Sweet taste of success for Piches' Forbidden Flavours

newcomer to Any Shilo's Forbidden Flavours might think that owners Ray and Leita Piche have lived here their whole lives. The Piches, along with friendly their staff, customers by name. They know their customers' favourite drinks, and they bend over backwards every day to accommodate the needs of their patrons.

In fact, the couple, who were the recipients of the 2010 CFB Shilo Business Award of Excellence last December, have only owned Forbidden Flavours since 2006. (They also own another Shilo business, tanning salon Bronze Bodyz.) Their affection for the community where they work, and their respect for the military, they've come by honestly.

Montreal Ray, native, grew up with parents who were very involved with both their church and their community. Leita, who grew up in Neepawa, MB, has parents who are extremely communityminded, and her father, in particular, has a love of all things military. Leita says her family had many good friends from Shilo and her father, a former Reservist and cadet commander, is "heavily involved" with Royal Canadian

Legion.

"He's a historian," she explains. "He's got degrees in history. Anything to do with the military, he's hugely into that. He's got every book you can imagine and his basement is like a history museum of badges, uniforms, and hats, and the weapons from each war."

The Piches haven't always been involved in the coffee business. Ray is a former RCMP officer





who served 22 years. He now works with Manitoba Liquor the Control Commission. Leita is a pharmacy technician by trade who has also worked in human resources. They bought the Shilo Forbidden Flavours location because they were excited about the concept of the business.

"We both thought it would be an unbelievable idea to be a part of something where you can roast the beans from a green state," says Leita, who explains the beans are roasted by a roastmaster just 30

kilometres down the road in Brandon. "There are a lot of wonderful coffee places, but can they actually say that they can tell the customer when it was roasted?"

Ray agrees that the beans is what sets Forbidden Flavours apart from other coffee shops.

"We don't talk about freshly brewed coffee, we talk about freshly brewed coffee with freshly roasted beans," Ray says. "Anyone who enjoys coffee can usually tell the difference."

Aside from the coffee selection, Forbidden

Leita and Ray Piche have found a niche in the hearts of coffee drinkers and those with a sweet tooth. The couple's Forbidden Flavours was named winner of CFB Shilo's 2010 Business Award of Excellence and the pair have big plans for the future.

Flavours also offers specialty drinks, salads, sandwiches, wraps, soups, and real fruit smoothies — and the menu won't end there. The Piches are also looking at offering other meal options such as paninis.

"We're trying to establish ourselves more in the food industry, instead of just the coffee and ice cream, which has been nice, but we're trying to move forward and provide a service that maybe isn't as readily available," explains Leita. "This is just the natural progression toward what we felt the base and the Shilo area needed."

Owners and staff are also open to suggestion, so if customers have an idea for a new menu item, they're encouraged

Prepare Now for Possible Spring Flooding

Protect your home, business or farm

If your property could be affected by potential flooding this spring, here are some steps you can take:

- Install a backwater valve or sump pump if you already have one of these devices, ensure it is in good working order.
- Put weather protection sealant around basement windows and the base of ground-level doors.
- Ensure eaves and downspouts are in good working order and will direct water away from your home.
- Remove any important documents or items from your basement.
- Make plans for keeping your pets and livestock safe including plans for moving them if it becomes necessary.
- Check your insurance policy to ensure you have adequate coverage.
- Learn about your municipality's plans for registering and assisting people who may have to leave their homes during the flood.

Working Together

The Manitoba government is working closely with municipalities to prepare for potential spring flooding. Ice cutting machines and Amphibex ice breakers are already at work and other rapid response equipment is being positioned around the province to support municipal flood fighting efforts. This includes sandbag machines, pumps, steamers and materials that can be used to strengthen or raise dikes or provide temporary protection from imminent flooding.

make recommendation.

"The door is always open for more things that we can provide, because we're here to work with everyone," Leita says. "This is something we want to make sure that we're always on top of."

Another thing they're always on top of is providing excellent customer service.

"Customer service is by far the most important thing," Ray

says. His wife agrees.
"It's nice to have awesome products, but if you don't have awesome, friendly service ... I think it's very important to treat everybody special, whatever rank they are, wherever they're from," Leita explains. "Anybody can sell you coffee and a great product, but there needs to be more attached to that. You need to make people feel they're special and know their name and know what they have so they're beyond just a customer."

Outstanding customer service is but one reason Forbidden Flavours won the Business Award of Excellence, presented by BComd Luc Généreux to a surprised Leita and

Ray.
"It was a very nice savs Ray. "We were very ecstatic to receive it. It shows that the military and the Shilo area sees what we do, and they thought it was worthy of giving it to us. We were very much appreciative."

