# General adjusts to hectic pace

Just a little more than 11 weeks in his new position, General Tom Lawson is getting accustomed to its hectic pace.

Trying to divide time as needed and follow the tight schedule isn't always easy when you're Chief of the Defence Staff.

Gen Lawson looked comfortable in his new office, surrounded by personal military memorabilia spanning a 37-year career, as he chatted about himself and the way forward for the CF.

He sees a positive future ahead for current serving members and future recruits.

First trip overseas as CDS

Gen Lawson and the CF CWO, Chief Petty Officer, 1st Class Robert Cléroux, recently returned from his first trip overseas as CDS visiting the troops, and both are proud to see CF members carrying out their roles with such vigour and drive.
Gen Lawson drew energy from seeing the great work being

done by the deployed men and women of the CF.

"They [CF members] are standing up the Afghan troops at

such a great rate; they are able to move them [Afghans] from basic training into more advanced training, professionally and

quickly. They're so well positioned to do what they do, they are literally working themselves out of jobs," he said.

The CDS also visited HMCS Regina in the Arabian Sea, his first time on ship since he was an RMC recruit. He arrived that he going the ship of the ship o there by flying the ship's CH-124 Sea King helicopter, although there was some banter about him not coming too close to the ship for his fly by.

"And I think that was probably advisable," he said with a

"Spending a day onboard the ship was tremendous," he added proudly. "Seeing our men and women taking Regina through her paces was an enormously heartening thing."

What about the evolving role of the CF? Gen Lawson explained how he sees the role of the CF pro-

tecting Canadians at home evolving.

"I think it is less about evolution in terms of readiness and more about evolution in terms of how we link with like-minded groups in other areas of government and outside of govern-

# CDS Tom Lawson has his eyes on the horizon

From the front

And just as the CF has proven itself in combat abroad, it has also fought fires, floods, and hurricanes here at home, and has assisted with security at the Olympics, G8 and G20, working closely with the RCMP, Public Safety, other government and non-government departments.

"This tie together has developed an interdependence that's helped us to not only get to know each other — the person at the other end of the phone before the challenging things happen, but also in a way that has shown how we can help each to the greatest effect ... that's where I think the evolution will continue, our linkage to other likeminded groups."

In this time of budget reductions, belt tightening to identify efficiencies and finding new ways of doing business, the Defence Renewal Team has been hard at work studying the subjects indepth.

"This team was started before I came in, and I think it's brilliant," he said. "We've had budget challenges in the past, but now we have to refine how we do things ... there is very little fat, and while this is true, the Defence Renewal Team is not looking at whether there is fat, but how we can better refine the ways we do things across the Army, Navy and Air Force.'

Staying on the topic of cuts and reallocating resources to the front line, the phrase "more tooth, less tail" is being used, but Gen Lawson doesn't feel this is a good descriptor.

"Having been a fighter pilot ... together with my sailor friends, tank drivers, and artillery officers, we

are the 'tooth' out there, protecting Canadian interests, and it was fun to talk like that before," he said.

'And when you become part of the very support fabric that allows the men and women of the Canadian Armed Forces to do the things they do, you see it from the other side, you see the linkages, and it becomes less like an animal with teeth and a tail wagging and more like a team with many players working to the same end.

Gen Lawson explained how the CF finds the funds to reinvest in a

place that puts more capabilities on the ramp and in the field. "I think the way you do that in the months ahead is by looking at those processes that have worked well to shelter us from risk, and then find ways to accept a bit more risk and do things more efficiently. And that, I think, is going to be the way we meet the mandate of maintaining and delivering on those

capabilities required to give the government options when a need arises.

Defence Priorities and the Canada First Defence Strategy Defence Priorities and the Canada First Defence Strategy give DND/CF some clear direction and a way ahead as Canadians expect that capacities, capabilities and readiness will be at their highest levels.

And even with many budget restrictions, the CF will continue to invest more dollars in these priorities.

