Military musicians in demand for 2017 celebrations

Music plays a vital role in the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) and our musical men and women in uniform will be a big part of the celebration as Canadians prepare to mark several notable anniversaries next year.

In addition to being Canada's 150th birthday, 2017 is also the 100th anniversaries of Vimy Ridge and Passchendaele, and the 75th anniversary of the Dieppe raid

The overall role of CAF's Music Branch (CF Music Branch) is three-pronged. It sustains the morale component of fighting power while contributing to state ceremonial events, and is an effective tool for engaging with Canadians.

First, building and sustaining the morale component of fighting power refers, in part, to the visceral response music creates in CAF members when, for example, their regimental march is played.

State events such as Remembrance Day, Royal tours, support to the Governor General or official commemorations serve as the second prong, while the ability of the musicians to open the doors of the military and engage with Canadians is the third.

The inherent flexibility of CAF musicians, many

of whom play second and third instruments, allows them to shift from the parade square to Rideau Hall, to jazz or rock combos, or perform the other duties that go into running a band, such as finance, supply and copyright matters.

CAF Regular Force Bands

The CF Music Branch holds a two-phase audition process each year for its Regular Force bands. The first involves a blind panel assessment of applicants' musical submissions through recordings.

Successful applicants from the first phase are invited to a second live phase with one of the Regular Force bands of the Royal Canadian Navy, the Canadian Army and the Royal Canadian Air Force.

The Regular Force also hires skilled musicians to fill vacancies and competitions are held periodically for available positions.

Successful applicants have typically been experienced, professional musicians, many of them having a degree in Music Performance, Conservatory or University Certification, or equivalent professional musical experience.

Musicians must be multi-talented performers with experience in several musical styles, and must be able to adapt to all types of performance situations and to diverse audiences.

Reserve Force Bands

Joining one of the Army Reserve's bands is a way to translate part-time employment into a full-time job, while being paid and having time to study or work in a civilian capacity.

Musicians may serve with the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN), Canadian Army (CA) or Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) and provide musical support for CAF events and operations.

Musicians employed on a part-time or casual full-time basis usually serve at a military base, wing, home port or ship located within Canada.

Band of the Ceremonial Guard

The Ceremonial Guard is a composite CAF unit of more than 400 people that includes a Foot Guard company and the Band of the Ceremonial Guard.

This year, the majority of the Guard is composed of Regular and Reserve Force Guard and includes soldiers from regiments across Canada and, for the first time, ceremonial members from Canada's Navy and Air Force.

The Ceremonial Guard was established to plan, prepare, and execute public duties in the Nation's Capital during the summer.

In the National Capital Region, the application deadline for the CAF's Band of the Ceremonial Guard was last October.







New community centre for Shilo

Headquarters Camp Shilo very recently announced receipt of the final approval of a new community centre for the camp from Canadian Forces headquarters.

The centre will be located in the area known as Artillery Park, approximately midway between the two chapels. Construction of the building will begin immediately, with an estimated completion date

of approximately December 1 of this year.

The centre, which will consist mainly of two Butler buildings, will contain such facilities for Shiloites as a Boy Scout, Cub and Brownie hall, auditorium and band stand, and a Maple Leaf Services coffee shop.

Financing for the project will come from a variety of sources. The initial or contributed costs of the Butler buildings amounting to \$15,000 will come from the Canadian Army Central Fund, and a special request

for \$10,000 from the GOC Maple Leaf Services Fund.


The \$20,000 originally approved for the building of an outdoor swimming pool will be transferred to the project, and the remaining money from local sources as follows: a contribution of \$5,000 from the RCSA fund, \$10,000 from Garrison fun, and \$5,000 from the special MLS rebate which Camp Shilo units agreed to contribute to the com-

munity centre.

Total cost of the project will be approximately \$65,000.

Landscaping of the grounds and maintenance will be on a self-help basis and it is hoped that our Shilo teen population will come out and give full support to making the centre not only a functional lace, but also an attractive addition to our community.

Trials resume

German armoured equipment cold weather trials planned for Camp Shilo, Manitoba last winter, but cancelled for technical reasons, will be conducted next winter by a team of approximately 100 German army technicians and civilian experts.

A total of eight armoured fighting vehicles will be tested, representing four different types.

They are the recently developed standard tank of the German army, the 42-ton "Leopard"; a 26-ton tank destroyer, a 22-ton anti-tank guided missile carrier and a 25-ton armoured personnel carrier.


Purpose of the trials is to determine the operational capabilities of the equipment in accordance with NATO standards under low temperature conditions.