Expect some changes and branching out for Forbidden Flavours in 2011. A new sandwich counter is coming soon, and Leita has been working at letting people know the shop is child

friendly. Preparing Your Farm for Potential Spring Flooding

If your farm could be affected by potential flooding this spring, here are some steps you should take to protect your operation.

Caring for livestock

- · Visit your local GO office and complete a premises identification application.
- Ensure your livestock have access to feed and water on high ground whether it is on your land or on a temporary site elsewhere.
- Make sure you have an alternate source of energy, such as a backup generator, for use in your barns.

Protecting your grain

- If your grain storage bins are at risk of flooding, move your grain as soon as possible.
- If your grain is at risk of flooding, contact the Canadian Wheat Board as soon as possible.
- Find out if you can apply for a special spring road restriction permit that will allow you to move your grain and oilseeds out of floodaffected areas.

Securing hazardous materials

- Move all small, hazardous, portable materials such as solvents, chemicals, petroleum, propane and fertilizers to higher ground.
- Larger portable tanks should be disconnected, moved to higher ground and secured so they will not float away.
- All large storage tanks should be tied to an immovable object.

In the mid 1950s an explosion in the reactor room of Chalk River Nuclear Laboratories in eastern Ontario required quick action by the government to prevent the spread of radiation to the nearby community and beyond.

Some members of the Armed Forces were despatched to provide security for the facility. However, when they arrived, they were assigned to prevent radiation from spreading. All of these soldiers put their lives on the line in order to do so. Some were members of RCHA from CFB Petawawa.

The situation in Japan is similar, as volunteers there

are putting their lives on the line to prevent the spread of radiation. These people are being labeled as heros of the country. And no doubt will receive the highest acclamation for it.

In Canada, it has taken over 40 years to recognize that something important was done by those who served to contain the dangerous situation.

For those still living, the government gave them a token of money and sent a certificate of recognition through the mail system.

Dog control takes over agenda at community council

Dog control or a perceived lack thereof has once again become an issue at Shilo Community Council.

At the council meeting March 18, several members voiced concern over who controls what when it comes to animal control. The issue centred over the recent biting of a young student by a loose dog.
"I have been here

seven years ... I myself have never seen animal control on Base," stated Ward5 Rep MCpl Glenn

Shedding some light was Rural Municipality of Cornwallis Ward 5 Rep Kurt Wasserberg, who said part of the confusion is municipal bylaws and military regulations working in the same geographical space.

CFB Shilo, Across

regulations are enforced through the RM of Cornwallis' animal control bylaw. An Animal Control Officer has been hired but is available only at set Those times times. include Sundays and Mondays from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.; Tuesdays, Wednesdays Thursdays from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. and again from 3 to 7 p.m.; Fridays from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. and finally Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Anyone needing animal control on Base should call the

at 728-6653. Wasserberg pointed out if anyone can't reach the Animal Control Officer they could call him at home. Wasserberg's phone number is 763-4357.

Animal Control Officer

Afterwards, Daniel Prest of 1MP Unit stated that MPs will get involved in animal

control matters only if there is a determined risk to human life.

"Even if someone is bitten by a dog we have nothing to do with it, unless the dog is still biting when we get there, as it is an municipal bylaw matter," Cpl Prest stated.

adds MPs He would not make up a report, similar to those forwarded BComd, however dog complaints are added to the detachment's CAD for future reference.

"People should be keeping their own records too," the MP said. "We need to remind people as well that there is a Base Standing Order (Chapter 10, animal control) that states people are responsible for their own pets.'

Shilo Meanwhile, Community Council President Sgt Shannon Woodman said would take the dog

control matter up with the BRSM. Anyone wanting to review RM of Cornwallis animal regulations can log onto www. gov.cornwallis.mb.ca/ bylaws.

Also discussed at the March 18 meeting were:

• With spring melt hopefully right around the corner, MPs warn drivers to respect barricaded road closures.

Cpl Prest added that when barricades go up on temporary street closures, drivers must avoid that area.

"We will have melting issues and we will put barricades up and people will drive around them. If you swamp your car in an area of the street that's closed, good luck with MPI," Cpl Prest warned.

He noted there are a couple of typical flooding spots including Royal Avenue near the military police building as well as Royal Avenue behind Ecole la Source.

"If barricades are up, they are up there for drivers' protection. Don't just drive around them," Cpl Prest noted.

Council was notified

of the annual Volunteer Appreciation event set for Saturday, April 16. The afternoon pays tribute to all those who contributed at least 20 hours of volunteer to CFB Shilo in 2010.