"Even through tough budget restraints," we will continue to invest in readiness and training," he reaffirmed. The CFDS was put in place in 2008 and largely gave the CF clear path forward, with a focus on do-

mestic capabilities and the Arctic. While those core missions were never forgotten, they did receive less public attention while the CF was involved in combat

operations in Afghanistan.
"So, I don't think the Defence priorities have changed, but with the end of the combat mission, this will give us more time to focus more clearly on what we were told in 2008.

When asked what his most rewarding job to date has been, Gen Lawson said he could pick any of seven or eight tours. Like many CF members, he has had

operational and leadership positions which have been interspersed with traditional staff jobs.

While he is able to claim a pretty good initial feel for his present position, Gen Lawson knows there will be some challenges to be tackled and rewards to be savoured in the years to come.

"But it's starting out extremely well, very interesting and challenging," he said.

He recalled with a smile his early days of flying a CF-104 over the German countryside and the excellent opportunities he's had in his leadership roles, but there are two roles that stand out.

"I would say either my job commanding 8 Wing, where I had one wonderful year, or my two years commanding the Royal Military College, which was pure leadership at a place with 1,000 of our finest Canadian youth and hundreds of highly motivated Canadian officers, are the highlights.

Gen Lawson knew how busy the CDS office would be, but said he is invigorated by the pace.

"I knew my schedule would be packed, and this has taken some getting use to."

This busy pace has led him to his New Year's reso-

"I will continue to enhance my personal fitness so I can lengthen my days," he said.

## CFHA ask PMQ resident to prepare for melt

It may not look like spring outside, but the new season is just around the corner.

With heavy snowfall throughout the winter, Shilo residents will have a few challenges come spring time.

CFHA is asking residents to prepare for the melt. "I know it's hard given all the snowfall we've had, but we are asking people to have a little space between their home and the snow so it doesn't go straight to the basement," said Jodi Laba of CFHA. "We don't have a problem with leaky basements in Shilo, in general, but we do get a few and the fewer we have, the better."

Also to be expected this spring will be localized

flooding in the streets and between drainage holes. A reminder from Shilo's mayor Maj Reg Sharpe proceed with extra caution and discretion as well as to be patient with the melt. Most of the localized flooding experience on Shilo's streets will be unavoidable.

"We finally have proper winter parking signage on the Base as of about a month ago," explained Capt Dane Nicholson. "We have been aggressive lately and we have towed about 22 vehicles.


- clearly know your minimum monthly cost in both advertising and contracts

- cancel at any time with a reasonable cancellation charge
- stop paying your fees when your phone is being repaired, if it is under warranty and no replacement is offered
- · get 60 days notice before your contract expires

# LAV ride answers reporter's questions

A LAV III weighs approximately 17,237 kilograms. My Honda Civic weighs less than a 10th of a LAV

Riding in a combat-ready vehicle that is 23 feet long, nearly nine feet tall and just as wide as it is tall is a stark difference from the daily puttering I do in my comparatively miniature Honda.

Last summer, Capt Ching Cheung invited myself and former Stag staffer Quinn Roberts for a cruise in

Manned by MCpl William Vannest of Base maintenance, our LAV ride took us in and around Shilo

over trails, through fields, and through parts of CFB Shilo I didn't know existed — parts my car would and could not go. Ever.

Going on a LAV ride answered questions I've wondered about since first seeing a LAV on the move more than

For the life of me, I always wondered why people ride with their heads out of the hatches. I've always wondered how you deal with branches, weather, bugs, and wind.

Turns out with ballistic glasses and helmets it's not half bad. For those of us who are prone to motion sickness, riding with your head poking out the hatch can also help save your stomach.

I also learned that the Forces personnel you see popping out the top are actually standing. For whatever reason, I assumed their seat was that high.

I guess I hadn't considered where they should sit with the hatches down.

When actually sitting in the turret seat, there are tiny sight windows to look out of and a large selection of buttons, levers, and what I am sure are sights for the weapon system.

I was definitely grateful to be allowed to stand.

Riding over bumps, up hills, down hills, around curves and corners while standing on a little seat does test your balance and co-ordination. It was a challenge for Quinn and myself to take photos and remain upright.

Taking photos with one hand is a skill I have yet to

Bouncing around in the LAV gave me new insight

into how exhausting it could be to travel in a LAV for extended periods of time.

