





> Across Manitoba municipal electors went to the polls on Wednesday, Oct. 27. As the residential area of CFB Shilo is part of the Rural Municipality of Cornwallis, representatives from Wards 5 and 6 would normally be elected to municipal council. In 2010 however, both Ward 5 candidate Kurt Wasserberg and Ward 6 candidate Ward Greer have been acclaimed, thus no need for an election in either ward. Following are profiles of both ward reps.

Experience helps to fill the | Challenges ahead for first position of Ward 5 rep



A connection to the CFB Shilo community is what helps drive Kurt Wasserberg after he was acclaimed as the Ward representative on Rural Municipality of Cornwallis council.

The 63-year-old, who has been married 43 years to wife Ingrid, is no stranger to the Cornwallis council table. Years ago he served as reeve but later resigned over differences opinion.

"Cornwallis is not run-of-the-mill your municipality in that you are surrounded by Brandon on three sides. It is sometimes difficult to get the councillors all in agreement. But it does work," he says.

Adding to the mix is the fact CFB Shilo is really part of three rural municipalities — Cornwallis on the west side of Royal Avenue. North Cyprus to the north of the Officer's Mess and South Cyprus

to the south. Cornwallis has two council members on Base, Wards 5 and 6, representing those living in the RHUs.

Because Shilo is a military establishment, Wards 5 and 6 do not operate like the rest of Cornwallis. Road and maintenance snow plowing is not a municipal responsibility, however garbage and recycling are. Among the most topical issues is dog control.

"We do have a dog catcher which is under Bylaw Enforcement in Cornwallis. We do have bylaws for how to control dogs on Base. It would be nice if copies of that bylaw was available here so that everyone knew what you can do," he informs.

A native of Germany, Wasserberg was a member of the German Army based at Shilo in the mid-1970s as part of the GATES operation. Following his retirement he drove taxi for Shilo Taxi, ran the Air Shuttle service and for two years, worked for the Commissionaires. Now fully retired, Wasserberg says he can devote his full attention to the RM of Cornwallis.

"You can call me anytime with an issue and if I'm not there, I'll call you right back. Really, I am a communityminded guy. I feel connected to the Base and I am looking forward to coming to Shilo Community Council meetings and working with the community."

Eager to learn, first time municipal council rep Ward Greer is hoping to make a difference in Ward 6 of the Rural Municipality of Cornwallis.

Husband of Jennifer Greer who works at the DSG, and father of a 14-year-old daughter and 11-year-old son, Greer took the plunge on advice from his boss, Davis Shelvey who himself was running for a spot in Ward 4. The pair work at Viper Auto Body just past the North Gate.

"Davis mentioned it to me as he is running in Ward 4. I've been thinking about getting involved in community for a while now. We have been here (Shilo) for just over one year after moving from Killarney," he says.

Admitting he doesn't know much about the position up to this point, Greer said he is looking forward to a information

Former soldier's son to tackle Mt. Everest as a Cadet

Army Cadet Warrant Officer Lucas Mayo of Winnipeg is one of 16 Army Cadets selected from across Canada to participate in the Royal Canadian Army Cadet International Expedition in the Mount Everest region of Nepal.

Mayo, 18, has been an Army Cadet for five years as a member of the 2701 Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry,

WO Mayo is following the same big boot steps as his father, Master Corporal Norm Mayo. The senior Mayo used to be a member of the Second Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry stationed at CFB/ASU Shilo.

Mayo departed Winnipeg Oct. 7 and travelled to Toronto to meet with the rest of the

expedition members. The cadets will be accompanied on their adventure by four members of the Cadet Instructor Cadre (CIC).

They will begin their journey with an acclimatization day and mountain biking tour of Kathmandu city. The days ahead will have them trek in Lukla and various other locations, participate in a cultural visit to Khumjung and Kunde Sherpa Village, trek to Everest Base Camp, followed by glacier training and white-water rafting on the Trisuli River.

Focus of this expedition will be on high altitude trekking and backpacking will introduce

mountain biking and rafting white-water under the guidance of both CIC officers and guides. Cadets experience an adventure that is challenging, rewarding and enjoyable. This experience will offer a rich selection of cultural experiences for the cadets.

The Army Cadet Expedition is the premier Army Cadet activity that challenges Army Cadets in Canada to new levels, and is the culmination of at least four years of training, requiring a superior level of fitness and maturity. This international expedition provides cadets with opportunity to the exercise self-reliance,

spirit of adventure. The expedition will also challenge cadets individually and as a group to improve their skills in decisionmaking and problem solving, teamwork and co-operation, communications, resourcefulness and time management.

The Cadet Program is a national program for youth aged 12 to 18. It is sponsored by the Department of National Defence in partnership with three civilian organizations: the Navy League, Army Cadet League, and Air Cadet League.



