Quick action averts disaster as officers' mess flooded

The Grinch was unable to spoil a Christmas party for kids at the CFB Shilo officers' mess, but he put a damper on festive celebrations for officers last month.

"The children's Christmas party at the officers' mess had just wrapped up less than an hour before the pipe failed," recalled Maj Reg Sharpe, who arrived to Christmas ornaments from the tree floating throughout the main level.

"Fortunately, the Grinch had arrived too late to spoil the Christmas party."

How did Sharpe learn the officers' mess had flooded?

"It was discovered by the MPs who were dispatched to the officers' mess to investigate an alarm at approximately 1415 [hours]," said Sharpe. "Upon their arrival there was a steady stream of water pouring out underneath the main doors."

Damage inside, especially the main floor, is extensive, according to Sharpe.

"All flooring will have to be replaced," he said. "The ceiling, walls, built-in cabinetry [holding trophies] and lighting in the main entrance way and coat room were also destroyed.

"Because the flooding originated in the attic, insulation and components of the electrical system will also have to be replaced."

Following an investigation once clean-up started that same day last month, Sharpe was able to ascertain the cause.

"The cause of the flood was identified as a poorly insulated fire stand pipe in the attic which split due to cold temperatures," he said. "The pipe was located directly above the mens' coat room.'

Once the flooding was discovered by Military Police while answering the alarm, Sharpe said they contacted the Base fire hall .

"[They] dispatched their duty crew to the site within minutes. Inside of the main entrance, water was cascading from the ceiling across the entire width of the entrance. Within 15 minutes there was three to four inches of water throughout the main level, and the water was pouring into the basement.

Sharpe had a CE duty plumber and electrician called in. They shut off the water and electricity to the building for safety reasons.

According to Sharpe, the fire hall platoon chief, Mark Galatiuk, became the on-site commander and "did a stellar job of co-ordinating the movement of people within the officers' mess and ensuring their safety as ceilings were at risk of collapsing.

It did not take long for word to get out on the Base that the officers' mess had flooded.

"Within 30 minutes dozens of officers, from 1RCHA, followed shortly thereafter by officers from 2PPCLI, were mobilized under the direction of the adjutant [from] 1RCHA to begin moving furniture and historic items out of the building to an awaiting fleet of pickup trucks that shuttled the contents to L25, for drying and damage assessment."

He added, "The rapid arrival of officers and their efforts in emptying the building contents was directly responsible for the aversion of tens of thousands of dollars in damage to irreplaceable historic items."

Throughout the night following the flooding, a fire picket manned by officers from 2PPCLI and 1RCHA was established to ensure security of the building. Not all contents of the building were moved to L25

where they were cleaned and assessed for damages. "The Wolfe table is currently on display at the RCA

rarily stored in L25," said Sharpe. Officers are now using the Junior Ranks' mess, Tenne Club upstairs, until their building is repaired. Sharpe does not have a timeline for when it will re-

"The repair work began the day of the flood, that evening and, throughout the night, Bee-Clean Janitorial Services was remediating the standing water from the mess.

"Immediately the following morning, Engineering Services staff began removing fallen debris from failed ceilings and walls, assessing the condition of the electrical and fire alarm systems and removing the water-logged flooring throughout the main floor of the officer's mess."

Meanwhile, during block leave the heat was turned up in the officers' mess and the floors were given the opportunity to dry out. Does Sharpe have a plan for the indoor restoration of the building?


"Repairs will be phased in beginning with removal of damaged/water-logged materials [which has been completed]," he said, "followed by replacement of the damaged walls, ceilings and cabinetry ... replacement of all flooring; painting of the main level; and finally the re-introduction of all furniture and historic items back into the mess."

If work goes according to plans, Sharpe would like to see it open by late fall.

Sharpe would like to thank the members of the senior NCOs' mess, who left their own children's Christmas party to assist at the officers' mess.

He'd also like to offer kudos to the Shilo and Region Service Club.

"They laid on a hot supper at L25 for the helpers who worked throughout the afternoon and evening emptying the contents out of the officers' mess and ferrying them to L25."

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

PMQ alarms being replaced

With the dawn of a new year, Shilo's community council gathered once again.

Council members are looking forward to a busy and productive 2013 with several projects, events, and programs to be implemented.

In addition to council, other units on Base are looking at a jam-packed year as well.

