Reserve soldiers train in urban environment

Continuing a half-century cross border defence partnership, Canadian reserve soldiers refreshed their artillery skills and built confidence in urban environments by firing 105 mm howitzers and conducting urban operations training at Fort Lewis, WA, June 3 and 4.

During the exercise, Vancouver Police Department Emergency Response Team experts assisted the gunners in adapting their skills to the challenges of operating in an unpredictable urban environment.

"We're looking for thinking soldiers. The most important thing you can do is to communicate. Soldiers that go around corners by themselves will not be coming back," says LCol Dan Kuhn, Commanding Officer of 15th Field Artillery. LCol Kuhn, a Home Depot Canada executive, has also served as a senior multinational liaison officer in Bosnia.

West coast artillery and other units fire in Fort Lewis and Yakima, WA, because the nearest suitable Canadian ranges are in Alberta. Like other reserve units, the 5th (British Columbia) and 15th Field Artillery Regiments, Royal Regiment of Canadian Artillery, are based in communities on Vancouver Island and in Greater Vancouver. Their soldiers train one evening a week and one weekend each month in addition to their civilian jobs - to conduct continental operations at home and on

overseas operations.

For example, MBdr Derek Newton, a howitzer detachment commander and fourth year civil engineering student, has exercised eight times in Fort Lewis, and eight times in Yakima, since he joined the reserves in 1997. Having served with SFOR in Bosnia, he understood the importance of practicing full spectrum operations among "civilians" in Leschi Town the new, state of the art urban operations centre in the Fort Lewis training area.

"We need to know both infantry and artillery skills," says MBdr Newton. "We're gunners first, but we must understand how to fight as infantry."

In April, MBdr Newton acted as a pallbearer for his friend, Bdr Myles Mansell, who was killed by an Improvised Explosive Device with three other Canadians in Afghanistan. Canada has deployed approximately 2,300 soldiers to support stabilization and reconstruction efforts in the Taliban stronghold. Sixteen soldiers and one diplomat have died there.

Another Victoria artillery soldier, Sgt Fraser Thompson, shared MBdr Newton's assessment. A veteran of a 1992-1993 UN peace-keeping tour in Cyprus, Sgt Thompson now works at CFB Esquimalt Base Operations. "It's going to be interesting," he said as he prepared to lead a foot patrol. "I've done house clearing before, when everyone was a 'bad guy.' Now, you have civilians mixed in there."

Canadian soldiers trained at Fort Lewis in 1950 for

the Korean War, where the Second Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, earned a U.S. Presidential Unit Citation at the Battle of Kapyong. Later, the Third Battalion PPCLI, based at Work Point Barracks between 1970 and 1994, was

a frequent visitor to Fort Lewis for major manoeuvres and live fire exercises.

The relationship has continued through cross-border exercises and exchanges to the recent loan of Canadian LAV III light armoured vehicles to help establish the

Stryker program.

Fort Lewis has become a major centre of U.S. Army Transformation, due the trials of the Stryker wheeled brigade combat team concept there - the conversion of its former heavy armour and light infantry brigades

to the new concept - and their deployments overseas.

Leschi Town and other facilities are heavily booked for U.S. operational requirements, but sometimes become available for Canadian guests who lack equivalent facilities at home.



It's not always easy to know if a medical problem needs emergency care. In some situations, emergency medical treatment is a must. Other conditions are best dealt with by your family doctor or at a local health clinic.

How do you decide?

Understanding how an emergency room works may help you decide if you need to go there. When you arrive, a nurse will speak with you and decide the urgency and level of care you need:

1. Emergency

Heart attack, major trauma, severe head injury, amputation, severe difficulty breathing (due to an allergic reaction or other cause), anytime a patient is unconscious, severe bleeding

2. Urgent

Head injury but still awake, deep cut, foreign body in the eyes or ears, high fever in an infant or toddler, chest pain (not related to a known heart problem), signs of serious infection

3. Less Urgent

Possible fracture/sprain, back pain, skin/wound infection, headaches (migraines)

4. Not Urgent

Colds, minor cuts, bites, sore throat, sinus problems

If you think it's an emergency or urgent, don't hesitate!

