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Fair offers job opportunities, education

Chilo residents look-Ding for career opportunities and advice mingled with over 20 exhibitors at the MFRC's third annual **Employment and Education** Fair on May 28. The event featured a number of local employers who are actively recruiting, educational institutions that are able to provide flexible learning environments and upgrading, and government agencies that can offer funding to help offset the cost for individuals looking to go back to school to pursue a career.

MFRC Employment and Education Coordinator Christine Helgason says that the fair has something to offer everyone but is particularly important because it gives people a chance to learn about a number of career possibilities and resources, giving them answers to all of their questions, and allowing them to come up with a plan for their future in one afternoon.

"It offers people a onestop shop for access to government agencies, to employers, and educational institutions. They can come in and talk to everybody all at once."

New employers this year included Home Depot, Service Canada Centre For Youth, and Professional Transport Driver Training School (PTDTS). Mike Dobell a career consultant with the school was excited to be part of this year's fair and said there that there is a huge demand for truck drivers in Canada right now.

"We're offering Class 1 Driver Training. We take rural rookies who've never been behind the wheel of a semi before, put them through our six-week program, and help them pass the provincial road test. We're looking at about 30,000 jobs a year in the industry in Canada."

Educators including Assiniboine Community College, Academy of Learning, and the University of Manitoba were also on hand to offer advice to visitors interested in learning about new career opportunities or looking to upgrade their current skill set. All of the institutions offer a number of flexible programs aside from the traditional academic approach.

Employment Manitoba, a provincial government organization that provides funding for qualified individuals who require financial assistance in obtaining their education was also among the exhibitors at this year's fair.

"We help people find and get jobs but also to get the education they need. We can help with resumes, jobsearching and interview skills. If you want to go to college and you need funding to go to school, we can help in that way too," says Yolanda Ducharme, an Employment Consultant with Employment Manitoba.

Debbie Hoddinott, a Shilo resident and mother of three is one example of how the Employment and Education Fair can open up doors for people looking to make a positive change in their lives.

"I have completed one year of a two year diploma program for Business Administration, Financial Specialty at Assiniboine Community College. I am now working at Westoba Credit Union for the summer for my co-op placement as part of the program."

Hoddinott, had to quit her job in Wainwright, Alberta when her husband was posted to Shilo in 2005 before deploying for Afghanistan. Searching for new career and education options, she attended last year's fair and it helped her plan out a path for her future.

"I came away will a lot of information about the dif-

ferent education programs out there which helped me decide that Assiniboine Community College was the right path to start my education to achieve my diploma and give me the first two years of a Business Degree."

While Hoddinott admits that there have been challenges including taking care of her family while her husband is deployed and going back to school as a mature student, she believes the rewards have outweighed the costs. She encourages everyone seeking career advice to attend the annual fair, including her 16 year-old son.

"He attended the Employment/Education Fair this year and he managed to talk to several people about his career goals. He got a lot of information about different programs he could do and even filled out an application for a job while we were there. He is now working on his education plans past high school and is very excited about his options."

This year's Employ-

ment and Education fair took place from 2 to 8 pm at Shilo's MFRC and was capped off by an evening barbeque. Anyone who needs assistance in finding or planning for employment, or has any follow up questions following the fair is encouraged to contact Christine Helgason at 765-3000 extension 3227.



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New Padre prepares for deployment


For many years Capt. Darren Persaud has been seeking out a spiritual career. He never imagined that working with Canadian soldiers in Afghanistan would be a part of it until very recently.

"I remember walking into the recruiting office on September 8, 2001 three days before September 11. I always wondered how that event would affect my own life."

The new 34 year-old Padre was called up in mid-January for deployment with Shilo's 2 PPCLI for the TF 1-08 Battle Group while serving in North Bay. Persaud comes from a mixed Catholic and Mennonite heritage and has already had a wealth of diverse military experience from flying in CF-18 Hornets in Cold Lake and forest fighting in British Columbia to deploying as a TAV (Technical Advisor Visit) in Kabul, Afghanistan. Persaud says he is looking forward to going back to Afghanistan in a more permanent role and with greater responsibility.

"There's no greater place for a chaplain to be than deployed with the troops. Deployment is so demanding on both soldiers and their families. It is an honour to hear what the soldiers are feeling and to share their trust. I've seen some dark sides and dark times and it's a chal-

lenge to deal with that.

Persaud believes that the battle group will be exceptionally well-trained and is preparing the soldiers for battle spiritually by dealing with the challenges they will be faced with ahead of time.

"Can I kill someone? What happens if someone close to me is killed? What will happen to my family? We have to think and talk about these questions before we go so that when we get there no one is living with doubt or regrets. You never know exactly what to expect and I'll be standing there with them in times of both indescribable grief and great joy."

