Shilo trains for Olympics security

A lack of snow meant improvisation for CFB Shilo soldiers training for the Olympics as part of Operation Podium.

On the day before the Dec. 1 snowstorm, a tracked BV206 used mounds of sand to stand in for the usual snow found here in abundance most years. For members of the media travelling in the bouncing BV carrier, choking sand dust added a certain realism to the overall operation.

Op Podium is this base's commitment to the 2010 Vancouver Olympics. Some 200 2PPCLI members will assist the RCMP in supplying security in the mountainous back country surrounding Olympic sites at Whistler. Troops from Shilo will spend up to 11 weeks in Whistler as part of the 3,700 person strong CF security commitment which also includes Navy forces patrolling the coast and Air Force personnel in the

skies above.

According to Maj Jay Adair, helping the RCMP with security at the Olympics shows how flexible our trained Canadian soldiers can be.

"The RCMP camp commander was just here and there were a number of lessons that were taught together. It's important we be able to do this kind of training face to face. At the end of the day it demonstrates how capable we are operating in Kandahar as well as at Whistler," Maj Adair stated.

Security training for the Olympics runs the gamut from searching for lost hikers, to unruly crowd control to a possible bomb threat. On the day the *Stag* and other media were invited, soldiers were training for bomb disposal and security measures resulting from that threat. Maj Adair said this exercise was a "worse case scenario, but that is what we train for." A veteran of three tours in Afghanistan, he indicated he's looking forward to taking Charlie Company to

the Olympics.

"We could be dealing with belligerents in a security zone, or a hostile crowd," Maj Adair explained.

During Op Podium, several BV206 units along with snowmobiles from CFB Shilo will be used at the Olympic site. MCpl Rob Nepinak of 2PPCLI said check stop training was also part of the exercise.

"Any training is of benefit to us. I have never done a domestic operation before but I have been in Afghanistan three times," he stated as he manned a checkpoint in the training area.

Capt Victor Mover showed media a command post that will be similar to that used at the Olympic site. He pointed out most soldiers will get a feeling of pride helping out in their home country.

"You can sit in Brandon and watch the Olympics on television. But to be there and contribute in a small way to the Olympics, that's probably something we will not be able to do again," he said.

1ASG commander names top soldier, civilian during address

It's rare that both the year's top civilian and top soldier hail from the same unit.

But as Col Charles Lamarre, Comd 1ASG pointed out at a town hall Nov. 27, CFB Shilo itself is a special place. A large crowd filled the Multi-Purpose Training Centre for the presentations and remarks from the support group commander.

Soldier of the Year honours were extended to MCpl Andre Haight of 731 Signals Sqn. His leadership, along with his involvement in the community and work with autistic children, were deciding factors in his receiving the award, according to the commander.

Civilian of the Year ac-

colades were forwarded to Barry (Wade) Miller of Base Maintenance. Col Lamarre pointed out that with various Task Forces postings, those left behind have to pick up the slack and this was something Miller provided frequently.

Also thanked for their long service was Robert (Gerald) Sear for 25 years of dedication and Ron McCulloch, Attendant at Gunner Arena, for his 15 years of service.

In his remarks, Col Lamarre said he recognizes the effort CFB Shilo makes to ensure the best trained soldiers are dispatched into troubled areas.

"I want to thank you for your support for getting Task Force 3-09 out the door. Tens of thousands of soldiers are being sent to the other side of the world and the end result is every six months we are sending 2,300 to 5,000 of the best trained soldiers anywhere. This is all due to you folks back here, doing all the heavy lifting," Col Lamarre stated.

On the topic of finances, the 1ASG commander reminded the audience that infrastructure will have to suffer given the current budget squeeze. He likened some \$25 million in budget cuts to not being able to fix the roof on your house. The result might be bearable the first year or so, he said, but catastrophic in the amount needed to fix it five or six years down the road.

"Sending troops overseas is very expensive," Col Lamarre stated. "But we have to be conscious over infrastructure. We are conscious of your buildings that needed to be torn down 10 to 15 years ago."

When asked a question regarding retention and junior ranks leadership, the 1ASG commander pointed out that each of us desires a challenging job.

"You need to have fun, for example adventure training. You also have to look at the fact right now, 70 percent of Canadians are without a good pension plan. Everyone in this room right now has that pension," he said.

Winding up his remarks, Col Lamarre urged soldiers to enjoy their Christmas leave and to remember the use of designated drivers.

"Thank you for all the work you do. We are extremely proud of you, especially those from this base," he concluded.

Junior Officer Course welcomes artillery members

The Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery's Junior Officer Course (JOC), which ran from November 18 to 21, saw junior officers from both the regular force and reserve units gather in Shilo to contribute to their professional development as leaders and expand their knowledge of their shared heritage as Canadian Gunners. The course also served to welcome newly qualified regular force members as well as reservists to the Artillery family.

Over the four day course, students attended lectures and discussed topics as diverse as the role of an army officer in Canadian society, the artillery's role in Canadian history, and artillery transformation. We were exposed to more of the Regiment's tradition and history during a tour of the RCA Museum and took part in a mess dinner. În addition to junior artillery officers, we also welcomed two EME

officers, the Technical Adjudants of both 1 and 2RĆHA. They brought a different perspective to discussions, making for a more holistic dialogue with a broader perspective from the personnel that keep the artillery going. This mix of of-ficers, combined with the variety and experience of the speakers, provided for excellent discussion throughout the course. The course was very eye-opening from the perspective of a junior officer because it revealed to us the rich and colourful heritage of the Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery.