How long will I wait?

Patients are seen by a doctor in order of need, not time of arrival. Arriving by ambulance does not always mean you will be seen sooner than other patients. How long you wait will depend on:

- how urgently you need care
- how urgently others in the emergency room need care
- how busy the emergency room is when you arrive

Are there other choices?

- Contact Health Links-Info Santé for answers to questions about common health concerns. This telephone health information service is staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week by knowledgeable, experienced nurses and free of charge everywhere in Manitoba. Call 788-8200 in Winnipeg or 1-888-315-9257 toll-free elsewhere in the province.
- Your family doctor, local health clinic or Urgent Care Centre (Misericordia Health Centre) may be a better choice than your local emergency room to treat mild or chronic headaches, back pain or stomach pain; minor cuts or burns; colds, sore throat or sinus problems.
- For broken bones, sprains, cuts or bruises, the Pan Am Minor Injury Clinic is open seven days a week (weekdays, 8 am to 8 pm; weekends, 10 am to 6 pm).

What else can I do?

- Ask about your family doctor's regular office hours and after-hours availability. Your doctor knows your family history best. Many provide 24-hour response to their patients.
- Ensure you and your family have enough prescribed medication over holidays and weekends.
- If you have a chronic illness, keep your regularly scheduled appointments with your doctor. Be sure you understand your doctor's advice and ask what changes in your condition would require medical attention.

If you're not sure, call *Health Links-Info Santé* – 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

All terrain vehicle safety

Editors Note: On June 4th, 2006, a accident occurred at CFB Shilo. Two Shilo males were riding their quads on the path behind the RAU patch when a serious accident took both to hospital with severe injuries.

An investigation is ongoing and the Shilo Military Police have asked that if anyone has any information about this accident to please contact them at extension 3337. At this point in the investigation, it doesn't appear that alcohol was a factor and that both men were wearing safety gear.

Summer is here, and for many of us that means heading our to the trails and off-roading on our ATV's.

The term all-terrain vehicle is used in a general sense to describe any of a number of small open motorized buggies and tricycles designed for off-road use. In recent years, ATV's have become very popular for the outdoor enthusiast. Trails and designated ATV use areas seem to have sprung up over night.

With increased exposure has come an increase in the ATV related injuries and fatalities - most of them preventable. An ATV takes a great deal of skill and judgment to operate safely. Speed, lack of helmets and suitable Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), inexperienced riders and alcohol/drug use are common factors in ATV accidents.

With any vehicle, from ATV to tractor-trailer, there is no substitute for a responsible driver. Obviously, ATV's offer less personal protection than an enclosed vehicle. An ATV doesn't come equipped with, fenders, doors or airbags to protect you in the event of a crash. The best protection is preparation and a positive safety attitude.

Before you purchase

your ATV, do your research. All ATV's must be registered and insured in the Province of Manitoba. Check with the Manitoba Public Insurance branch for registration, insurance and licensing requirements. In addition to provincial requirements, CFB Shilo requires that all off-road vehicles register with the community recreation office in the community center.

There is no substitution for proper safety training. The Manitoba Safety Council (MSC) offers one-day training course for ATV Safety consisting of in-class theory and practical lessons. Courses are offered in Brandon on an as-needed basis. For more information, contact the MSC at (204) 949-1085.

ATV's are not toys. Keep your children off them. By Manitoba laws, no person under the age of 16 is allowed to operate ATV's on public land. They must also be in possession of a valid drivers license. Inexperienced riders, regardless of age, should be closely supervised by an experienced rider.

Before you head out, do a pre-ride check. Always read the instruction manual for use, maintenance and pre-ride checks. A pre-ride check should include, as a minimum;

-Tires and wheels. Make sure your tires are inflated as per the manufacturers instructions. Check for wear and tear, gouges and foreign material in the tread

-Fluid levels - check oil levels, brake fluid levels etc.

-Throttle cables - check your front and rear brake and chassis cables for defects.

Ride with others-never alone. If you're involved in an accident off-road, you're on your own.

Never ride under the influence of alcohol or drugs. There are things that are stupider, but the list is short.