Check Your Insurance Coverage Now

Sewer Back-Up

Insurance policies do not always cover damage caused by sewer back-up but it is sometimes offered as an option you can purchase. You should check your policy to be sure you have the coverage you need.

Private insurance does not provide coverage for the damage caused by overland flooding. It is recommended that you prepare for possible overland flood damage by removing valuable items and important papers from your basement and ensuring the grading around your home allows for water to move away from the house rather than pool near the

Disaster Financial Assistance

When a widespread disaster such as a flood strikes and creates an unreasonable financial burden on property owners, Disaster Financial Assistance (DFA) may be available for eligible costs related to damages that are not insurable. This can include costs for:

- Evacuating homes, businesses or farms
- Sandbagging and other efforts to prevent or limit imminent water damage to property and livestock
- · Repairing or replacing non-insurable property such as your home, buildings or other non-insurable losses essential to the operation of eligible farms and small businesses

1RCHA Gunner guards interment of Cdn WWI soldier

He didn't get to see Paris, but what he did in France earlier this month meant so much more.

Selected as representative lone from LFWÅ, 1RCHA Anthony Gunner Triantafyllopoulos was part of interment ceremonies for two Canadian soldiers from the First World War. He just recently returned to CFB Shilo from Pasde-Calais and says the experience will stay with him a lifetime.

"Being part of the guard for this memorial burial was the most honourable and memorable experience of my military career. As a guard I learned and understood more about the role of the artillery in both the first and second world wars," Gnr Triantafyllopoulos states

Nearly a century after his death, Private Thomas Lawless, a Canadian First World War soldier whose remains were recovered and identified on January 10, 2011, was

buried with full military honours at La Chaudière Military Cemetery, in Vimy, France on March 15

Anunknown Canadian First World War soldier was also interred at Pozières British Cemetery, in Somme, France, on March 17. The soldier's skeletal remains were found on the Butterworth Farm property, in Pozières,

on April 9, 2009. Due to a lack of evidence however, he could not be identified.

A native of Toronto, Gnr Triantafyllopoulos spent two days in early March at CFB Trenton performing weapons and funeral drills. He arrived in France March 13 with the next day spent in rehearsal prior to the first interment ceremony.

"Because he was able to be identified the family of Pte Lawless was there, along with a large media contingent. The funeral was in two stages, at the cathedral and at the cemetery. As part of the service we fired three volleys. It was so well organized the volleys together sounded as one," the artilleryman says.

The second Canadian soldier interred, who could not be identified, was part of the following day's ceremony.

day's ceremony.

"Because there was no family, a French couple adopted him as is their custom. And

because there was no family of his own, there was no volley," Gnr Triantafyllopoulos notes.

In addition to the interment ceremonies, Gnr Triantafyllopoulos was able to visit several First World War battle sites as well as the Vimy Memorial.

He notes the French still appreciate the sacrifices made by Canadian soldiers almost 100 years ago. And he advises all military personnel to see the First World War memorials themselves.

"They (the French) certainly respect and appreciate Canadians. When you look at

our memorials and cemeteries over there, they are all kept in immaculate shape," he


"Being there, to be part of this ceremony, was a tremendous honour. First, as a military person performing a burial service for a Canadian First World War soldier. Second, being there to see the sights was a great honour. We didn't get to see Paris, but I didn't miss that at all."



Battle of Kapyong helped shape 2PPCLI

With the 60th anniversary celebrations of the Battle of Kapyong coming up at CFB Shilo on April 30, the following is some background on 2PPCLI and its storied history.

second battalion was born of Princess Canadian Patricia's Light Infantry (PPCLI) in June 1945 as part of the Canadian Army Pacific Force. Given Canada is a Pacific country and lost two battalions in Hong Kong, it was time to turn our attention towards Japan, with the European campaign winding down. With Japan's surrender in August, 1945, Second Battalion PPCLI (2PPCLI) was stood down. However it was only five years later (June 1950) when it was stood up once again for deployment to the Orient. This time, it was to fight in Korea as part of the Canadian Army Special Force.

By the time 2PPCLI had arrived (Dec. 1950), the first Canadian unit in theatre, the fledgling United Nations' situation significantly had deteriorated. Another Chinese armies, equivalent 180,000 approximately troops, haď already crossed the Yalu River. The Patricias would no longer be employed as a stabilizing occupation force. There was now an urgent requirement for them to join the fight.

