Army receives 1,148 new machine guns

Soldiers training at CFB Shilo can expect to train on a new machine gun in the near

The Government of Canada is committed to providing the women and men of the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) with the equipment and training they need to do their jobs.

To support this commitment, the Government of Canada will purchase 1,148 new C6A1 FLEX General Purpose Machine Guns (GPMG) from Colt Canada, according to Defence Minister Harjit Sajjan.

The Government of Canada is committed to providing the Canadian Armed Forces with the modern equipment they need to successfully carry out operations at home and abroad," he said.

"This purchase will replace equipment

that was procured over 30 years ago and will ensure that the CAF are properly equipped and continue to be ready for operations."

The current C6 machine guns being used in the CFB Shilo training area with soldiers from 1RCHA and 2PPČLI were procured more than three decades ago.

Some have been removed from service due to wear and tear and others are reaching the end of their service life. This purchase will provide the CAF with a modern and reliable weapon to support training and operations.

The new C6A1 FLEX (flexible) is designed to be carried by soldiers or attached to vehicles such as the new Tactical Armoured Patrol Vehicle (TAPV).

The new machine gun will feature a durable polymer butt stock instead of the current wooden style. Additionally, soldiers will be able to attach pointing devices and optical sighting systems to the new weapon to help increase their operational effectiveness.

The contract with Colt Canada will result in approximately 13 new jobs and contribute to maintaining approximately 100 jobs at the company. This procurement aligns with the commitment under Canada's defence policy, Strong, Secure, Engaged, to modernize, renew and restore Canada's military by providing them with the tools they need to succeed in operations.


As outlined in Strong, Secure, Engaged, such investments will improve the Canadian Army's operational capability, and will help provide an advantage over potential adversaries.

- First deliveries of the new C6A1 FLEX is anticipated for September 2018 with final deliveries anticipated for June 2019.
- The value of the contract is \$32.1 million (taxes included).
- The procurement includes related equipment such as a cleaning and repair kit, spare parts, and sling to carry the

I have been on several gun exercises throughout my career, but this was the first time I was going to see the "big guns" in action.

I was part of Ex FROZEN GUNNER held at CFB Shilo March 17 and 18, where 38 Brigade Artillery Tactical Group (38 ATG) and 1RCHA conducted collective training to co-ordinate live battery and regimental fires

38 ATG used the C3 105mm Howitzer, while 1RCHA fired the M777 155mm Howitzer.

MBdr Zach McDermot-Fouts worked as a reservist on the C3 Howitzer with 38 ATG before joining 1RCHA, which he works with the M777.

"I guess when it comes down to it, it's mostly about manpower and manoeuverability," offered MBdr McDermot-Fouts. "The C3 is a lighter gun and can be manned and manoeuvered quickly by only three to four people if it really came down to it."

He added, "Rounds alone for the M777 weigh 100 pounds apiece and you need at least seven people to be mobile."

From the C3 gun line, 38 ATG Sgt Michael Sweatman noted, "Because there are other units watching and depending on the speed and accuracy of our rounds, joint training such as this emulates the sense

of urgency in a real-time situation and builds mutual respect for the job we all do as Gunners."

My head spins when I think of the amount of work which has to be done at the Observation Posts (OP) and the Command Posts (CP).

The OP needs to provide accurate and detailed target information to the CP, where a flurry of activity and constant communication within that small "box" is translated into data the guns can use to get firing "on time and on target."

"This type of joint training allows for a more technical shoot — a more advanced shoot — as well as the opportunity to engage in different missions that we would not have the option to engage in with just the 105s," advised Lt Joyelle Norris, the 38 ATG Forward Observation Officer (FOO) on the exercise.

"We are very fortunate to be participating in this training with 1RCHA," said Maj Paul Haughey, acting CO of 38 ATG.

"It has outstanding training value in that it enables gunners to achieve a higher Battle Task Standard (BTS) through joint training with an artillery regiment utilizing indirect live fire thru both 105mm and 155mm Howitzers to support the manoeuver of the infantry and armoured units to achieve a mission set forth by the Commander".

MBdr Lynn Danielson is with 116th Independent Field Battery, Royal Canadian Artillery, from Kenora, Ont.