Bouncing for a few hours straight could be quite tiresome. Bouncing with the hatches down, I am sure, is no better.

Battling bouncing and dreaded motion sickness while trying to work radios, take notes, or even maintain conversation over the loud engine would be about it for me.

If you're on the spouse side of this life, when your better half comes home and claims exhaustion from riding in a LAV, it's likely true. I used to scoff and

wonder how you could be tired from riding around here and there all week in the field.

I have a better understanding now. It is not like cruising around in a car

I suppose I could only liken it to riding in a car with flat tires down a bumpy dirt road with your head sticking out of the sunroof. That would not even be an accurate comparison, I am sure, because I've never rode in a car with my head out of the sunroof.

There aren't many amenities either. No comfy, cushy, heated seats. No road-noise reduction. Not even win-

Now I understand why the field is exhausting — the travel alone would make me des-

perate for a nap.

Our LAV ride was about an hour including a quick stop to swap out seats. From experience, I can say that riding out to the training area takes about that long. A troop's LAV ride doesn't stop there.

While challenging from a photography perspective, a LAV ride is also enlightening.

A LAV ride is enlightening to the unique experience of those who travel in a LAV all day and a complete and total challenge for photos, it is also wildly enter-

I imagine the novelty wears off quickly, but for firsttimers like Quinn and I, it was a blast.

I look forward to several more rides in military vehicles with the advent of 2013.

Let's face it, it's not every day that you get to be in one of the biggest vehicle roaming the roads.

## Soldiers refresh their skills

1RCHA Headquarters and Services Battery Commander Maj Moon has emphasised the philosophy that it is paramount for all members to take time to practice and refresh basic soldiering skills.

In keeping with this philosophy, Headquarters and Services Battery took part in an annual winter indoctrination exercise called Exercise Brass Monkey.

This exercise provided members with that opportunity, in conjunction with a review of cold-weather training.

Ex Brass Monkey was meant to give troops, who would not otherwise have exposure to basic winter warfare, a chance to refresh their soldiering skills in a cold-weather setting.

A focus on learning and education during the exercise allowed the troops to train and learn in cold weather operations.

The exercise began at N133, with the Battery snowshoeing out into the training area with rucksacks and toboggans. Upon arrival at the site, the troops set up 10-man tents, stoves, lanterns, and practiced track discipline.

As the day progressed, the troops completed four lanes of training.

One lane was devoted to practicing section attacks. This lane gave members preparing for PLQ the chance to practice leading a section attack, and junior members the opportunity to participate.

The second lane was a review of the uses and construction of cold-weather improvised shelters. A leanto and wall shelter with a fire was built for demonstra-

The third lane was a lesson and familiarization with trip flares. Troops who had limited experience with them were able to set up the trip flares and pull the

The fourth lane was an introduction to trapping animals and locating food in a winter environment. Various types of traps and snares were presented and demonstrated.

Nutritional significance of local wildlife and plants were also discussed.

Upon completion of the lanes, troops performed patrols in sections. The patrol served two functions.

The first function was to prepare potential PLQ candidates for their course, and the second function was to allow less experienced members to practice the principles of section attacks.

The patrol scenario involved a recce and an attack by a mounted enemy. Troops preparing for PLQ issued orders and led the patrols.

For some of them, this was their first experience in this role. The scenario offered an idea of how a patrol is supposed to run and simultaneously allowed froops to get a sense of what to expect on a PLQ course.

Throughout the patrol, the officers and NCMs running the scenario presented excellent teaching points

As Maj Moon noted, many have "day jobs" which occupy a great deal of time. Despite that, it is vital that basic soldiering skills and basic winter warfare be maintained.

# BED BUGS

# Be careful buying used furniture

Many of us consider the old adage "night, night, sleep tight, don't let the bed bugs bite" a quaint nursery rhyme no longer applicable in the 21st Century.

Not so. Bed bugs are making a major comeback in part due to increasing international travel and resistance to pesticides.

What are bed bugs?

Bed bugs are insects that, as adults, have oval-

shaped bodies with no wings.