There were strained Canadian-American relations when the Patricias insisted on

two more months of intense counter-guerilla operations, tactics and weapons training given the unannounced re-role. By mid-February of 1951, 2PPCLI joined the 27th British Commonwealth Infantry Brigade consisting of two British and one Australian infantry battalions, one New Zealand artillery regiment and one Indian field ambulance.

From that point on, the Patricias were quickly earning its stalwart reputation. had become baptized under through several fights with a tenacious and determined enemy under most severe winter climate conditions and brutally rugged terrain. Friends were lost along the way, the realities of war fast leaving its indelible mark, making them vets in short order.

The Patricias were already dug into Hill 677 at the Kapyong Valley when thousands of demoralized South Korean soldiers were heavy into a withdrawal, escaping total annihilation by a severely overwhelming enemy. Watching them madly flee for their very lives on April 22-23 would be enough to undermine anybody's confidence.

Then came the onslaught. On the evening of April 23-24, 2PPCLI watched in horror as 3rd Battalion Royal Australian Regiment, just east across the valley, became heavily infiltrated by thousands of Chinese.

After its gallant stand, they too conducted a hasty withdrawal, escaping annihilation.

The Chinese hoards turned then onto 2PPCLI, April 24-25, 1951. After already two sleepless nights, the Patricias fought for almost 24 straight hours. There were times when the Chinese charged in waves, barely 30 metres apart and for up to five hoursstraight.Inaddition to close quarter fighting, friendly artillery fire was called onto their own position up to two times in order to beat back the suicide attacks; one such barrage lasting up to 40 minutes, including 2,300 rounds, at 1.87 shells per

By the time all firing ceased, more than 2,000 enemy were killed or wounded by this one under strength battalion of just over 900 men and its combat supporting arms. It was even more remarkable that against all odds, their mission was an immense success with no more than 10 Patricias killed and 23 wounded in action.

second.

They had played a key role in halting the Chinese advance at a rate of 40 kms in only 36 hours. In doing so, the Chinese could no longer pursue or annihilate the South Korean Division and the capital, Seoul was spared communist occupation for the third time.

China and North Korea would soon loose its momentum following its failed spring offensive.

The Battle of Kapyong would be to Korea what Vimy was to the First World War or Normandy was to the Second World War. For individual actions at the Battle of Kapyong, there was a Military Cross, a Distinguished Conduct Medal and two Military Medals awarded. Many years after the war, there was a granting of a Coat of Arms of Canada.

The Regiment had earned further distinction and honour by exercising its 'Freedom of the City' in Calgary, on April 25, 1952, thanks to

Approximately five years after the Battle of Kapyong, Government finally Canada of relented in authorizing 2PPCLI's acceptance of the U.S. Presidential Unit Citation, the first Canadian unit to do so. It would be several decades after 'The Forgotten War' that Canada would recognize its Korean veterans with a Canadian Volunteer Service Medal for Korea.

By the time the armistice was signed July 23, 1953, there were more than 3,800 Patricias that had served in Korea; 429 were wounded, 107 killed and one taken prisoner of war. Today Kapyong and Korea are two of 22 Battle Honours emblazoned on PPCLI's Regimental Colours.

Regimental event coming up April 30

The 60th anniversary of the Battle of Kapyong will be marked by a Regimental Celebration on Saturday, April 30.

Sacrifices made by the brave soldiers of 2PPCLI will be remembered with a reunion and parade, followed by a reception at Kapyong Barracks and its parade square. A reunion luncheon for the Kapyong veterans is scheduled at the Warrant Officers and Sergeants Mess.

Included that afternoon are several interactive activities for the veterans, all ranks, friends and families alike

At the edge of the parade square is a PPCLI Kapyong Memorial that made the move from Winnipeg when 2PPCLI was transferred to Shilo in 2004. It has been with the battalion since its Regimental 75th Anniversary in 1989. During its unveiling ceremony, the Military Defence Attaché to the Korean Ambassador was in attendance. It is saluted when passing by, out of respect to those who laid their lives on the line.

The previous garrison in Winnipeg was renamed Kapyong Barracks in 1973. Col Stone, DSO, MC, CD commanding officer at the Battle of Kapyong, was the reviewing officer with the U.S. Consul from Winnipeg in attendance. The name and monument followed the Battalion in order to perpetuate the memory of how the Patricias, against overwhelming odds, had prevented the decimation of a South Korean division and the fall of Seoul, Korea, for the third time.

This anniversary includes an exchange between 2PPCLI and the 3rd Battalion Royal Australian Regiment (Our Allied Regiment), who were also awarded the U.S Presidential Citation for its action at Kapyong, Hill 504.