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

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

Lundy's Lane construction on hold until spring 2018

An early arrival by winter put a damper on finishing road work on Lundy's Lane.

According to staff at Shilo's Canadian Forces Housing Agency (CFHA), work will not be completed on the road until spring 2018.

Staff report, "The contractor is working to ensure the road and parking lots will be ready for winter access. Defence Construction Canada (DCC) has advised us that the plan is for the road to be opened and for all occupants to have access to their assigned parking spots and electrical hook-ups over the winter.

"Once the pedestals have been installed in the new parking areas the contractor will need to gain access to each unit to do the final electrical hook-up. This is expected to take 15 to 20 minutes. DCC will be assisting the contractor in co-ordinating the appointments. We appreciate your co-operation so we can ensure that the parking spaces have electrical connections over the winter."

CFHA report all units are back on the main water connection and water can be used without any restrictions.

In other CFHA news, the 18-unit apartment complex at 23 Stonehenge Rd is open and welcomed the first residents after Oct. 13.

This latest housing project is part of \$6-million invested in CFB Shilo's housing stock since 2015. This

includes new construction as well as interior and exterior retrofits to existing PMQs. The three-storey apartment complex was built by Brandon-based J&G Homes

With six air conditioned units on each floor, each apartment is complete with a kitchen, living area, laundry/storage area, full four-piece bathroom, two bedrooms and plenty of closet space. Residents also have a separate storage locker on their floor.

The adjacent 12-unit apartment complex currently under construction will only be a two-storey venue and is expected to be open in spring 2018.

Are you aware of conditions of occupancy when you reside in the Q-patch at CFB Shilo?

According to the CFHA, residents of homes or apartments are responsible of their venues at all times. It's the residents responsibility to make adequate arrangements in respect to heating, security, outside maintenance such as lawn care, garbage or snow removal during any absences on leave or on course/deployment/exercises.

Moreover, the residents are responsible to correct deficiency/infraction to the condition of occupancy. CFHA staff will send a letter to the renter detailing the deficiency/infraction and request compliance. The resident's chain of command will be notified of a failure to comply.

With this in mind during Christmas block leave or if you are being deployed this winter, CFHA advises

you do the following:

- arrange for a responsible person to check on your home daily.
- inform CFHA who to contact for access into your home in case of emergency.
- it's recommended you shut off the water to your residence, open the bathroom and laundry room taps. Shut off water to your toilet and flush.
- set the gas hot water tank to vacation or turn off the breaker if you have an electric hot water tank.
- •shut off the water valve to your lawn service and open the lawn service tap. Don't forget to disconnect your garden hose from your outside tap, empty the water from inside the hose and store it.
- it's recommended that you set your thermostat no lower than 18 degrees Celsius. Never turn off your heat in the winter months. Pipes can take only a few hours to freeze.

Has your furnace been inspected?

The furnace inspection and maintenance project is underway on the Base, according to Shilo's CFHA. If your furnace has not been inspected, call Trademark Plumbing and Heating at 204-573-6850 to set up an appointment. These inspections must be completed annually.

'An orange day at home'

School counsellor resource to help military kids succeed

Twenty years or so ago, 80 per cent of Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) families in Canada lived apart from the rest of society, with many services offered on military bases.

Today, that has been more than completely reversed, with 85 per cent living in their local communities. That change has affected many aspects of military family life, including how children succeed in school.

Challenges arise when community service providers such as schools and health services do not always understand the impact the military lifestyle can have on military families.

This lifestyle also affects the families of military veterans. There are about 54,000 children in military families across the country, and if the children of these veterans are included, the number climbs to about 462,000.

The term "military literacy" in this context can be defined as being aware of the stresses that are common to the military and veteran lifestyle and how to use that knowledge when working with military and veteran families.

"As the military and veteran family community grows, there is a need for military literacy in Canada — awareness of the unique experiences of these families," said Col Dan Harris, Director of Military Family Services (MFS). "Their reality includes inherent 'military life stressors' such as high mobility, extended and/or unexpected work-related separation and risk that can have an impact on CAF parents and their children."

A new resource, in the form of a 12-page booklet, was launched this past May at the CCPA annual conference held in St. John's, Newfoundland. The goal is to have this resource in schools by the start of the 2017-18 academic year.

