction occurring prior to the affected EpiPen being exchanged, it should be used and medical attention should be sought immediately."

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



RCA Museum looks to bolster memberships

Updated technology and new exhibits make their way to the RCA Museum, thanks to the help of your memberships.

Memberships for this CFB Shilo venue featuring an outdoor gun park and other artillery artifacts can be purchased for individuals, families, or by a corporation or association.

"It helps us a lot. Memberships support our mission of advancing the history and heritage of the Canadian [Armed] Forces ... notably the Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery," explained museum director Andrew Oakden.

Memberships give you access to the museum for free for the year, informative newsletters, as well as invitations to special events. Membership options range from \$30 to \$300.

"For families, everyone gets in free for the year. It's \$50, with the same stipulations," said Oakden.

"For the corporates, right now we have four and

we'd like to have more. It's \$300. You get the newsletter and you get a directors tour from me for up to 20 people. That includes the museum, wherever you want to see. We'll show you our great collection of vehicles, the archives ... I'll give you a personal tour of the gun park."

He added, "Right now you only get to see one part of four, which is the museum. I can show you the other three parts as well."

A temporary exhibit detailing the Battle of Vimy Ridge just opened on the centennial anniversary. The exhibit for this Great War battle features updated technology for museum goers to check out. Oakden said some of the museum's technology is a decade old, so staff are making updates.

"Right now we're updating a lot of our inter actives. Our Be a Gunner exhibit is being updated right now," he said. "We just updated our Great Gunner exhibit and just completed the 3D touch screen interactive on Vimy Ridge."

He added, "It's a touch screen. It's a battlefield simulation. You can play with the battlefield and see as the Canadians advanced on the line from April 9, 1917 to April 12. It shows how they took the ridge."

The 3D exhibit offers another way to immerse yourself in history. "We have it on the floor, so people can walk over it," said Oakden.

Being interactive with exhibits and history seems to appeal to kids. It's with your help the museum is able to offer families these opportunities. Speaking about the RCA Museum's outreach dur-

Speaking about the RCA Museum's outreach during this year's recent Royal Manitoba Winter Fair, Oakden said children could not get enough of the exhibits brought to the Keystone Centre.

"Memberships go towards things such as advertising, artifact acquisition and outreach," he noted. "We [had] a 50-foot display at the Royal Manitoba Winter Fair, which is paid for by mostly outreach money."

He said children still love to see military equipment and will line-up to climb in and around them.


Other events which the RCA Museum is involved in include the Brandon Summer Fair and the Travellers Day Parade, Shilo Family Day and Canada Day.

Canada's top female goaltender Shannon Szabados, who recently backstopped her team to a silver medal at the women's world hockey championship, played with boys when she started her minor hockey career.

She made the transition to playing on an all-girls team when she joined the national program. Prior to this she honed her goaltending skills facing the opposite sex in the WHL with the Tri-City Americans, played college with NAIT in Edmonton, Alberta and then professionally with the Columbus Cottonmouths.

The 30-year-old goaltender is a role model for the likes of CFB Shilo's Kateri Mills, who started stopping pucks while playing HIP hockey five years ago at Gunner Arena.

Turning 10 in July, Kateri enjoys the challenge of stopping pucks using her butterfly style. It was that reason she wanted to be a goaltender when HIP players did not wear netminder gear. She had the goalie stick, but it wasn't until she moved up to novice that belly protector, mask, blocker, glove and pads became part of her pre-game rit-ual being dressed with help from dad - MCpl Jeff Mills of Base Ops, but re-

cently posted to 1RCHA. "I like to stop pucks," the fifth grad-er at O'Kelly School told the *Stag.* "I wanted to be a goalie because I find it challenging.

She concedes her weakness, as with most goaltenders, is her blocker. With this knowledge, she works hard in practice to improve on stopping pucks with this piece of unique goalie equipment.

While she also tried skating as a forward, and en-joyed scoring goals, the call of the net has meant she's focused on being the best goalie she can be — and

looking forward to the day she'll strictly play with her peers.

This past season, she played house league on the atom Purple Panthers. But also joined Brandon's AA atom girls' team.

This team took part in three tournaments, winning bronze in both Kenora, Ont., and Winnipeg. This in the championship tilt. Another medal to go with her growing hockey trophy collection.

While playing with the boys still interests Kateri until she's able to transition to just playing with girls when she moves up to peewee and bantam in Brandon, it was a game against a girls team from Brandon that piqued her interest. She was in novice playing for the Shilo Sentinels out of Gunner Arena.

"When we played [the girls] I thought it would be

fun to be on an all-girls team," she shyly recalled. Being interviewed about her love of hockey, and being a goaltender, was something new for the four-foot-seven, 65-pound netminder.

While she has no superstitions when it comes to being a goalie – goaltenders are known to be quirky because they want to put themselves in front of pucks - Kateri does follow one regime prior to games.

"I have my mom's home-made protein balls," she said. A fan of the NHL's Toronto Maple Leafs, her favourite goaltenders are former Leaf puckstoppers: Jonathan Bernier and

James Reimer. Closer to home, she would watch intently former Brandon Wheat King netminder Jordan Papirny, who was traded away at the deadline this past season.

"I have his autograph," she said.

With another hockey season in the books, Kateri is looking forward to her sophomore season in atom for the 2017-18 season. She might attend hockey school in the summer, but dad might just let her enjoy summer vacation after moving from the Base to a new home in Brandon.

And there will be no goalie pad cleaning for Kateri.

Dad jokes, "She wants to have them cleaned, but I ask her why she would want to erase the puck marks showing where she's made saves.'

Call those marks, like former Boston Bruin goaltender Gerry Cheevers having stitch marks painted on his mask where the puck went off his head, badges of honour.

Before German soldiers left for home after their training at CFB Shilo, many packed licence plates they collected while here. It was a unique souvenir they brought home with them, according to retired Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) soldier Lewis Risser. A collector himself, Risser started carrying plates in a store he ran on the Base, with the Germans purchasing what he collected, including plates he would obtain by visiting vehicle wreakage businesses in Westman, as well as when he travelled to North Dakota en route to licence plate conventions. While overseas as part of Op UNIFIER, 2PPCLI's MCpl Brad LeBel was given two plates, the bottom one hand-painted and used on Ukrainian military vehicles. 