According to Jodi Laba, CFHA will kick off a RHUwide smoke-alarm replacement program.

"The majority of our houses will be getting their smoke and carbon monoxide alarms replaced," said Laba. "It is a big project and we will be needing to get into all of those houses. We're looking for people to be co-operative."

Replacement of the smoke and carbon monoxide detectors is a step toward simplifying current issues with detectors.

By swapping to one exclusive make and model of alarm, troubleshooting and replacement will be simplified.

The goal for the new alarms is that defects will be fewer. Laba does warn, however, there will likely be some defects as CFHA is installing such a large number of units. CFHA is asking residents for co-operation during the installation in the near future. No date has been established until stock has arrived.

With block leave recently wrapping up, CFHA would also like to reiterate the importance of selecting a house-sitter before leaving your RHU for an extended period of time.

"Just a reminder of the importance of having a house-sitter when you are away as well as to keep your heat on at a reasonable temperature," stressed Laba.

"We've had a house freeze-up this year and the damages are huge. I can't even give a cost estimate right now. It is incredible."

Laba also warned that by not fulfilling the housesitter requirement, insurance policies may be voided leaving the occupant with hefty repair bills.

Health Promotion will also see an active 2013 under new director Shelly Moore.

With several programs available to CF members and their families, Health Promotion will be a beehive of activity.

Unlike previous years, the department will not offer the March 1 I Quit! program. The Butt-out program will remain intact and is currently running.

"We have appointments Tuesday afternoons and Friday mornings if those don't work for you, then we

can work something out," said Moore. "Lots of people make a New Year's resolution to quit smoking."

She stressed that prescriptions for tobacco-cessation aids are available free of cost for military members who register with the program.

Meanwhile, in other council business discussed:

• The community council will make an active effort to bring public recycling bins to CFB Shilo. In the near future, test areas will be determined and bins will be placed for public use. Council wants to see the recycling program active by this summer.

• The Fitness, Sports, and Recreation department is hosting a ski trip to Asessippi Jan. 26. Registration and transportation to the slopes is free. Only costs to those registered will be equipment rental which will be offered at a discounted group rate.

• Cross-country ski trails are now open at CFB Shilo. Equipment can be rented at Gunner Arena.

• Despite extensive water damage, the MFRC's daycare services are continuing. The MFRC wants to be back to "business as usual" by Jan. 18 with all services restored to regular operation.

• Operation Red Nose was extremely successful. Some minor changes will be made to accommodate the 2013 holiday season, but otherwise it is expected the Red Nose program will return this Base. A full report will follow.

• CANEX will have flowers, chocolates, and cards for Valentine's Day. Floral arrangements will be provided by Petals West. Watch for details in CANEX for further information.

• Winterfest plans are coming together. The sports day as well as a day of family activities. The two-day event starts Feb. 8.

• The Base dog park's cleanliness continues to be an issue. A reminder — pick up your dog feces in all areas on the Base, besides the dog park.

• The Shilo Ceramics Club had a successful ornament painting day at the Sprucewoods Wildlife Club.

The next meeting of council will be held Feb. 6 at 10:30 a.m.

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Anyone can be affected by bed bugs. * Everyone can stop their spread.

Bed bugs are not a health hazard but they can create a lot of stress. Learn how you can protect yourself and help stop the spread of bed bugs.

What are bed bugs?

Bed bugs are flat, brown insects – about the size of an apple seed – that feed on human blood. They cannot fly or jump. They usually hide during the day where people sleep or sit. However, they can come out at any time of day if needing to feed. Reactions to bites range from no reaction at all, to itchy red bumps.

How bed bugs can get into your home.

Bed bugs can enter anyone's home. They are carried in on items like luggage, furniture and other household goods. If you find dark, reddish brown stains or black droppings on your mattress, box spring or pillow, there is a very good chance you have bed bugs.

How to keep bed bugs out of your home.

Search any used items, particularly mattresses, box springs and upholstered furniture for bed bugs before bringing them into your home. Look carefully in all seams and cracks. Use a magnifying glass and a flashlight. If you are unsure about whether or not bed bugs are hiding in a piece of your furniture, the heat from a hair dryer will force them out in the open.


What if you're renting?

If you find bed bugs in your apartment, your landlord is responsible for getting rid of them. You must co-operate with your landlord regarding instructions on how to prepare your home before and after any extermination.