Prior to feeding, they are about quarter inch long and flat as paper. After feeding, they turn dark red and become bloated. Eggs are whitish, pear-shaped, about the size of a pinhead and are almost impossible to see on most surfaces. Clusters of 10 to 50 eggs can be found in cracks and crevices.

Bed bugs have a one-year life span during which time a female can lay 200 to 400 eggs depending on food supply and temperature.

What do bed bugs feed on?

Bed bugs prefer to feed on human blood, but will also bite mammals and birds.

Bed bugs bite at night, and will bite all over a human body, especially around the face, neck, upper torso, arms and hands.

Bed bugs can survive up to six months without feeding and thus stay in their hiding places and can

travel long distances and survive in suitcases, clothing, vehicles, aircraft, cruise ships and other modes of transportation.

Both male and female bed bugs bite.

Can I get sick from bed bugs?

There are no known cases of infectious disease transmitted by bed bug bites.

Most people are not aware that they have been bitten but some people are more sensitive to the bite and may have a localized reaction.

Scratching the bitten areas could lead to infection. How do I prevent bed bugs from entering my home?

• Although even the cleanest homes and hotels can have bed bugs, regular house cleaning, including vacuuming your mattress, can help to prevent an infestation.

Clean up clutter to help reduce the number of places bed bugs can hide.

• Be careful when buying used furniture or clothes. Make sure to inspect the used item, and feel free to ask the retailer if the items were checked for bed bugs.

• Use caution when bringing home used furniture or clothes from the curb side. These items may be infested with bed bugs.

When travelling take the following precautions:

• Inspect the room and furniture: inspect all cracks and crevices of the mattress and box spring, and look for blood spots or live insects. Request a different

room if you find evidence of beg bugs.

• Protect your luggage: keep all belongings in your luggage and wrap your luggage in

plastic to help prevent bed bugs from entering your luggage. Keep luggage on the shelf or away from the floor.

• Protect the bed: move the bed away from the wall, tuck in all bed sheets and keep blankets from touching the floor.

• Upon returning home: keep your luggage in an isolated area of your home, such as the garage. Inspect the luggage. Wash all your clothes in the hottest water possible and put them in a hot dryer for 20 minutes.

What can I do if I have bed bugs in my home?

Bedbugs are very hard to get rid of. If you do have bedbugs, it is strongly recommended that you hire a licensed professional pest control operator.

Professional pest control operators can use a variety of tools to control bedbugs.

These include liquid insecticide sprays, aerosol insecticide sprays, insecticidal dusts, diatomaceous earth, pressurized carbon dioxide snow, and steam and heat treatments.

Whichever treatment is used, it will only be effective if physical control methods and preventative measures are used together.

# Golfers can expect changes on links

With the advent of another golf season, Shilo Country Club (SCC) general manager Scott Ramsay cannot wait for the snow to melt away.

"There will be some noticeable changes and upgrades taking place once again during the 2013 season," reported Ramsay in the SCC's spring newsletter. "I am optimistic that opening day will be April 12, weather permitting of

According to Ramsay, the SCC management and CFB



Shilo are continuing to work towards renovating golf facilities to include a much larger pro-shop, banquet area, and to better accommodate the winter golf school.

"This is a very large, expensive and complicated project that remains in the planning stages, but moving along, albeit slowly, in the right direction," he said.

"We will keep you informed on the status of this renovation as the required initial upgrades take place, and we are in a position to actually renovate.

In other golf news, the SCC has a shortage of electric cart storage space.

"We do not have the option of creating more electric spaces until such time as there is an upgrade to our hydro service," offered Ramsay.

"The SCC board has decided to keep electric cart storage rates at \$165 until May 21."

Every member who currently has an electric storage spot, will retains their spot for the upcoming golf season provided they pay \$165 for that spot by May 21.

After May 21, the rate for an electric spot will jump to \$200. Gas cart storage will remain at \$125 for the season.

"The SCC would appreciate everyone with cart storage paying for it by May 21 at the latest, as we are always faced with trying to accommodate and organize new carts into our storage plan," he said.

Meanwhile, the SCC offers an alternative to owning and storing personal golf carts — \$600 per season will get you an unlimited seat on a SCC golf cart. New and even older golf carts are expensive to purchase and maintain.