The Padre also supports the diversity of faiths in today's CF and welcomes efforts that are made to support all of the military family's spiritual groups.

"The old [military] faith model supported mainly Protestants and Catholics. That no longer works in countries as diverse as Canada. A chaplain in the CF should be rooted in their own spirituality but also be in dialogue with other groups because it enriches and enhances our faith. We need to listen to where Canadians are at and respond to their needs and not only our own particular denominations."

While Persaud is looking forward to working with Canadian soldiers in Afghanistan as well as local elders and other Afghans to build a relationship of trust and respect, he says he is enjoying his brief time in Shilo before the troops deploy next February.

"I love it here. I'm new here but I'm already realizing that this is a fantastic group of people to work with. Every day is so different and it spurs you on to become a better minister. If I can help a soldier foster the seed that God puts in each of us... to me that's an amazing thing."

Persaud is not an ordained priest but has received his Master of Divinity from the University of Toronto. In addition to his M.Div., he has a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of New Brunswick, a degree in Advanced Counseling from George Brown College, and has completed two years of mission work. Persaud and the members of the 2 PPCLI led TF 1-08 Battle Group will leave for the Kandahar region of Afghanistan in February 2008.

Conducting a job search can be a daunting task, especially when your search will be in a market you are not familiar with. So, first things first, make sure your resume is in order and then hit the streets running – or in this case, let your fingers do the walking. Here are some websites where vacant positions are posted:

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

Relay inspires local girl

housands of flicker-I ing candles lit up the clear night sky at Brandon's Riverbank Discovery Centre as onlookers cheered on the participants in the Canadian Cancer Society's 'Relay For Life.' Representing Shilo in the grueling 12-hour event which kicked off on June 1 were the '10 Musketeers,' a group assembled entirely through the efforts of 14 yearold team captain and Shilo resident Lauren Lambkin.

"When my mom was diagnosed with cancer earlier in 2006 I decided I wanted to become a team captain this year and put a team together," says Lambkin.

Lambkin first became interested in the relay last year when the cadets volunteered for the relay.

"I'm a cadet. The cadets volunteered for Relay for Life last year but I wasn't able to

attend. This year when I saw the ads go up, I knew I wanted to put together a team."

Lambkin's team of ten included five adults and five teenagers as well as two unregistered babies. The purpose of the annual event is to raise money to contribute to finding a cure to one of Canada's most deadly diseases. Lambkin worked hard to fundraise and was pleased with her team's contribution.

"We were out there for over 12 hours, we didn't get home until 8 a.m. Our team alone raised \$1117.25 and \$800 of that I raised myself."


Last year 663 participants in the Brandon relay raised \$122,044 and Manitoba's contribution was nearly \$800,000.

Lambkin says the part of the event that she'll always remember were the luminaries which lit up the track as the participants completed lap after lap. Luminaries are white bags filled with sand

that hold a tea-lite candle inside and remind participants and onlookers of those who have won and lost battles with cancer as well as those who are still fighting the disease. Lambkin inscribed the words "stay strong... have hope... just believe" on a luminary she personally purchased to honour her mother.

The event kicked off Friday

evening on June 1 and featured live entertainment, opening ceremonies that included a massive balloon release, and an opening lap which was completed by many of the community's cancer survivors. Despite constant efforts to find a cure, cancer remains one of Canada's most fatal diseases and will kill over 70,000 Canadians this year.

Troops prepare for Dutch adventure

ast year on the first ⊿day of the Nijmegen March, the scorching July sun and temperatures of over 42 degrees celsius sent 69 people to hospital where two died from heat exhaustion. This year, four of CFB Shilo's soldiers are hoping to be more successful as they prepare for the journey to the Netherlands where they will march over 40 kilometers a day for four days in full uniform while carrying a ten kilogram pack and heavy water supply.

Pte Jason Prefontaine and Cpl Brad Lebel from Base Maintenance and Cpl Stefan Oxelgren and Cpl Charles Bernard from 731 Signals Squadron will be joining several other soldiers from across Canada to form the LFWA contingent in the march which begins on July 17.

"Shilo's providing four people to join 11 from LFWA, the entire Canadian team is somewhere around 200 people," says Cpl Oxelgren.

Pte Prefontaine says the soldiers decided to get involved because it's a unique chance to see part of the world, stay in good shape, and participate in a once in a lifetime experience.

"We all know people that have done it before and they've said it was a great time. It helps you can get in shape and it's a free trip to Holland. It's a great test of your abilities."

Traditionally, thousands of participants have dropped out of the march during and after the first day due to a combination of severe physical exhaustion and extreme heat. The group from Shilo believes they will have what it takes to make it to the finish line on the fourth day as they have been training hard with the full support of their respective units.

"Our units have been really supportive. We've taken time off work and sometimes start at 7:00 am and march all day. We march three days a week and spend one day in the gym. Most of the people who get sick are civilians. We'll be prepared and ready," says Cpl Oxelgren.

