DND Ombudsman sheds light on his role

Providing a sounding board and solutions at the very top is how DND Ombudsman Pierre Daigle views his

During his first ever visit here, the military ombudsman spent several days in Shilo earlier this month speaking with military and civilian staff, as well as their families.

In an interview with the Shilo Stag following a first day session with military personnel, Daigle outlined his duties along with the desire to make those duties more widely known. He said his office was created in 1998 following the Somalia Affair as a means to provide more transparency and openness across

the military establishment.

A Governor in Council appointee, Daigle has been on the job since February, 2009. His plan is to visit all Bases and Wings across Canada before his term is up in three years. He feels it is important that anyone with a complaint can put a face on the solution provider.

"We tell them that we are here for them, that we help those who serve. My constituents are everyone in the service, all regular and retired service men and women, along with their families. Also civilians and their families, you can come and meet with us. We also help applicants at recruiting centres," he explains.

The DND Ombudsman said no

problem is too big or too small. His office in Ottawa has up to 60 on staff and each are equipped to handle DND concerns.

He reports only to the Minister of National Defence.

"I am independent of any chain of command. My mandate is from the Minister of National Defence. The only thing we can't address are those matters involving criminal activity and we refer those to the courts," he says.

"Whensomeone comestous, sometimes it's a matter of us telling them to do this or that. If at the end more is needed we can go in-depth to review the whole issue ... We exist for our constituents and maybe we can give them some relief, or some closure. Sometimes it takes time. But people need to know they can turn to us. We are here to help," Daigle adds.
At a meeting the following day with

New bunker gear for Shilo firefighters not only provides the ultimate in fire protection, but also caps off years of development here.

It was back in 2008 when DND firefighters from across Canada came to CFB Shilo with the idea to design new protective gear, according to Fire Chief Dennis Hurley. This new bunker gear is now standard issue for all DND firefighters

nationwide.

Shilo firefighter Dale Devlieger was eager to show off the near gear which is suited on all 43 SES personnel on Base. He appreciates the different design over the bunker gear he used to wear.

"Our new gear is easier to adjust. It is relatively the same weight but is much better as there is a separate outer shell and an thermal barrier on the inside. You need to be able to keep your gear clean and dry. With

our old equipment, water could get trapped inside," he states.

Made in Quebec by Innotex Inc., the new gear features more pockets and storage areas for radios and more. One item that hopefully will not have to be used is a real benefit.

"The Drag Rescue Device or DRD is used when a firefighter goes down. You just grab a loop on the back of his jacket and pull him out. With the old gear you had to grab whatever you could," Devlieger explains.

Each coat and pant combination costs about \$1,500. All firefighters undergo a box scan which measures the body to help provide an exact fit

Weighing in at 50 pounds, with another 25 pound for self contained breathing apparatus, the new gear is not light. But it gives firefighters one less thing to worry

about.

"There has been a good response from the guys here. It's a better design than what we had," Devlieger says.

Shilo in early February. identity, we ask first for your written consent.

"Last is credibility. Everything we do is fact-based and we will have access to everything. My constituents are all those in the military, serving and retired; all civilians; all families; and all foreign military attached to CF. Some 1,500 come through our office every year," Daigle informs. Reached by phone, fax,

email or regular mail, the military ombudsman said most cases are solved with information and a little education.

"We are a last resort if

you have exhausted all other avenues. Eighty to 85 percent of the time these matters are resolved at the first level of intake. After that it goes to a complaint resolution officer who is able to open some more doors. If it is a complex issue it goes to a director's investigation. I might do a systematic investigation on complex issues," Daigle says.
Following the

investigation a report is filed with the DND minister. Four weeks later that same ombudsman's report is released to the public (media).

"Everything I do is made public — it's a powerful tool ... When we do a report for DND we might give a year or two before doing a

follow-up," he says.

In a question and answer session with civilians the ombudsman answered queries ranging from daycare shortages to a reduction in workforce size. Daigle responded to the daycare question by saying similar concerns exist across the country. On the issue of a reduced civilian workforce, he pointed out it was a decision made in Ottawa

to cut 3,500 civilian jobs. "This is very frustrating to the commanders I have spoken to. It's annoying

that someone in Ottawa is deciding whether to hire someone in Shilo. This is a concern and we have to make a case for positions not to be removed," he states.

Afteransweringseveral other queries, Daigle said he believes in what he is doing and urged those with issues to contact his office.

Coast Guard ship now named for Capt Nichola Goddard

On Feb. 10, 2011, a moving ceremony was conducted at the National War Museum in Ottawa to mark an announcement by the Canadian Coast Guard of the decision to name its new Hero Class Mid-Shore Patrol Vessels in honour of fallen Canadian heroes.