Cost of the trials will be borne by the German government. Use of the military facilities of one NATO country for trials and training by the forces of another is an established form of co-operation between NATO partners.

The main body of the test team will arrive in early December and will conduct trials at Camp Shilo for about three months.

A liaison team of seven German experts and officials, headed LCol R. von Wallenberg, visited Camp Shilo Aug. 16-17, then returned to Ottawa for final talks

Shilo Stag

The life and death of airmen was often held in the diligent hands of women packing parachutes during the Second World War.

While growing up, it always seemed mothers were experts at folding sheets and towels. How did they get so neat and stay that way? What is the secret behind those darn fitted sheets?

There have been many camping trips where people have cursed as they cram a sleeping bag or tent back into a seemingly impossibly small bag in which it was sold.

Parachute packing was tedious and accurate work. And provided another opportunity for women to be involved in the war effort.

Folding the metres long contraptions of silk and leather needed to be done neatly and specifically. The fate of the men dropping from the sky in training and during missions was up to these women's expert packing skills.

The task was primarily the work for women. Nicknamed 'Chute Girls they packed hundreds of thousands of parachutes during the Second World War, with 20,000 put to

use in one single day — on D-Day when Canadian soldiers dropped behind the lines on the Normandy

This is according to www.elinorflorence.com — the website also cited an article written by Cpl Murial El-

She wrote in her article titled, *Temptations of a 'Chute* Girl, "Ever miss those nice sheer pre-war silk stockings, girls? When you work all day with enough silk to make stockings aplenty for the next eight years, wearing cotton stockings, it's a great temptation to whip out the scissors. Particularly now, when real \$1.50 chiffons are as scarce as beefsteak in Berlin.

"That's what the girls in the parachute section, packing six to eight chutes a day, and thinking of the dear, dear days of silk-legged delight, are up against. The silk from one chute would make no less than 160 pairs of stockings, and if you like Nylons, there's 200 pairs of them in one of the big umbrellas.

"Chute rigging has been one of the chief activities

of the Women's Division since Ottawa decided that there were hundreds of jobs in the air force that could be done by the ladies. And, as you can see, one of the most ironical jobs"

The use of materials such as silk, and later nylon by the military, led to shortages — meaning women struggled to cover bare legs.

There were riots by romen trying to get

their hands on stockings and nylons, according to the Smithsonian Mag website. It also states women painted stockings on their legs during the shortage with liquid

stocking makeup.

Some also created contraptions to paint a straight line up the back with eyeliner or a brow pencil or have a friend line their legs. Creating the seam line made the liquid stockings look more believable.

Women's clothing has changed multiple times base

on war time needs. Another example is in the corset. The metal used to make the boning was needed to help the war effort, a short supply of metal meant women's clothing changed to accommodate.

Prepping 'chutes for troops was no easy feat. Each one had to be examined with scrutiny for holes and imperfections, such as rust on metal fittings.

Each fold needed to be exact and any flaw fixed after numerous examinations.

Anna Dundas enlisted in the CWAAF (Canadian Women's Auxiliary Air Force) in January 1942. She was at the No. 10 Flying Training School (SFTS) in Dauphin and, with two other women, looked after the parachutes.

"We had to inspect parachutes for rips or tears and hang them in a well to air them for 48 hours. And then repack them," recalled Dundas in a recording from the Memory Project website.

"We were always conscious of doing the wrong thing, but we had good training and the only time I was nervous inspecting a parachute was where they brought it in after a crash and it had burned. And we had to go through it. We, when I say we, I had to ... I was the only one that worked on it, to make sure there were no body parts in it. And the smell of that burnt silk was very, very strong, it was nauseating. And it was kind of a daunting job. But we had to do it, that was part of the ritual, before they could throw it out."

The women were required to fly in any planes they helped repair.

"I was asked to repair a wingtip and our training planes [North American Harvards] were covered in canvas, actually cotton, not canvas, factory cotton. And they were covered with seven coats of dope, which is a heavy enamel," recalled Dundas. "And when the students were learning to take off and land, that's when some of those accidents happened and the wingtips touched the ground too soon and they'd

She even spent a few days repairing the underside of one of those planes when the fuselage was ripped open from the cockpit to the tail.