Reunion for writer was learning experience

Shilo Stag It had the feel of a high school reunion, with former teachers and pupils catching up in a social atmosphere.

But this reunion had a twist.

The men swapping stories and catching up since they last met in 2009 were actually taking part in the four-day Royal Canadian Artillery (RCA) reunion last summer.

"Why do we come back?" asked LCol (ret'd) Rick Wilson while watching RCA alumni gather for the meet and greet held at the Drill Hall. "It allows us to relive the old days, rekindle friendship and recharge."

He added, "I have lots of good memories of my days here on the base. Anything bad, well that is long forgotten by me."

Part of the organizing committee for the 2012 RCA reunion, Wilson said he has come full circle when it comes to his attachment to CFB Shilo. He did his basic training on the Base in the early 60s, then retired here after his stint as Base Commander from 1996 to 2001.

He chose a career in the army for a simple reason when asked about his chosen career path. "I looked at it as a challenge," he said. "The military

had just started peacekeeping in '63 in Cyprus. "Looking back, for me, there's a sense of satisfaction

with being part of the Afghan operation, seeing the military take steps to keep up with changing times, by adding a weapon like the M777.

"When I look back to what we were storing in Europe, that was dumb ammo ... it was not sophisticated when you fired it. Your shot just came down somewhere."

With changing technology, and today's weapons, like the M777, Wilson said the gunners can reduce collateral damage with more pinpoint accuracy.

Looking back on his role as Base Commander, Wilson acknowledged running a Base had its challenges because of what was happening in Canada.

"It was different times for sure ... the military was downsizing. With our budgets there were tough times. The government was not interested in finding funding for us. That was our military of the day," he offered.

Wilson drew on his own creativity, and ingenuity, to come up with solutions for operating CFB Shilo under his watch.

"Our operations were tailored to what you could af-ford to do," he recalled. "The system was unforgiving when it came to overspending.

At 65, Wilson recalled having four stops on the Base, including the last as its commander.

Being part of the reunion allowed him to run into one of his former instructors, 82-year-old Saskatchewan-born Hank Walker, who had a 35-year career in

the Canadian Forces. "I started in '56 with an anti-aircraft battery in Pic-ton [Ontario]," offered Walker, who grinned mischievously when asked what it was like teaching soldiers the art of artillery during peace times. "I came to Shilo in '62 to instruct, where I first had

Rick as a student. You had to be tough so they would be able to handle what they were learning.

There were no kid gloves used for students under Walker's tutelage.

"I guess I did a good job instructing, when you see where Rick Wilson ended up in the military," he said. 'I pride myself in what I accomplished in the military, from going to CFB Gagetown in 1970 to the combat school, to what my students took away from their instruction."

Last summer's RCA reunion brought alumni from as far away as Lahr, Germany, with Ken Gardiner making the trip to Canada. Don Welsh came from Durham, Ont. British Columbia residents included Bill Armstrong from Chilliwack, and Bill MacMillan from Qualicum Beach. Reg Sugg left Moncton, New Brunswick, while Dennis McCarthy arrived from Cold Lake, Alberta.

Retired sergeant Harold Oake, now 77, is a native of Fogo, Newfoundland. He recalled fondly his days with 3RCHA J Bty since his retirement in '76.

"These reunions are a lot of fun," he said between

sips on a cold beverage, while looking at the M777. "It was only natural I'd go into the military when I think back on it. I had family in the RCAF and army during the Second World War, while my grandfather's dad was in a forestry unit in the First World War.'

Oake recalled his basic training in '55 as though it was yesterday, and remembered an instructor who he emulated years later.

"We had a sergeant there who had a big influence on me in my own career," he said. "He was a fair guy when he dealt with you. So I

took that from him and used it in my own military career.'

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Wounded Warriors trek takes soldiers overseas

I am writing today to help bring awareness to the mental health issues facing some of our soldiers who have returned from battle only to face their own personal struggles with mental illness and, in particular, Post-Traumatic

Stress Disorder (PTSD). Although wide spread during past Canadian wars, since the completion of Canada's combat mission in Afghanistan the recognition and the acceptance of PTSD has become better known amongst the Canadian public.

PTSD symptoms can take months or years to surface, can be severe, and can include hyper-vigilance, nightmares, sleeplessness, explosive anger.

explosive anger. This year's Wounded Warriors Canada Big Battlefield Bike Ride, from Paris to London, England runs May 27 to June 2. Participants will cover a distance of 595 kilometres.

