## **Freedom of the City**

Military parade will be held in Brandon Saturday, April 14, as First Regiment Royal Canadian Horse Artillery (1RCHA) will exercise its Freedom of the City of Brandon. The event will get underway at 10:00am near Brandon City Hall.

The granting of the Freedom of the City is a traditional means for a municipality to honour a unit of the Canadian Forces. It had its beginning in medieval Europe, when cities were walled and the citizens looked to their defences at the approach of a threatening army. When the force was friendly, however, it was permitted to pass into or through the city without first being required to disarm: that is, with bayonets fixed, colours flying and drums beating.

The granting is a private matter between civic officials and the unit concerned and the decision to grant this symbolic freedom rests with the municipal authorities. A unit may exercise its freedom as arranged between the civic authorities and the unit. 1RCHA was granted its Freedom of the City of Brandon on May 25, 1996.

Nearly 300 members of 1RCHA will march from the Armoury on 11<sup>th</sup> Street along Victoria Avenue to 9th Street, and stop in front of City Hall. During the ceremony the unit will march toward city hall, in column of route, bayonets fixed. As the unit approaches city hall, the chief constable stands in the centre of the road to bar the unit from proceeding further. The chief constable challenges the unit on its identity and the Commanding Officer responds with the unit's title. The chief constable then calls for the unit to "Advance one and be recognized".

The CO, accompanied by the chief constable then marches to the door to city hall. The CO knocks on the door three times with the pommel of his sword. The mayor opens the door and the CO declares his name and that of the unit. The mayor, accompanied by the city council, forms up near the entrance to city hall. The mayor then reads the proclamation, welcoming the unit, inspects the troops, and invites it to exercise its freedom.

At about 11:00am, following the ceremony, the Regiment will march off to the Keystone Centre. They will march west on Victoria Avenue and south on 18<sup>th</sup> Street.

A public display of equipment and a performance by the Royal Canadian Artillery Band will be held from noon until 3:00pm in the Manitoba Room of the Keystone Centre. The public is welcome and encouraged to attend all parts of this event.

That is one military family's way of coping with the absence of their son, who is serving in Afghanistan.

"He wasn't home for Christmas, and I missed him. So I had a picture of him blown up to life-size," said Janet Pentney, whose son, Philip, has been in Kan-

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dahar since Dec. 8. She calls the picture Phlat Phil.

"I've been taking him everywhere: to the Glenburnie United Church, to his friends' sleepover, a skating party,"

When the six-foot-two cardboard-mounted photo is not going places, it stands in the living room of the Pentneys' house in Glenburnie.

Janet and her husband, retired lieutenant colonel David Pentney, first lived in Kingston from 1995 through 2000. Then, Philip spent three years at Lundy's

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Lane Public School and two years at La Salle Secondary School. "We came back here three

years ago, after David's retirement from the military. Why Kingston? We love Kingston. It's the place our children all went to high school and they have friends here. And I was brought up in Perth," she said.

Having wacky ideas is Janet Pentney's business. She is also known as Silly Sally the clown. She works at parties and other special events.

Phil was a reservist in Halifax while attending university.

"He did two years at Dalhousie. While he was down there, he joined the reserve to make some extra money while going through university. Last year, he decided to take a break and go to in Afghanistan.

"He put everything in a

storage locker. He's not interested in a full time career in the military. He got interested in the military because of his dad.'

The Pentneys' other son, Adam, graduated from Royal Military College and is in the military full-time. He is a pilot, based in Moose Jaw, Sask. They also have a daughter, Heidi.

Janet Pentney said Phil also loves the cardboard picture of himself.

"He loves Phlat Phil. Some of his friends are coming home from university during reading week and I'm going to take Phlat Phil to their houses."

Like most parents of soldiers, she is worried.

"Yes, I'm worried about his safety, but he wanted to go. He's proud of what he's doing.'

They provide shortterm storage of untreated wastewater and are an ideal alternative to septic systems. They are simple to install and can even be installed above ground. They are mandatory in some areas.

#### Protecting Manitoba's Water Supply

Holding tanks are an ideal alternative to septic fields because they prevent wastewater from draining into the soil. This is especially true in areas with thin or shallow soil, sand, bedrock, clay, sloping and restricted lot sizes. Used properly, pump-out systems like holding tanks provide the highest level of environmental protection.

Holding tanks will also save you money because installation and maintenance is much less costly compared to septic systems, disposal fields and treatment systems.