'The SCC is offering you the use of a fleet golf cart that

will always be fuelled or charged and ready to go without you ever having to worry about whether your batteries will last a round or bringing out some gas to fill your cart," noted Ramsay.

"I am quite certain if you do the math on purchase price, fuel, annual maintenance and storage costs and depreciation and compare that to our annual cart rental fee, it might be a worthwhile option."

Golfers this season will also notice changes on the 18th hole, according to Ramsay.

"The green on the 18th hole will be worked on throughout the spring and summer, with plans for it to be completed and in play by September. There will be some renovation work taking place on the blue/white tee on No. 9, the blue/ white tee on No. 14, and the blue/white tee on No. 17 at different times throughout the season."

SCC staff will also work to improve the blemishes on the new No. 7 and No. 2 tees.

There will be new tee signs in place on all 18 holes on or shortly after opening day.

Ramsay acknowledged the current outdated black, polished granite maps which have been bolted to the grey granite slabs for almost two decades will be replaced with more accurate and aesthetically appealing signage.

"It is something that will be very noticeable and after years of researching a variety of options, we are very fortunate to finally be able to do it in a quality and affordable manner," he said.

## **Notice of Public Hearing**

#### TO REVIEW MAXIMUM ALLOWABLE CHARGES AND FEES FOR PAYDAY LOANS

PURSUANT to *The Consumer Protection Act* (Act) (C.C.S.M.2006 c.200) the Manitoba Public Utilities Board (Board) will conduct a public hearing to review charges and fees for payday loans and related matters in order to make a report to the Minister. Specifically Sec. 164 of the Act provides:

- 164(2) Within three years after the first regulation under clause 163(1)(f.1) (maximum cost of credit) comes into force, the board must commence a review of
  - (a) the meaning of "cost of credit" for the purposes of this Part;
  - (b) the maximum cost of credit or any rate, tariff or formula for determining the maximum cost of credit — that may be charged, required or accepted in respect of a payday loan; and
  - (c) the maximum amounts, or the rates, tariffs or formulas for determining the maximum amounts, that may be charged, required or accepted
    - (i) in respect of any component of the cost of credit for a payday loan,
    - (ii) in respect of the extension or renewal of a payday loan,
    - (iii) in respect of a replacement loan, or
    - (iv) in respect of a default by the borrower under a payday loan.

Further, the Board will submit its report to the Minister which will include

- a description of the board's consultation and the results of the consultation, and
- (ii) the board's recommendations about the matters reviewed under subsection (2); and
- (b) may include any other recommendations about the regulation of payday lenders or payday loans.

After receiving written evidence and submissions the Board will convene for those wishing to provide oral submissions or oral presentations.

## PARTICIPATION AND SCOPE OF HEARING:

## Intervener Status

All persons, firms or corporations wishing to intervene in respect of this matter, to provide evidence, or make oral submissions are required

to send an application for intervener status to The Public Utilities Board, 400 - 330 Portage Avenue, Winnipeg, Manitoba, R3C 0C4 by March 29, 2013. The forms are available on the Board's website –www.pub.gov.mb.ca and can be submitted by email. Interveners must identify their reasons for intervention and be prepared to cooperate with other interveners to avoid duplication of interventions.

The Board may determine whether an intervener is entitled to costs for participating in the hearing and may fix the amount of those costs. Criteria defining the award of costs are described in the Board's Rules of Practice and Procedures which are also available on the website.

Intervener applicants may also wish to make written submissions regarding the scope of the process and to address any specific issues, beyond the mandatory review requirements that they seek to have the Board consider in the review process.

The Board will issue a procedural order dealing with scope, process and intervener status following the March 29th filing deadline.

#### **Presenter Status**

Those parties wishing to submit a written brief or to express oral comments to the Board are known as presenters. They should submit their written briefs or advise the Secretary of the Board of their intention to appear at the public hearing by no later than June 15, 2013.

Persons wishing to address the Hearing in French are required to notify the Board's Secretary prior to June 15, 2013.

#### **Filing of Information**

The Board will circulate all material filed in this matter by interveners and presenters to all participants on the Board's mailing list. Interested parties can examine these filings at the Board's office. Anyone desiring copies of the material filed should contact the Board.