Letter to the Editor

CDS message on Russell Williams

Dear Editor,

1. On 21 Oct 10, Mr. Russell Williams, former Commander of 8 Wing, was sentenced to two concurrent terms of life in prison with no chance of parole for 25 years for the first-degree murders of Cpl Marie France Comeau and Mrs. Jessica Lloyd.

2. The crimes committed by Mr. Williams are deeply upsetting to us all. Over the last few months, I have spoken with many of you in town halls across the country and on missions overseas. Like all Canadians, you and I have been shocked and repulsed by the crimes he committed.

3. During these conversations, you expressed your sympathy and compassion for the victims and the families affected by this terrible tragedy. I also listened to Canadian Forces personnel of all ranks as they expressed their bewilderment and anger at the betrayal of our institutional ethos of truth, duty, and valour. Because of his heinous crimes and his subsequent criminal conviction, Mr. Williams has lost the privilege of calling himself a member of the CF community.

4. With the conviction and sentencing completed, and following my recommendation, the Governor General has revoked his commission, an extraordinary and severe decision that may constitute a first of its kind in Canadian history.

5. Further, the following actions will now be taken:

• Stripping Mr. Williams of his medals

• Termination and recovery of his pay from the date of arrest

Denial of severance pay; and

• His prompt release from the CF under "service misconduct" – which is the most serious release item possible.

6. As a consequence of his release from the CF for 'service misconduct' and of the revocation of his commission, Mr. Williams no longer possesses a rank as a member of the CF.

7. I wish to point out that under the CF Superannuation Act, there are no grounds to revoke his pension and a court martial would not have any

impact on these accrued benefits.

Some have questioned why Mr. Williams has not also been charged under the military justice system. I believe we need to understand why this is so. This is because there is no jurisdiction under the code of service discipline to try persons charged with murder where those murders took place in Canada. Mr. Williams was therefore tried and convicted of all of these 88 charges under the Criminal Code of Canada by a civilian court. Additionally there will be no further court martial on these matters because the National Defence Act specifically prevents an individual from being tried by court martial where the offence or any other

substantially similar offence arising out of the same underlying facts have been previously dealt with by a civilian court. This basic principle sometimes known as jeopardy' 'double fundamental within our civilian and military justice system. With his current convictions and sentence to life imprisonment justice has already been served.

9. Now more than ever, this is a time for us to come together and heal as a community. We are doing everything we can to assist those in need of counselling or other support. I urge anyone who is feeling upset or concerned to seek assistance and to talk about it. While doing so, we will not forget Cpl Marie France Comeau, Mrs. Jessica Lloyd, and the many other victims and their families who

will remain in our thoughts and prayers forever.

10. It is time to move forward, be strong and proud because the actions of Mr. Williams are not reflective of the values of the men and women who serve in the CF, whose integrity and self sacrifice come through loud and clear in words and deeds each day. Whether helping Canadians at home, abroad, or providing the hope of a better future to the people of Haiti, Africa or Afghanistan, I have seen our ethos of truth, duty, and valour at work and making a difference in the world. You have reason to hold your head high. Be strong and proud! I am proud to be your Chief of the Defence Staff.



Winning trebuchet design catapults EME to the top

What a better way to get back to the basics and motivate personnel than by holding a challenge in typical Artillery fashion, thus the dawn of the First Medieval Weaponry Contest began.

The contest was simple: each battery had to build a maximum of three (catapult), trebuchets one per troop and each capable of launching a projectile — the size of a tennis ball — as far as possible with as much accuracy as possible. There were a few other limitations technical that I do not want to mention as it may cause a dispute, that some of the trebuchets might have been pushing the limits of their design.

first interest was confined to a few volunteers who diligently researched and silently constructed their trebuchet in secret, but after the first display of launching the tennis balls it seemed the interest exploded. Everyone had an idea of how to improve their designs in order to wipe the floor with their opposition and so embellishments on their progress became greatly exaggerated trying to psych out the competition.

It will not be said that EME will be out done when it comes to ingenuity, motivation, and technical skill. Through research and the imaginative ideas of the light maintenance troop (LMT), spawned of the ultimate of trebuchet design and

what emerged was the

Floating Arm Trebuchet. On Sept. 14 the judgement of who had the best would come clear and the victor would lav claim to the coveted prize of the winner of the first Medieval Weaponry Contest.

Although all batteries had excellent designs and construction, it would be LMT (aka The EMEs) that would reign supreme unveil the engineering marvel that astounded all that observed the competition.

They all laughed as we motioned them to move out of the way, they all laughed as we corrected for wind and distance, but the looks on their faces as they watched with complete and utter amazement that a tennis ball flew 60 meters on our first attempt was priceless.

To the sceptics who shouted, "It was a fluke!", we launched our second ball 70 meters on the second attempt "just to rub it in."

of the contest was accuracy. The range was moved to 25 meters (the longest throw from the trebuchet with the shortest distance). Little did they know that LMT had already accounted for such events and developed a firing table and knew exactly how far their ball would travel with different weights and drops from different heights.