School Counsellors Working with Military and Veteran Families is the result of a year-long collaboration between the Canadian Counselling and Psychotherapy Association (CCPA) and the Canadian Military and Veteran Families Leadership Circle (CMVFLC), which is a component of the Military and Veteran Families in Canada Initiative.

This initiative is a partnership between the Vanier Institute of the Family, Veterans Affairs Canada and Military Family Services to build awareness, capacity, competency and community regarding military and Veteran families in Canada.

The new resource aims to answer four key questions:

• What is the military and veteran lifestyle?

• What resources are available to school counsellors to assist them in their work with children and youth of military and veteran families?

• How can school counsellors promote mental health and advocate for students of military and veteran families in schools?

• How can school counsellors support classroom teachers in their work with students of military and veteran families?

"While many military youth are both strong and resilient, some students may struggle with some of the routine challenges inherent with the military family lifestyle. A teenager may struggle with a family move that requires both social and academic adaptations," said Col Harris.

"That same teenager might also have to adjust to periods of separation from the serving parent, due to a job-related training or deployment."

He added, "School counsellors who understand the challenges associated with the military family lifestyle will be able to detect the differences between adjustment issues and personal learning styles, and between learning disabilities and distractedness."

Tips covered in the resource booklet include information on helping students adapt well to yet another "new normal," skills that are particularly important when a parent returns from a deployment or training period and reunite with the family.

As noted in the document, students of military and

veteran households are not immune to mental health concerns that affect one in five students in Canada.

The Department of National Defence's (DND) mental health continuum provides a quick guide to changes in mental health status. The terminology used in the continuum — red, orange, yellow, green — is often used by students from military and veteran families when describing mental health and wellness.

Under the Promoting Mental Health section, a student is quoted, "It feels like an orange day at home — I feel an edge about it."

Dr. Kim Hollihan, Deputy CEO of the CCPA and project lead at CCPA for this resource explained, "If they are hearing that language at home because that is the language a parent is using through therapy, it's important that school counsellors and school staff working with these youth understand what those words mean so it's just part of their everyday conversation – oh, feeling orange, ok, I know what that means "

Dr. Hollihan's involvement began at a 2015 conference of the Canadian Institute for Military and Veterans Health Research.

"They had a round table on military family issues that I attended wearing two hats, my professional hat as a leader within our association but also my military spouse hat," said Dr. Hollihan.

spouse hat," said Dr. Hollihan. Her husband is a Canadian Army (CA) artillery of-

ficer who deployed to Afghanistan when their two boys, who are now 12 and 14, were of kindergarten and pre-school age.

and pre-school age.

"That round table led to an invitation to join the Leadership Circle where the notion of military literacy was discussed. The CCPA is a very large national association with more than 6,100 members across the country in every province and territory," she said.

"We have people who

"We have people who work in the primary and secondary school systems, post-secondary, community-based agencies, government, private practice, so we thought, ok, 'What segment of our membership would have the most contact with military and veteran families?' and of course it was our school counsellors."

The School Counsellors' Chapter of CCPA was quickly onboard and the resource was finalized within one year.

"I think we were up to 30 drafts at the end because it was really important to have input from a variety of subject matter expert reviewers. We had a really strong group with both 'lived experience' in the military as well as people with professional experience with the military," she said

"I have to say it was such an easy partnership. I think that because we all worked together so well, we were able to achieve it in that one-year period. In the end, the quality of the resource really speaks to the input from all of these leaders in the field."



Looking down the road, Dr. Hollihan believes best practices will be developed and shared among the counsellors through a "community of practice" made up of members who have accumulated experience with military and veteran families.

Col Harris said he also sees feedback resulting in continued development of the resource.

"At Military Family Services, we are always listening to what families tell us, so we are in a position to collect and document the many stories we hear about the anecdotal family feedback that the resource may gen-

We are very proud to be a part of that and will actively engage and continue to look for opportunities to collaborate again and I think the outcome will certainly benefit a whole lot of children and families across the

The first publication in the series was developed in collaboration with the College of Family Physicians of Canada (CFPC) and was electronically distributed to over 35,000 family physicians in Canada, and it has received generally positive feedback.

Other subjects that may be studied for new publications include caregivers, teachers, first responders, employers, mental professionals to name a few.



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CANEX POST OFFICE HOURS CHANGE