Sgt Devin Fraser and his wife, Jennifer, recently donated \$2,000 to Wounded Warriors fund.

"If I was put into a position where I couldn't do the things I love anymore without substantial help, I'd be heartbroken," said Sgt Fraser of 2PPCLI. "I know that

there are guys out there in that predicament. Anything that can help them out makes me feel better."

Handing their cheque to Sgt (retired) Fred Connor and Capt Drew Richardson, who both suffer from PTSD, Jan. 16 proved a rewarding experience for the couple who enjoy outdoor activities like hunting and fishing.

The Frasers came across this \$2,000 cheque through a contest sponsored by Empire Capitol Theatres and Coca-Cola called Extraordinary You.

While checking online to see which movies were playing, Jennifer came across the link for the contest for \$2,000 to a charity of your choice where contests for free movies and popcorn are usually located.

To enter, you had to share a few words about someone you found extraordinary. Jennifer chose her husband, Devin.

"I wrote about two paragraphs, submitted it online, and a couple months later I got an e-mail saying we had won for our region," she explained.

Sgt Fraser, who was away at the time, received the news via a phone call from his wife. For him, there was absolutely no question — Wounded Warriors was his charity of choice.

According to Sgt Fraser, helping troops enjoy their lives after an operational injury — be it mental or physical — is invaluable.

"I can only imagine how terrible it would be to feel cooped up," said Sgt Fraser "There are so many of us that fish and hunt and do things outdoors to keep busy."

"If that was taken away from you suddenly, that

would be terrible," added Jennifer emphatically.
Initially, Jennifer worried about the logistics of the donation as Wounded Warriors calls Ontario home.
Wounded Warriors made Jennifer aware of Connor

and his team of cyclists gearing up for the Big Battlefield Bike Ride in France this summer.

Connor has set a goal to raise \$15,000 for Wounded Warriors on behalf of his Westman and area cyclists — all of whom deal with the challenges of PTSD daily

Fraser said the donation has added meaning now that he has met Drew and Fred, who along with their teammates, benefit directly from Wounded Warriors.

"I know so many guys who have been injured in Afghanistan and other places," explained Fraser. "The work they [Wounded Warriors] do with them is amazing ... anything you can do to help them out is good."

Although it is called the American past time, baseball has found itself at home in the past times of more than a few at CFB Shilo.

For the second consecutive year, T-ball is being offered to Shilo's youngsters — making baseball available to even the youngest community members.

"This is our second year and we have a brand new executive," says Michelle Hanson-Herbert, a representative for Shilo T-ball.

"Most of us [executive] were T-ball parents last year so we're just learning the ropes. We will go through our growing pains and we will learn a lot."

The executive is likely to find themselves learning on their feet. Last year's numbers were impressive — more than 30 children participated in the inaugural T-ball season and the 2013 numbers are expected to be similar — perhaps even surpass last year's total.

Using all three diamonds Wednesday night from 5:30 to 6:30, the t-ball association will field three teams of children from age three to seven, and organized by age and skill level.

On any given Wednesday evening, you will find two teams on each diamond. While the younger teams work on essential skills, the older and more advanced players often play a game.

As T-ballers become more skilled, the colour of their cap changes. The coaching program followed, which is offered by Manitoba Baseball, is outlined clearly for qualified coaches.

"They give us a book to coach from and anyone who coaches in Manitoba has to have their respect in sport card before they start ... it is mandatory for any sport in Manitoba," explains Hanson-Herbert.

Although there are unique challenges in coaching a wide age gap, it is rewarding.



# Delayed reports hamper police

The winter that just kept on giving has led to a lot of car accidents.

a lot of car accidents.

Last year, Manitoba
Public Insurance (MPI)
introduced new rules to
streamline the claim process for those with vehicle
damage, whether by accident or otherwise.

MPI only processes claims for privately-owned vehicles and not DND vehicles, so this article only applies to personal vehicles.

The following accident/damage categories require reporting to the police as soon as possible: vandalism, theft, attempted theft, and any damage to public property when on a Base or other DND property — this is a military requirement.