Don't ride double. The majority of ATV's manufactured are designed for a single rider. The large seat on an ATV is designed to allow the driver to distribute their weight properly and move around to balance the ATV.

Use approved Personal

Protective Equipment (PPE).

-Helmets are mandatory in the Province of Manitoba. Not just any helmet will do. Ensure that your helmet meets CSA standards and inspect it before each use. If your helmet gets banged around, replace it. If you're not using a full-face helmet, mouth protection is important to keep that smile on your face.

-Goggles should wrap around and enclose the eye to prevent bugs, dirt and debris from flying up under the edge and lodging in the eyes.

-The entire body should be covered in clothing made of a sturdy fabric. Long sleeved shirts or jackets, gloves, boots and long sturdy pants will act as a barrier between you and the road if you're thrown from your ATV.

Utility trailers are meant to carry cargo, not people. Many serious accidents have occurred when people are joy riding in utility trailers. If you're use a trailer, inspect the hitch before you drive, center you and secure your load ensuring the cargo weight is distributed evenly and adjust your speed for the added weight.

Keep to the speed limit. Speed is one of the top contributors to ATV accidents. Speed limits in built up areas on CFB Shilo, including the access routes behind the MQ's is 30 kms/hour. On Range trails the speed limit is 50 km/hour. Remember, maximum speed limits are for ideal conditions only! The trails are not groomed and you're sure to find bumps and ruts around every bend. Also, take into consideration environmental factors such as rain and fog and adjust your speed accordingly.

Know the laws of the area that you are riding in. Before you hop on your ATV - Know the MB Off-Road Vehicles Act.

Notice of Public Hearing and Pre-Hearing Conference

Applicant: The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation

APPLICANT:

The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation (the Corporation) has applied to The Public Utilities Board (the Board) for approval of the Corporation's 2007 base rates and premiums charged for compulsory driver and vehicle insurance. The application is being filed pursuant to *The Crown Corporations Public Review and Accountability Act* and *The Public Utilities Board Act*.

RATE IMPACT

The Corporation is requesting approval for basic Autopac rates effective March 1, 2007, which would decrease its overall premium revenue by 2.6 per cent. However, the changes proposed for 2007/2008 affect average base premiums for each major vehicle use category as listed below.

These changes will affect the major vehicle classes as follows:

Commercial	40,855	5.4%
Public	9,913	-2.4%
Motorcycles	9,476	8.4%

- \bullet 53,439, or 6.2% of vehicles to receive no change in rate;

- 11,954, or 1.4% of vehicles to receive an increase between \$50 and \$100; and,
- \bullet 6,180, or 0.7% of vehicles to receive an increase greater than \$100.

Actual changes to an individual's premium vary depending on the owner's claim experience, driving record, insurance use, territory and vehicle rate group. The cumulative effect of these variations on individual rates all fall within the dollar amounts described above.

No changes are proposed to fleet rebates and surcharges, existing driver's licence premiums or accident surcharges, other existing time payment fees or other existing service and transaction fees.

PARTICULARS OF THE APPLICATION:

The Corporation proposes the following rate adjustments for policies issued between March 1, 2007 and February 29, 2008.

- Experience-based rate adjustments ranging from +15% to -15% for individual classes, with the
 exception of mopeds, trailers (\$2,500 or less), and off-road vehicles.
- Combined classification offsets ranging from -3.31% to 11.11%, for all vehicles other than motorcycles, trailers and off-road vehicles, to achieve revenue neutrality.
- \bullet Capping all rate changes at 20%, except for an average increase of 94.8% for mopeds and an average decrease of 73.2% for motorscooters.
- Harmonizing moped and motorscooter rates.

RATE VARIATIOI

Rates for services by The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation shall be reviewed by The Public Utilities Board under *The Public Utilities Board Act* and no change in rates for services shall be made and no new rates for services shall be introduced without the approval of The Public Utilities Board. Rates for services means in the case of The Manitoba Public Insurance Corporation, rate bases and premiums charged for compulsory driver and vehicle insurance provided by that Corporation. Upon any application to it, the Board may make an Order granting the whole or part only of the application or may grant such further or other relief in addition to or in substitution for that applied for, as fully and in all respects as if the application had been for such partial, further or other relief.