The Nijmegen March is a four day march in the Netherlands which started in 1909 in efforts to keep Dutch soldiers fit as vehicles began to be used more frequently in the army.

"The Dutch government started it as a military training exercise to get all their troops marching and as time went on it became more commemorative," says Cpl Lebel.


The four soldiers have been training in full gear for nearly two months and are looking forward to completing the arduous march as well as looking forward to some sightseeing in the Netherlands. Participants who complete the march receive medals including the 'Vierdaagse Cross,' an official Dutch medal that can be worn with military uniform.

"There are individual medals for finishing four days of forty kilometers each. If you finish with a minimum of ten people in your team you also get a team medal," explains Oxelgren.

In addition to the approximately 45,000 participants, over one million spectators come to watch the march and attend the 'Vierdaagsefeesten,' week-long festival with a famous fireworks display and live entertainment. The Nijmegen March will be celebrating its 91st year in the Dutch city of Nijmegen this year and is the largest walking event in the world. It takes place every year unless there are extreme circumstances, such as a war, that force its cancellation.



Canada mourns four fallen soldiers



TTAWA- MCpl Darrell Jason Priede, a military Imagery Technician serving with the International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) Regional Command (South) Headquarters at Kandahar Airfield, was killed when the helicopter in which he was a passenger went down at approximately 9 p.m. Kandahar time on Mav 30, near the town of Kajaki, Helmand Province, about 95 kms northwest of Kandahar City. MCpl Priede was a member of the Army News Team from 3 Area Support Group, based at CFB Gagetown. His next of kin have been notified.

The other six non-Canadian military personnel aboard the helicopter were also killed in the incident. No further details are available at this time. ISAF is investigating the cause of the incident.

The thoughts and prayers of the men and women of the Canadian Forces go out to the family and friends of the deceased.

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1 5 WING, MOOSE JAW - The Canadian Forces Snowbirds will return home to 15 Wing, Moose Jaw, by CC-130 Hercules aircraft, during the evening of Monday, May 21, following the tragic aircraft accident that claimed the life of their teammate and friend, Capt Shawn McCaughey.

"It is important for our team to return home to our family, friends and fellow teammates to mourn together during this difficult time," said Maj Robert Mitchell, Commanding Officer, Canadian Forces Snowbirds, "Our thoughts and prayers are with Shawn's family - they are our priority at this time."

A memorial service for Capt Shawn McCaughey was held Friday, May 25 at 15 Wing Moose Jaw with full military honours.

"The memorial service will pay tribute and honour Shawn's life," said Maj Mitchell. "Shawn was a passionate and talented pilot, a dedicated and devoted member of the Canadian Forces and a dear friend."

The Canadian Forces Flight Safety Investigative Team will continue their work in Montana to determine the cause of the accident. The highly-qualified team of experts will investigate all aspects of the flight to prevent reoccurrence.

An Improvised Explosive Device claimed the life of a Canadian soldier on May 25. Cpl Matthew McCully was killed while conducting a joint Afghan-Canadian foot patrol approximately 35 kilometres outside

of Kandahar City.

The Honourable Gordon
O'Connor, Minister of National Defence, recognized
Cpl McCully's ultimate sacrifice.

"Through the dedication and bravery of soldiers like

Corporal McCully, Canada is helping Afghans, and working with Afghans, to build a better and brighter future for Afghanistan while ensuring that Afghanistan never again becomes a base for terrorism," said the minister in a statement made on May 25, "The sacrifice Cpl McCully made in honour of Canada and the Canadian people will not be forgotten."

Cpl McCully's family also released a statement upon the death of the soldier.

"Matthew died doing what he wanted to do and doing what he truly believed in. Matthew will be greatly missed, he will be remembered as our and Canada's Hero."

Cpl McCully was a Signals Operator, based at 2 CMBG Headquarters and Signals Squadron, Petawawa, Ontario.



The Maple Leaf -- Cpl Christopher Deliva, a member of 5 Service Battalion, died as the result of an accident at CFB Wainwright, Alta., May 28.

Cpl Deliva was driving alone in a 10-tonne truck when the vehicle flipped over while rounding a curve. He was part of a technical logistic assistance team taking part in training for Joint Task Force Afghanistan that had been un-

derway at Wainwright for the past month. Cpl Deliva was not part of the group of soldiers scheduled to leave for Afghanistan in July.

"Our thoughts are with the family, as shown by the many written messages I have received from his brothers and sisters in arms, which I am sending to his family today," said LCol Nicolas Eldaoud, commanding officer of 5 Canadian Service Battalion.

The family of Cpl Deliva released a statement following the accident.

"'Christopher was a CF member, and it is our hope that all soldier's parents are as proud of their children as we are."