"But after each job, sewing job on an aircraft, I had to go up. A pilot had to take me up as a precaution that I did not sabotage the plane. I had to go up after it was repaired to make sure the job was genuine."
She met her husband on her first time flying dur-

ing her familiarization flight. Dundas was scared of planes and flying and was the last one in her section to go up. "So finally, this gorgeous man came to our section. He says, 'I'm going up in 15 minutes and I hear there's one airwoman who hasn't been up yet and she'd better be ready in 15 minutes.' So I had to

The following year, they we're married. While women took personal responsibility for aircraft they mended, it was the same story with the parachutes. Records were kept on who packed each parachute. This is something RCAF Flying Officer (FO) T.R. Delaney took to heart when he bailed out of his burning plane. According to the website for author Elinor Florence, a news clipping tells the story of how he tracked down Leading Airwoman Irene Camken. He wanted to thank her because she "brought him back alive."


Camken was a fabric worker before enlisting and packing military parachutes.

"You can never let yourself forget how important your work is when you're packing 'chutes," she said in the article. "It isn't your life that depends on them. It's somebody else's, and your best is the only job that's good enough."

He gifted her a bracelet featuring the RCAF crest, her name and Women's Division Number. On the underside it says, "With sincere thanks, T.R. Delaney."

These women's tales fit well with the RCAF Women's Division motto "She serves that men may fly."







Mumps on the move

With approximately 23 times the amount of mumps cases hitting Manitoba, you may want to start taking precautions.

The virus is highly contagious — being spread by saliva. It can live in your mouth, eyes, nose and skin.

Coughing, sneezing, talking and touching contaminated surfaces are ways you may pick up this illness.

According to the Manitoba Public Health website — as of March 2 — there are 184 confirmed cases of mumps since Sept. 1, 2016. Traditionally, the province sees between four to eight cases per year.

CFB Shilo's Medical Officer Capt Steven Nordstrom told the Shilo Stag there haven't been any reported cases on this Base. Generally younger people are affected by mumps.

"It's definitely a highly contagious disease that's spread in close quarters," explained Capt Nordstrom. "It typically affects school-age children and young adults. Some of our younger members

might be more susceptible. Members into their mid to late 20s aren't necessarily susceptible to mumps.

Initially, this illness was affecting University of Manitoba students in Winnipeg between the age of 18 and 29 and, who live in the city or are involved in

sports.

Mumps can spread quickly through sports teams due to the close proximity of the players, and sharing water bottles and food, and touching contaminated surfaces.

Now, it's spreading to all ages in Manitoba.

If you've been infected if can take between 12 to 25 days for symptoms to appear and you can pass it on before you even know you're sick or have the mumps.

"Particularly early on, it mimics a lot of other viral infections," explained Capt Nordstrom,

The NHL's Vancouver Canucks and Minnesota Wild as well as the local Brandon Wheat Kings have been afflicted by the highly contagious virus, with players removed from the line-up and kept away from their teammates.

You can help protect yourself by ensuring you and your family are vaccinated. While vaccines are not 100 per cent effective, they are still your best bet.

> "With mumps, most people get two doses, and our members get a booster dose if they come in and haven't received one in the 10 years previous," he

> While soldiers aren't required to get vaccines, it could impact their ability to be deployed.

> There is no cure for mumps, if a soldier contracts it.

Instead there are isolation procedures. "The member would be sent home from work. We

would advise [them] to limit contact with other people, cover his mouth when he sneezes or coughs ... don't share glasses. "However, like I said, it's highly contagious and

likely the people in his family and that live around them are going to be exposed, and have been exposed by the time it presented here."

Mumps can also have some serious side effects in a small margin of those who become ill.

While the illness can be painful, uncomfortable and inconvenient from a work and school perspective, serious side effects are rare.

These side effects include, inflammation of the testicles, which can affect 15 to 30 per cent of men, and inflammation of the breasts and the ovaries affecting around five per cent of women.

Approximately 13 per cent of these cases can cause impaired fertility which varies in severity. Additionally, sterility is very rare.

Inflammation of the brain, also known as encephalitis, occurs in around one in 6,000 cases.

Capt Nordstrom told the Stag in a follow up e-mail, "Most with encephalitis secondary to mumps recover completely. Permanent hearing loss, arthritis, pancreatitis and heart involvement have also been reported but even less common that those above.'

The mumps vaccine was approved in 1996, resulting in the number of reported cases decreasing by around 90 per cent — from 33,000 cases reported per year within 1951 to 1955 to roughly 180 cases per year in 2011 to 2013. That's according to the Public Health Agency of Canada.

To check that your vaccines are up to date or if you to 99 per cent for most of think you or your family member have been exposed our vaccines," noted Capt to mumps, contact your healthcare provider.

Mumps can cause swelling of glands on the neck. This is just one of the symptoms doctors look for when diagnosing this con-