HFARING:

The Board will hold a public hearing at the Public Utilities Board Hearing Room, 4th Floor, 330 Portage Avenue, Winnipeg, MB, commencing at 9:00 a.m., October 2, 2006.

RURAL MEETINGS:

Based on the public's response to this notice and other notices, the Board is prepared to convene meetings in Brandon or such other locations as are warranted by the response. People who intend to appear are to write the Board's Secretary confirming the location where they wish to appear. Notice of intention should be mailed to the Board by August 7, 2006.

Confirmation of these meetings will appear in future notices. Interested parties may also contact the Board office for details.

PROCEDURE:

The Board's Rules of Practice and Procedure will apply to the conduct of the General Rate Hearing. - ii) to establish status of certain applicant interveners; and
- iii) to establish a timetable for the orderly exchange of evidence and information.

Persons wishing to address the public hearing in French are required to notify the Board's Secretary prior to August 7, 2006 and if possible at the PHC.

Interveners shall be persons, firms or corporations wishing to examine witnesses, or to provide evidence, or to make submissions and final argument. Interveners should notify the Board of their intention to do so by applying to the Secretary of the Board immediately.



Protect your pet: Canine Parvovirus Disease in Shilo

Editors Note: There have been three confirmed cases of Canine Parvovirus disease in Shilo recently. This information can help you identify the symptoms of the disease and how to best protect your pet.

What is Canine Parvo?

Canine parvovirus (CPV) is a severe and highly contagious disease that predominantly affects puppies. It first appeared in 1977 and now is found worldwide.

How does a dog become infected with parvovirus?

parvovirus, Canine as the name suggests, is caused by a virus. The main source of virus is from the feces of infected dogs, although their vomitus or saliva can also contain viral particles. Susceptible animals become infected by ingesting the virus. It is then carried to the intestine where it invades the intestinal wall and causes inflammation.

Unlike many other viruses, CPV is very stable in the environment and is resistant to heat, detergents and alcohol. The virus can be carried on the hair or feet of infected dogs, as well as contaminated shoes, clothes or other objects. Direct contact between dogs is not required to transmit the virus. Susceptible dogs will usually become ill within 7 to 10 days of the initial infection.

How does this disease affect the dog?

Typically, affected animals exhibit severe vomiting and diarrhea, with vomiting usually presenting first. The diarrhea may or may not contain blood. They are often depressed, feverish and disinterested in food. Because the virus causes the loss of the intestinal lining, dehydration, electrolyte (sodium and potassium) imbalances, and septicemia (infection in the bloodstream) may occur. The animal will likely die without aggressive treatment. Parvo may affect dogs of all ages, but puppies less than five months old are often the most severely affected and the most difficult to treat

> How is parvovirus diagnosed?

of CPV infection can mimic other diseases causing vomiting and diarrhea, diagnosis can be a challenge. It can be confirmed by testing for virus in the stool. Occasionally, a dog will have parvovirus but test negative for virus in the stool; this is uncommon. A tentative diagnosis can be based on the presence of a reduced white blood cell count (leukopenia). However, some Parvo dogs may not necessarily be leukopenic. In dogs that do have leukopenia, follow-up blood samples can help determine the severity of the infection and the likelyhood of recovery.

Can it be treated successfully?

Because nothing can kill the virus in infected dogs (the dog's own immune system has to fight it over time), treatment is aimed instead at controlling the symptoms. The first step is to correct dehydration and electrolyte imbalances by the administration of intravenous fluids. Antibiotics and anti-inflammatory drugs are given to prevent or control septicemia. Antispasmodic drugs may be required to inhibit severe diarrhea and vomiting. The length of hospital stay varies from a few days to over a week, depending on the severity of the disease. After recovery, a bland diet and possibly antibiotics are required for several weeks to allow healing of the intestinal lining.

What is the survival rate?

Most dogs with CPV infection recover if aggressive treatment is used and if therapy is initiated before severe septicemia and dehydration occur. For reasons not fully understood, some breeds, notably the Rottweiler, Doberman pinscher and German Shepherd have a higher fatality rate than other breeds.

Can parvovirus be prevented?