The Co-operative Education Tax Credit (CETC) can help you regruit and retain the young workers you need to build your bottom line.

The CETC allows you to recruit qualified students in participating university and college co-op education programs for on-the-job braining. This allows you to groom these students, evaluate their potential as full-time employees and earn tex credits all at the same time.

#### Who is eligible?

Most Manitobe employers are now eligible. This includes private companies, co-operatives, Crown Corporations, municipally-owned businesses, not-for-profit organizations, and even unincorporated employers.

#### Earn Tax Credits

You can participate in the CETC program in two ways:

- Students Hire co-op advation students for 10 or more consecutive. weeks and you may be eligible for a CETC equal to 10 per cent of each student's selary and wages (net of government assistance) up to \$1,000 per placement.
- Graduates Hire one or more recent co-op education graduates and you may be eligible to receive a Co-op Grad Hiring Incentive (COGH) actual to 5 per cent of the new employee's net wages and salary in each of the first two full years of employment to a maximum of \$2,500 for each year.

## Writing letters: are you the person for the job?



Dear Career Coach, I have been asked to write a letter of recommendation for a former employee. HELP!! Under the Gun Dear Under the Gun, When asked to write a letter of recommendation there are a couple questions to ask yourself before the panic sets in:

•Are you the right person to write the letter? If you do not know the individual well enough to speak about their reputation, work habits, and strengths there would not be much point in you writing a letter for them – what would you say? Be up-front with the person asking for the letter of recommendation from you.

• What is your company's policy on letters of recommendation? Find out if you are allowed to write letters of recommendation in the first place – some companies have very clear rules about who can/cannot provide letters of recommendation. Companies may also have a policy that only positive, factual recommendation letters can be issued. Knowing what your company policies are will help you in your decision to write a letter or not and to guide the content.

• Do you qualify? Can

you honestly write positive things about the individual? If you can't, bow out. If you can, brainstorm with the individual to determine the focus of the letter. Be aware of deadlines!

Here are some guidelines for writing a letter of recommendation:

1. Explain how you know the applicant. How long have you known the





It is too late to sort out your religious views on life during a firefight in the desert of Afghanistan.

It is too late to contemplate the afterlife, when your friend is dying beside you in the theatre of operations.

It is too late to question whether or not you can pull the trigger on your rifle, when the enemy is targeting you with his.

In the heat of battle, and in desperate times in operations, faith becomes an important element of self survival. Faith and spirituality are those things we often put on the back burner to look at sometime down the road. Perhaps we look at them when we want to baptize our child, or when we decide to get married, or occasionally when we attend a funeral for a loved one; but by and large, we don't really challenge ourselves to answer the big questions of life.

The **Big Questions of Life (BQL)** are now in the forefront because of the deployments we have experienced in Afghanistan. The flood works have been opened and questions, the big questions, are being asked: but where are the answers?

Even as a Chaplain, with strong faith in God and Jesus, I am challenged and sometimes jarred from what I believe is right and good in the world. As I hear people's stories, experience their lives, support the families back at home, I begin to search for deeper meaning and to answer the Big Questions of Life.

I truly believe that the most important thing a soldier can do, before deploying, is to look at their faith/ sense of spirituality and to begin to search for meaning in life before the time comes that you are put into a crisis situation. I'm not advocating that everyone become religious (but that would be way cool), but more so to take the time to explore life with your family, friends and spouses. Chaplains are always willing to hear your thoughts on the Big Questions and to help provide guidance. A spiritually strong soldier will be able to survive more trauma and crisis than a soldier who hasn't given the topic much thought. A family left behind that has had time to talk about these things may have a slightly easier way to cope with the stresses of life and deployment. This it not to say that a heavy dose of spirituality makes you impervious to fear and trauma; however, it has certainly given an advantage in how to deal with the experiences.

One way you can engage yourself in spiritual life is to visit the Chapels on base. Both Chapels offer uplifting religious services every Sunday at 1030 hrs. The community is a community of military people and families all dealing with the same issues – we support each other.

On the 24<sup>th</sup> of April, a session on **"How to Talk to Children about Death and Dying"** will be offered at the Faith Centre from 1300-1600 hrs, and from 1800-2100 hrs. Child care will be provided at the Oc-

casional Child Care facility at the MFRC (please book thru ext. 3352)

These are some small ways to begin the process to building up your Spiritual hardiness. In the Theatre of Operations, it is almost too late to start thinking about it. There, you need to focus on the mission and to protect yourself and your buddies beside you. God Bless.