The following accident/damage categories require reporting to MPI within seven days of the occurrence or detection: fatality, injury leading to hospitalization, unlicensed driver and/or unregistered vehicle, hit and run, and/or suspected involvement of drugs/alcohol.

All of the accidents above should lead to an immediate 911 call to dispatch police or emergency medical services as may be required.

Remember at the scene of any ac-



cident that you should collect all particulars of involved parties, a description of the scene, and photographs if you have the ability.

Why are the military police writing about insurance?

There have been accidents this winter season which required a police

report, but the incident was not reported. Obviously delayed reports make investigation much more difficulty for the investigating MP, and creates complication for otherwise simple claims.

When on the Base, drivers are encouraged to contact the MP in the event of any accident. The dispatcher or MP will be able to determine if there is a need to generate a police report, and MPI will be able to use this after you report the accident, as required.

Claims can be made via phone at 1-800-665-2410 — outside Winnipeg number — during business hours, or 204-729–9510 if you require an "after hours" tow in the Brandon area.

#### Reduce your Manitoba Income Tax

If you graduated with a degree, diploma or certificate from a post-secondary institution recognized by the Canada Revenue Agency on or after January 1, 2007 and now work and pay taxes in Manitoba, you can benefit from the Tuition Fee Income Tax Rebate. It doesn't matter if your post-secondary training took place in Manitoba or elsewhere. You can make your claim on your income tax return.

#### How it works

You are entitled to receive a 60% income tax rebate on your eligible tuition fees to a maximum benefit of \$25,000. You can claim your rebate over as little as six years or as long as twenty years.

## CF members will see rate increases

**Stag Special** 

Following approval by Treasury Board ministers, Canadian Forces (CF) members contributing to the regular force (full-time) pension plan will see rate increases this year as of Jan. 1.

In Budget 2012, the Government of

Canada announced its intention to increase pension contribution rates towards a 50/50 cost sharing model for the public service pension plan, and for comparable rates changes for the CF and RCMP pension plans.

and RCMP pension plans.

In this case, a cost sharing model describes how employee and employer share the cost of a plan. The Jobs and Growth Act (Bill C45) received royal assent this past December. As per the Budget 2012 announcement, this act made changes to the public service, RCMP, and CF superannuation acts.

The Jobs and Growth Act changed the

The Jobs and Growth Act changed the CF superannuation act to eliminate the 0.4 per cent limit on annual increases to member contribution rates.

The act also ensured CF members contributing to the full-time pension plan will not pay higher rates than public servants.

Treasury Board has set the CF full-time pension plan contribution rates from 2013 to 2015 at: 6.85 per cent in 2013; 7.50 per cent in 2014; and 8.15 per cent in 2015.

On any earnings over the maximum covered by the Canada/Quebec Pension Plan the rates will be 9.20 per cent in 2013; 9.80 per cent in 2014; and 10.40 per cent in 2015.

For 2013, earnings up to \$51,100 will be covered by the Canada/Quebec Pension Plan (year's maximum pensionable earnings). Contribution rates for 2016 and beyond will be set around the

2015 timeframe.

What this means to you?

By way of illustration, a member earning \$60,000 in 2013 will pay 6.85 per cent on earnings to a maximum of \$51,100 and 9.2 per cent on the remaining \$8,900 of earnings. This member would see a monthly increase of \$30.31 in contributions from 2012.

Members of the public service plan, the CF full-time plan, and the RCMP plan pay the same pension contribution rates; however, due to its unique provisions, like early retirement and military disability provisions, the CF full-time plan is more expensive than that of the public service.

Pension contribution rates are expected to continue to increase over a five year period until the Government has achieved its objective of a more equitable cost sharing ratio for the plans.

Reserve Force (RF) members who contribute to the regular force (full-time) pension plan will pay the new contribution rates. RF members contributing to the part-time plan will not and will continue to pay their current rates.

The Jobs and Growth Act also increased the retirement age to 65 for persons hired into the public service this year after Jan. 1. There were no changes to CF retirement policies.

CF members who release or retire and then become employed in the public service after this date will be subject to the new public service retirement age