Among them is one of our very own, Captain Nichola Goddard, who made the ultimate sacrifice in her role as Forward Observer in combat on May 17, 2006 in Afghanistan. She joins two World War One Victoria Cross winners who were previously honoured last year, along with Cpl Mark MacLaren (RCR), two RCMP members, two Coast Guard members, and one member of the Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO).

The Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Peter Mackay, delivered solemn remarks highlighting the sacrifices made by all these brave Canadian Heroes, singling out Captain Goddard's distinction as the first Canadian woman killed in combat.





26 Field Regt ensures Rogers Pass safe for travellers

On Jan. 13 at around 4:30 p.m., my duty phone rings. "Hello, Lieutenant Pham Op PALACI?" I answer. Our six day shooting marathon began at that moment.

Ŭpon return to the compound at 4 a.m. the next morning with 76 rounds down range and awake for about 20 hours, sleep became reduced to as little as three hours between shoots for the rest of the week.

With newspaper headlinessuchas "Deadly weekend in the Rockies" and "One person killed in Kootenays Avalanche" reported from other areas of the province, one would find it difficult to sleep with such a big responsibility to the safety of all travellers through Glacier National Park, our Area of Operation.

Without having such a severe avalanche season in recent years, road closures lasting anywhere from hours to days long, either make travellers feel safe or feel frustrated.

"I don't know why you guys keep closing the highway. They never hit the road," barks a transport truck driver to a Parks Canada flagger at a road block.

No more than five

minutes later, a rumble and huge powder cloud send everyone running their vehicle. into Our gun detachment, barely 500 metres away, shot MacDonald West Shoulder mountain face, bringing down an avalanche onto the Trans-Canada Highway of about 300 metres wide and four metres deep. the avalanche With separating us from the Rogers Pass summit, we shoot several more targets to secure the area for the plow trucks' four hour job ahead of them and we continue west to engage more targets.

In partnership with Parks Canada, this largest avalanche control program in the world named OP PALACI began in 1962. Parks Canada personnel know the recipe for a perfect avalanche. Their forecasting and daily snow analysis, along with our keen and efficient Gunners, come together as the perfect team for, what the Parks Canada folk like to call, the 'Snow War.' Operational dangers for all working along the closed highway are different every time. This year marked a close call for a Parks Canada staff member as he and his vehicle were swept away in an avalanche. Luckily, no one was

hurt.

Natural avalanches slide onto the highway during even avalanche control shoot. Sergeant McCauley's gun detachment experienced a natural snow dusting while moving to their next shooting position. He described it as a complete white out and had to slow down in order to stay on the road. Gun detachments were at times separated from each other by

avalanches that had come down onto the road. The Troop Sergeant Major, WO Carrasqueira, quickly became a second Command Post Officer allowing us both to fire the guns simultaneously, expediting engagement. Inclement weather was experienced from time to time and often changed from location to location which made shooting a challenge.

The holiday flew by

without our loved ones by our side and for some, it is their second Christmas away from home. For our Reservists from 5 Field Victoria, 15 Field Vancouver, 20 Field Edmonton and 26 Field Brandon, it was a voluntary decision. But we had each other, organized a great gift exchange event, traditional Soldier's Christmas dinner and celebrated the New Year with 'Auld Lang Syne' blaring through speakers.

Our operational rotation has two more weeks left and thus far, we have already put 544 rounds into the mountain side, the most in recent memory. Visits by people like Major-General Tabbenor (Chief of Reserves and Cadets), Major-General Semianiw (Commander Canada

Command) and Rear-Admiral Greenwood (Commander Joint Task Force Pacific) show the importance of Op PALACI and its future.

Extensive media interest involving hometown articles, plans CTV interviews for pitches for and documentary to channels like National Geographic and Discovery show the curiousity and interest the public has Avalanche Control. It is a unique and beneficial operation being run here in Rogers Pass and deserves attention to all Parks Canada staff and every one of our soldiers on the ground working day and night to create a safe passage along the Trans-Canada Highway.



All you have to do is register in the challenge. To be eligible, you must be a CF member (regular or reserve force) or a spouse of a CF member, or a DND, NPF or MFRC employee and at least 18 years of age.

If you have recently quit using tobacco (since September, 2009), you can still enter and take the challenge to remain tobacco-free. The



challenge is to not use tobacco from March 1 to March 31, 2011.

To be a supporter, you must meet any of the above criteria, and be a non-user of tobacco products. The supporter's primary role is to provide encouragement and support. Their secondary role is to certify that, to his or her knowledge, the candidate winner kept their commitment to not use tobacco during the month of March.

Only one registration form per participant will be accepted. A tobacco user must register

with two non-tobacco using support buddies.