Proper vaccination is the best method of protecting your dog against CPV infection. Puppies receive a vaccination against parvovirus as part of their multiple-agent vaccine at

Since the clinical signs 8, 12 and 16 weeks of age. In some situations, veterinarians will give the vaccine at two week intervals and/or additional boosters at 18 to 20 weeks of age. After the initial series of puppy vaccinations, all dogs should be boostered at least once a year. Bitches should be boostered within two weeks of whelping in order to transfer protective antibodies to the puppies.

Can parvovirus occur in my vaccinated puppy?

Although antibodies obtained from the mother's milk help protect the puppies from infection during the first months of life, they also interfere with the puppy's response to vaccination. There may be a lapse in protection as maternal antibody declines and before the puppy responds to vaccination. Despite these possibilities, proper vaccination is still the best means of prevention we have.

Is there a way to kill the virus in the environment?

It is important to properly disinfect contaminated areas since the virus is so stable in the environment. Clean food bowls, water bowls, and other contaminated items with a solution of 1/2 cup of chlorine bleach in a gallon of water (133mL in 4 liters of water). Clothing, blankets and towels should also be soaked in this solution since regular washing and drying will not kill the virus.

How do I minimize a puppy's exposure to the virus?

Puppies are most susceptible between the ages of 6 to 20 weeks. Be cautious! Avoid areas that are contaminated with feces and clean up feces from your own animal. Even an apparently healthy dog can be a "carrier" of infection and shed the virus in their feces or saliva. By the second set of vaccinations, most puppies are protected against parvovirus. Still, large amounts of the virus can overcome this protection (for example, ingesting vomitus from a sick animal). So continue to take precautions until the vaccination series is complete.



New beast in town

D-News

ARPA (Defense Advanced Research Projects Agency) and the U.S. Army recently unveiled the Crusher unmanned ground combat vehicle. Crusher is a six-wheeled, all-wheel drive, hybrid electric, skidsteered, unmanned ground vehicle. The vehicle weighs 14,000 pounds fully fueled, and is designed to carry a 3,000-pound payload - at this 17,000 pound total weight, two Crusher vehicles can be carried by a single C-130H aircraft at substantial range. If desired, Crusher can carry up to 8,000 pounds of payload and armor without compromising its mobility.

Crusher represents a new class of unmanned ground combat vehicles (UGCVs). It is a highly mobile vehicle designed from the outset to be unmanned. It is being equipped with state-of-the-art perception capabilities, and will be used to validate the key technologies necessary for an unmanned ground vehicle to perform military missions autonomously. Crusher will be equipped with representative sensing and weapons payloads for planned field experiments.

"The technologies embodied in the Crusher vehicles provide a glimpse into the future of autonomous ground platforms. The Crusher and its predecessor, the Spinner, demonstrate the realm of the possible with regard to a combination of autonomous behaviors, hybrid electric propulsion and robust vehicle design," stated Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Army (Research and Technology) Dr. Thomas Killion. "All of this combines to give the Soldier greatly enhanced standoff capabilities with minimum impact on workload."

"The two new Crusher vehicles are a major improvement in unmanned ground vehicle capability," added Larry Jackel, DARPA UGCV-Perception for Off-Road Robots Integration (UPI) program manager. "The original Spinner UGCV is an excellent platform, but in shakeout experiments, the new Crushers have already outperformed Spinner in all aspects. Combined with its autonomous control system, the Crusher defines the state-of-the-art in autonomous unmanned ground vehicles systems."

The UPI program will conduct rigorous field experiments of the two Crusher vehicles and their perception experiments planned at Fort Carson, Colorado, this summer. The program will culminate in 2007 with Army users operating Crusher vehicles during representative missions in natural terrain. The UPI effort will merge all Crusher functions (mission planning, perception monitoring, vehicle monitoring, and payload operation) into an operator workstation interface and determine interaction requirements via experimentation

and payload systems, with



Crusher is able to negotiate difficult terrain such as steep ditches - head on or by angle - even on side slopes of 30°.

What is your title and what do you do at the MFRC?

I am the Outreach and Deployment Coordinator. 
How do you spell volunteer appreciation? Shilo MFRC Volunteers "We Build Community!"