An investigation into the causes of the accident is being conducted by military police at CFB Wainwright.

Cozy, classic tastes await at Crang

rang's Restaurant May 17, 2007

After a day of running barefoot for dozens of miles in blistering temperatures that usually exceed 40 degrees Celsius, the Nan Bushmen of Africa's wild Kalahari desert come home to a hearty and delectable meal of Hoodai cactus garnished with that most titillating of culinary delights, the Mongogo nut.

In the often difficult but worthwhile and noble pursuit that is the military lifestyle, CF soldiers are also exposed to a wide variety of frustrating elements. While the Nan of the Kalahari face dehydration, poisonous snakes, and scorpions, Shilo's soldiers spend months at a time training for battle in scorching summer temperatures and freezing winter ice storms. Perhaps of greater concern, Manitoba's spring thaw brings out the most insipid and hideous of creatures from their lair, black swarms of that carnivorous and greatly feared parasite, the prairie mosquito.

In this hostile and treacherous environment, with few desert cacti to go around, what can today's military men and women rely on as they desperately seek out sustenance? The answer can be found at the glimmering oasis that is Crang's Restaurant in the Shilo Inn off Royal Avenue.

Recently and tastefully renovated, this calm, quiet, and warmly lit eatery offers diners an almost unbelievable array of menu choices from breakfast to dinner and even offers delivery. After hearing only good things from local customers, Becky and I, hoping to celebrate the Baha'i Feast of Azamat on May 17 in our own way, decided to make the pilgrimage to Crang's to discover for ourselves if what we heard was true.

An intimate table setting greeted us at a comfortable booth as relaxing music played softly in the background. We were personally greeted by the restaurant's owner who went from table to table ensuring that the quality of the food was adequate and that his clientele were completely satisfied with their meal.

Service was somewhat relaxed but friendly and the menu included, among other things, a wide-variety of breakfast items, sandwiches, burgers, pasta, pizza, and chicken platters. Price was very reasonable and I forgot all about Mongogo nuts and stinging desert scorpions when my lunch special arrived. Steaming hot and deliciously rich homemade cream of mushroom soup with large mushroom slices cleansed my palate and prepared me for what was to come. Flawlessly prepared Chicken Parmesan and spaghetti enraptured in a hearty tomato meatsauce complete with generously buttered garlic toast were placed before me after I sampled Crang's locally famous potato fries. After stuffing myself senseless, our waitress brought me a particularly creamy and surprisingly urbane vanilla pudding for desert.

Becky's bacon cheeseburger had a distinctly smoky homestyle barbeque flavour and was blanketed in a fresh bun, topped with crisp garden-variety lettuce, tomato, pickle, and onion. The members of our dining party were thoroughly engorged and completely satisfied with the quantity and quality of our meals when we left.

Somewhere in the world, a blazing desert sun sets in a hazy amber sky and a deadly scorpion skitters out from under a large rock preparing for his nightly feast. A family of cacti cry out into the gathering darkness as one of their own has been stolen from them, never to be seen again. While the world is full of many dark mysteries and peculiar food choices. I choose to save such adventures for another time. Crang's is without a doubt one of Shilo's most completely rewarding culinary experiences and I'm happy to say we'll be back again. This year's Feast of Azamat will be remembered for many months to come.

The story behind Father's Day

Hunter, gatherer, man of the family, father figure—however they are perceived, fathers have long played an important role in nurturing and supporting their children. The story behind the first Father's Day and celebrations that followed are testament to the high regard and appreciation held for fathers around the world.

"For centuries, fathers everywhere have been strong role models," says Jennifer Kinnon of Hallmark Canada. "These days, as fathers get even more involved in family life, it's important to put them in the spotlight on Father's Day and show how much you care."

The first Father's Day tribute dates back nearly

4,000 years ago. A Babylonian youth named Elmesu carved the first known Father's Day card in clay with a special message that wished his father good health and a long life.

Father's Day as we know it today, was first created by Sonora Smart Dodd of Spokane, Washington. While listening to a Mother's Day sermon, she was compelled to establish a celebration for fathers as well. Dodd's father, a widower and Civil War veteran, raised her and five siblings for 21 years after their mother died.

Dodd encouraged local churches to institute a day of observance for fathers and chose June 19, 1910 as the first celebration since her father was born in June. Even though it was widely celebrated for decades, Fa-

ther's Day wasn't officially recognized as a national day of observance until 1972.

From early on, many countries, including Canada, chose to adopt Father's Day as a national celebration and with few exceptions, most celebrate on the third Sunday in June.

Around the world, families recognize fathers by spending the day together and showering them with cards and gifts as expressions of love and appreciation. Hallmark has been making Father's Day cards since the 1920s and now offers close to 800 different kinds of cards that not only recognize biological fathers, but other father figures including stepfathers, grandfathers, brothers, sons-in-law and uncles.