This is the second consecutive year Wounded Warriors Canada has offered this event. Last year,

they took 21 soldiers through famous battlefields in France.

The six-day journey took our veterans through famous battlefields such as Caen, Dieppe, Amiens, Arras, Ypres and Dunkirk, capped off with a special ceremony at Vimy Ridge.

The trip proved to be a great resource for the Soldiers recovering from the common problems associ-

ated with PTSD — including isolation, depression, avoidance and anxiety.

The Wounded Warriors bike Big Battlefield Ride requires participants to be physically active — activity and exercise can have a powerful impact on mental health problems, such as PTSD and depression, along with many other physical health benefits.

I know that cycling fights depression. It's that euphoric feeling you get from the rush and exertion, which is quite exhilarating.

The training leading up to the bike ride, and the bike ride itself, allows us to set goals and create healthy competition within ourselves.


I expect the experience of the Big Battlefield Bike Ride will complement our lives, and our recovery from the injuries we've suffered — helping decrease our symptoms of PTSD and discover a path to reconnect with our communities.

The riders from the Brandon area are from a variety of rank levels, with some of us having

been to places like Cyprus, the former Yugoslavia, and most recently Afghanistan. Some are still serving and some have been medically released.

As part of this experience, we are trying to raise \$15,000 to give back to Wounded Warriors Canada, so they can continue to help our soldiers in need.





O'Kelly principal understands unique lifestyle of military kids

Hello, my name is Angela Voutier and I am the principal of O'Kelly School here in at CFB Shilo. I am originally from a small town called Hartland, New Brunswick and attended the University of New Brunswick for my Bachelor of Education degree.

I began my teaching career in Northern Ontario in an isolated First Nations community where I spent four years teaching everything from Grade 2 to Grade 10.

Since then, I have spent more time in northern communities in Ontario, Saskatchewan, and Nunavut teaching at all levels and in all variety of subject areas. I also spent two years as a teaching principal in Mobert, Ont., prior to having my own children. I just finished my Master's degree in Education at Brandon University.

I moved to Brandon in 2004 from Northern Saskatchewan, and taught Grades 9 to 12 English, as well as advanced placement English at Vincent Massey High School until the fall of 2010, when I was appointed principal at O'Kelly. My husband Bob is a teacher at Neelin High School. I come from a large family, having 10 siblings, and have three children ages 12, 16 and 18.

O'Kelly School is a dual-track K-8 English and K-4 French Immersion. Our catchment area includes the Base, but also consists of rural property, subdivided acreages and two trailer park areas within seven kilometres of the school.

This includes the community area of Sprucewoods which is just outside the north gate of the Base.

Our enrolment is currently 230 students and has been gradually increasing during the last three years.

Our school was built in 1957 and was originally administered by the Department of National Defence. In 1994, the school became part of Brandon School Division.

The staff at O'Kelly is a mixture of

enthusiastic and dedicated new and experienced teachers and educational assistants who strive to provide a stable, respectful learning environment for all students at our school.

We understand the unique lifestyle of our students and their families in a military community and want to be part of the wider community support system.

Our school goals are focused around developing key foundational skills in literacy and numeracy as well as promoting wellness, positive school spirit, and good citizenship in our students and school community. Highlights from 2012 for MPs

With the advent of a new year, it seems appropriate to highlight the successes in community safety from 2012.

Despite some unfortunately high-profile incidents occurring on CFB Shilo, or involving members of the defence team off the Base in our neighbouring communities,

last year represented great successes in both crime prevention and reduction, as well as outreach through community policing.

Impaired driving charges the past 12 months represented a very substantial decrease from 2011, a decrease of more than 75 per cent.

Incidents of simple theft, violence and other liquor offences all demonstrated noticeable, statistically-relevant decreases. While the MP will always work with partners to decrease any crime trends — the numbers from 2012 are impressively low.

Additionally, the Community Police Centre opened at 30 Quebec Cres. and became home to car seat inspections, bike registries, welcome information, OPERATION RED NOSE, and a series of other seasonal campaigns.

The challenge for the CFB Shilo community in 2013 is to maintain this positive momentum.

Crime rates are always influenced heavily by community attitudes and support of peaceful environments.