The amount of experience we were exposed to was immense. Notable speakers included MGen Beare, LGen (Ret'd) Jeffery, WWII forward observation officer (FOO) LCol (Ret'd) Baker, the Honourable LGen (Ret'd) Dallaire, and numerous other special guests. We listened how LCol (Ret'd) Baker landed in Normandy, and after training for years to be a command post officer (CPO), was


suddenly promoted to FOO of an armoured squadron. We were educated on RCA involvement in the Oka Crisis, Gulf War and beyond. Also we were able to get some advice from a troop commander (TC) and a FOO who had just returned from Afghanistan. That was particularly important for us as many of the students on the course will be deploying to that theatre of operations in the near future.

On November 21 the students also attended the Canoe River Memorial and the firing of LGen Arp's last round by M777 in the Shilo training area. The firing of a round to mark the end of a Gunner's active service is a tradition within the RCA. LGen Arp retired after nearly 35 years of service to the CF; serving in 1RCHA, 2RCHA, and 3RCHA and commanding 1RCHA before serving in a variety of positions in Ottawa, and with NATO. LGen Arp's last position was Chief of Staff, NATO Headquarters Supreme Allied Command Transformation in Norfolk, VA.

By the end of the four days, which was crowned by a mess dinner, students left Shilo exhausted, but filled with the warm and fuzzy feeling that they are indeed part of the family that is the Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery. All participants benefited greatly from the experience and as a result, are more aware of what it is to be

a part of the Royal Regiment and what part the Artillery has played in our country's military history.

Pecan Pie Ginger Cheesecake

Here is an easy, yet brown sugar yummy recipe:

Pecan Pie Ginger Cheesecake

refrigerated crust, softened

8 ounces cream cheese, softened

- 6 tablespoons sugar 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 egg 1/4 cup finely chopped crystallized ginger

Topping 2 tablespoons flour 1/4 cup butter, melted 3/4 cup firmly packed

- 1 teaspoon vanilla 2 eggs
- 2 cups pecan pieces


Heat oven to 350°F. Prepare pie crust as directed on package for one crust filled pie, using a nine inch glass pie pan or deep dish pie pan. In a medium bowl, combine cream cheese, sugar, 1/2 tsp vanilla and one egg; beat at medium speed until smooth. Stir in ginger. Spoon and spread filling in crust-lined pan.

In large bowl, combine flour and butter; mix well. Add brown sugar, 1 tsp. vanilla and two eggs; mix well. Stir in pecans. Carefully spoon mixture evenly over filling.

Bake at 350°F for 40-50 minutes or until centre is set and crust is golden brown.

Cool hour. one Refrigerate two hours or until thoroughly chilled. Store in fridge.

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
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Holiday message from the Base Commander

Your responsibility as a host this holiday season

o n e wants memories of a great



party to be marred by tragedy. Recent lawsuits indicate that you, as the host, may be held legally responsible if a guest leaves your home after consuming alcohol and gets into an accident. Protect yourself and your guests by following some of these tips to ensure everyone has a good time and arrives home safely:

•To think clearly and avoid potential problems, plan to drink minimally or not at all so that you can stay in control and look after your guests.

•Keep non-alcoholic beverages on hand for non-drinkers and designated drivers. Fruit juices, pop, mocktails, non-alcoholic punches are proven favourites with non-drinkers.

•Serve drinks yourself or designate a bartender instead of having an open bar as guests usually drink more when they serve themselves. Avoid serving doubles and keep a shot glass next to the bottles – good measurement makes all the difference.

• Put the liquor away at least an hour before

expect your guests 0 leave.

Finish off the evening by serving hot beverages and a tasty snack. Remember, too, that only time - and not coffee -can overcome the effects of alcohol.

•If someone is drinking too much, engage him or her in conversation, offer something to eat and provide a nonalcoholic drink. Find out how guests will be going home from the party. Promote the use of designated drivers and keep telephone numbers on hand for taxis. If designated drivers fail to attend as expected, arrange for guests to get a safe ride home with family members or encourage your guests to leave their cars at home and take public transportation, cabs or walk home. Be prepared to take away car keys if necessary.

If you can't get your guest home safely, insist that he or she stay overnight. A little embarrassment is a small price to pay to avoid a drinking and driving tragedy.

Supernanny secrets revealed

The Shilo MFRC has $oldsymbol{1}$ once again partnered with Child & Family Services of Western Manitoba to bring the Supernanny Secrets Revealed parenting program to Shilo. The Supernanny Secrets Revealed program, which includes the keys to successful parenting and which secrets work, is a six week program starting January 14. The program aims to teach parents effective skills to create an environment in which their children can learn respect, instill courage and build self esteem.

"We ran the program in the spring of 2009 and had an overwhelming response from the community," said Dana Thompson, Children's Services Coordinator for the MFRC. "The participants found the individual attention to challenging issues and solution based tools very effective to increasing their parenting skills and the overall happiness of their children."

The foundation of the program is to help individuals become more effective parents. It is often difficult for parents to know what style of par-

enting works best and this program aims to take the guess work out of being a good parent.

Through the use of communication to encourage cooperation and respect and the right ways to use natural and logical consequences, parents will develop a sense of responsibility and cooperation with their children. The course will also cover effective discipline techniques, teaching children how to manage their anger and the pros and cons of rewards and punishments.

The program will take place at the Shilo Com-

munity Centre on Thursdays starting January 14 – February 18 from 1:15pm - 3:45pm. The program will be presented by Val Caldwell of Child and Family Services of Western Manitoba.

Saskatchewan Scholarship of Honour for CF

In March of 2009 the Premier of Saskatchewan announced the Scholarship of Honour to recognize Saskatchewan men and women serving in the Canadian Forces. The value of the scholarship is \$5,000 and is available to returning soldiers and their families (spouse and children) and all may apply for the scholarship concurrently.


Also, congratulations to the new student council, Cody, Taylor, Nick, and Tamara. They are currently planning a hot dog day to raise money for student council.