Maintaining a zero tolerance of impaired driving remains key to keeping streets safe for all users. Reduced impaired driving rates cannot be an invitation to apathy or waning

interest in providing safe transportation options.

Additionally, crime which does occur in Shilo is what is described as 'crime of opportunity.'

This means the crime occurs because it was easy to commit. This is best demonstrated with incidents of theft and minor vandalism.

To avoid crimes of opportunity from occurring community members can

take some very simple steps to keep themselves and property safe. Keep homes and sheds locked when

unoccupied or supervised. Use lockers in the gym, whether on or off base.

Most importantly continue to be proactive and contact the Military Police when you see anything suspicious at 204-765-3000 ext 3337.

Our promise to you during the next 12 months is to continue to provide high quality police services to the units of CFB Shilo, and the greater community.

Our operations will be based on the priorities of local Commanders and influenced by community need.

As opportunities arise we will continue to be engaged members of the community to both understand the needs and wants of the community, and to provide as much information as practicable on safety items.

The next year promises to be a dynamic year for CFB Shilo. Continue to work with us in keeping this Base among the safest communities in Manitoba for another year running.

It is fun to look back and see all the neat things we got to do and the amazing places we were able to visit.


From the in-service days, girls' nights, boys' night, to cooking classes, Birthday Club, Summer Fun, and a whole lot more we had a great time exploring last year.

Bragging rights to the strongest 1RCHA soldier pound for pound — goes to MBdr Dustin Tymchak. He finished first overall during 1RCHA's powerlifting competition held before Christmas.

Dubbed Heavy Loader, the half-day event used 1RCHA equipment and was open to all ranks. Even a 2PPCLI soldier dropped by and tested his mettle among the Gunners.

"As 1RCHA continues to develop the culture of fitness and reward athletic excellence, it is important we highlight the members of 1RCHA who excel at strength training," offered organizer Capt Joseph O'Donnell, who also competed.

"To be powerful is very much the essence of being

a Gunner, from the dismounted FOO who scales sixfoot walls while carrying 100 pounds of kit on their back, to the Gunners manhandling a 10,000-pound howitzer, or loading 100-pound projectiles, there is little room for physical weakness in our job description."

He added, "That said, there are limited athletic competitions that reward solely physical strength, despite being highly recognized for its importance."

Following MBdr Tymchak, the rest of the top-five featured runner-up MBdr Clinton Gingrich, while third through fifth went to Bdr Chad Terry, Bdr Hugo Gallant-Boulet and Gnr Pierre Poulin.

According to organizers keeping track of the weightlifting prowess shown by the soldiers in competition, there was less than two per cent difference in scores between first and second-place.

The winners of the separate weight categories were the following:

Lightweight Bdr Gallant-Boulet; middleweight Bdr Terry; heavyweight MBdr Tymchak; female MBdr Stephanie McNeil.

1RCHA's Heavy Loader competition was divided into three weight categories for both male and female competitors, and used a calculator to determine the relative strength and identify the pound-for-pound strongest soldier in 1RCHA to encourage all weight classes to enter.

O'Donnell said the competition was held to promote physical fitness, as well as offer a platform for soldiers to set new goals and to assist in 1RCHA soldiers winding down prior to Christmas leave.

Course needs students

Stag Special

Are you a manager or supervisor interested in labour relations?

If so, there's a two-day course starting Feb. 12 at CFB Shilo's MPTF in room six. The course runs from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily, with a lunch break at noon. The course has room for a maximum

of 20 participants. This course is meant to provide civilian managers and supervisors as well as military members who supervise or manage civilian employees with an understanding of how to manage within

the labour relations environment. It provides knowledge of the framework, precedent, parameters and principles needed to practice effective labour relations in the Department of National Defence (DND).

Specific attention is paid to management roles and responsibilities; the role of unions in the workplace; employee performance issues; workplace accommodation and the duty to accommodate; the discipline process; interpreting and applying collective agreements; the grievance and alternative dispute resolution processes; and strike management and essential services. Is there a target audience for this course?

This course is intended for DND managers and supervisors (military and civilian), who manage or supervise civilian employees (public service employees), including all levels of supervisors and managers.

This is not a developmental course and will be limited to participants who either already manage or supervise civilian employees or those who are about to due to a change of position.

Candidates will be vetted to those who meet the target audience. Participation will be confirmed.

Instructors for the course are Shannon Barnes-Girouard and Cara Callbeck.
